



## Standing in Support of Puerto Rico

June 1-3, 2018

*Eight months after Hurricane Maria, thousands of families in Puerto Rico continue to be without power. Many communities still do not have drinking water. Approximately 500,000 Puerto Ricans left the island after losing their homes and jobs. On June 1, a new hurricane season begins. The people of Puerto Rico are living an incessant Good Friday reality. The systemic oppression of an ecological devastation, an unaudited debt of over 72 billion dollars and the Jones Act are just a few of the obstacles that are afflicting Puerto Ricans. We are calling on congregations to stand in solidarity with the American citizens in Puerto Rico and commemorate June 1st as a day resembling Good Friday. We ask that you consider draping a blue tarp—essential tool for those working on disaster recovery--over a cross (or over a communion table) on Friday, June 1st. On Sunday, June 3rd as a symbol of the resurrection and new life for the Puerto Rican people, remove the tarp and, if possible, send it to Puerto Rico. ### PRAYER OF SOLIDARITY, FRIDAY, JUNE 1

Loving God, on this first day of hurricane season,  
our hearts are filled with sorrow  
as we realize that the people of Puerto Rico  
are living an interminable Good Friday experience.

We confess that we do not see them,  
and our hearts do not feel their pain.

As a nation, we are challenged by our declarations of exceptionalism—  
while our own citizens have been abandoned to suffer,  
and we have failed to advocate for their relief.

As they take their last breath, we watch from a distance.  
We watch the elderly suffer, schools being closed,  
the sick dying prematurely,  
the young leaving their families behind.  
We have turned our backs on them.  
Forgive us, O God.

Give us the courage to find our place at the foot of the cross,  
and feel the pain of the Puerto Rican people:

The pain of an ecological devastation  
The pain of homelessness  
The pain of unemployment  
The pain of lack of access to quality and sustainable health care  
The pain of a mental illness crisis  
The pain of invisibility  
The pain of marginalization

As we drape this tarp over this cross,  
we stand in solidarity with the people of Puerto Rico  
and we ask, O God, that resurrection may come.

The cross is the way of the lost  
The cross is the staff of the lame  
The cross is the strength of the weak  
The cross is the hope of the hopeless  
The cross is the freedom of the slave  
The cross is the water of the seeds  
The cross is the source  
for folk seeking water  
The cross is the cloth of the naked<sup>1</sup>

Envelop their hearts with the hope for a new day—  
filled with new life and possibilities.  
May they feel your presence and know they are not alone.

Inspire us and confront us here,  
so that we may continue to work for a "Just World For ALL." **AMEN.**
