Not Just Survive, But Thrive

It's 3:00 pm on Thursday, September 27. I've just left a protest at the Supreme Court. I've got a sandwich on the tray in front of me, something I bought at Union Station, and a Chardonnay from the Café Car. I am nestled against the window, hoping no one will sit next to me and see my mascara-smeared face and red eyes. I am still wet from the rain that began to fall on us as we stood at the base of the Supreme Court steps, baptizing us in the name of the suffering, the survivors and the Spirit that sustains us all. I let the rain fall on me as long as I could, wanting the water, needing the water, and then pulled up my hood. Standing there, I hugged other survivors, other protestors, sheltered under plastic ponchos and umbrellas. Listening to speakers shout in bullhorns. I was one of the speakers. "I know you think clergy aren't supposed to get angry but I am here because I am hella-pissed off," I began.

I had accidentally boarded the wrong, slower train down to D.C. just that morning, but arrived just in time to meet Rob in the lobby, and watch Dr. Ford's opening statement on his iPhone. Her voice trembled while she recounted what happened to her on a bed in a house with no adults, on a bed onto which she was pushed, in a room with the door closed with the stereo playing loudly. The groping hands, the laughter. The covering of her mouth. The other boy, jumping on the bed, causing all three to fall in a heap on the floor. Her escape into the bathroom. Them ping-ponging downstairs, laughing.

I can see what she is saying. Like I can see my own things, the things that are always there. The tall body bending toward me. The unwanted mouth on mine. The smell of coffee and cigarettes. The feeling of anger and shame and helplessness. The telling of it in pieces. The years, decades it takes to get it all told. Still getting it all told.



I understand. I see her. I believe her. I've been there. Too many of us have been there.

Studies by David Finkelhor, Director of the Crimes Against Children Research Center, show that:

- One in 5 girls and 1 in 20 boys are victims of child sexual abuse.
- Self-report studies show that 20% of adult females and 5–10% of adult males recall a childhood sexual assault or sexual abuse incident.
- In a one-year period in the U.S., 16% of youth ages 14 to 17 had been sexually victimized.
- Over their lifetimes, 28% of U.S. youth ages 14 to 17 had been sexually victimized.
- Children are most vulnerable to child sexual abuse between the ages of 7 and 13.

According to a 2003 National Institute of Justice report, 3 out of 4 adolescents who have been sexually assaulted were victimized by someone they knew well.

Our protests are most certainly about the unfitness of Kavanaugh as a Supreme Court justice. AND our protests are about all of the ways little people are violated in this nation. Yes, stripped from parents. Yes, warehoused. Yes, starved and thirsty from poverty. And yes, mistreated by trusted adults—clergy, parents, caregivers. What are we going to do about this? I don't fully know. But October 19–21 is the 27th Annual National Celebration of the Children's Sabbath. Our staff wants to collaborate with you. To teach our children, to protect our children, to put our children—the children around the globe—in the center of our lives of faith.

Let's decide together what that will look like. So our children not only survive, but thrive.

CW: What motivated you to start the Middle Players?

HS: I noticed that the writers in my Creative Writing group sometimes had difficulty speaking in front of people. I wanted to give them a way to achieve a comfort level in public speaking and performing.

How does the program benefit the actors (both professionals and those with no acting experience)?

I've watched how people who have not been able to work, step up; with support, they gain the courage to go out and make a difference, by collaborating on the work we perform. Often, they end up making new friends in the process.

What's next? How would you like to see the program grow?

I would love to produce shows that we could take to schools, libraries, and other communities. We could use theater to educate them about social injustices and express Middle's values. I would also love to do longer runs (more than just one date), and maybe even put on a theater piece during the Revolutionary Love conference.

How do you motivate the Players and get them to focus?

We begin each class with exercises in breathing and relaxation, trust and bonding, and improvisation. We've grown to a group of 25 to 30 people who help each other, not just with memorizing lines and rehearsals, but in their personal lives as well. They become a family.

Once I get them started doing scenes, those who may be naturally withdrawn or shy or anxious about performing are suddenly transformed into people who are capable of intimacy, openness, spontaneity and trust. They learn to be there for each other and to follow through on their commitments.

Being onstage and successfully putting on a play is such a confidence booster—to be able to say, "yes, I did it!" is an amazing thing to take away from the experience.
