## Redeeming the Soul of a Nation

I was on a field trip to a nature center outside of Chicago on that April day. My fourth-grade class at Gresham Elementary School had escaped our urban neighborhood of dark, red brick bungaloes set on little patches of green and gone to a nature center in the suburbs. We saw flowers blooming and learned how to speak about them in Latin.

Mr. Smith, our teacher, was a dreamy, chocolatey brown man who smiled all the time, a smile as bright as his highly shined shoes. Even when scolding rowdy tweens, his eyes kept the smile going. So when his face was crumpled, his eyes swollen, we knew something was wrong before he spoke to us.

On April 4, 1968, at about 6:00p, Mr. Smith gathered us together just before we boarded the bus home and said, "Children, I have terrible news for you. Dr. Martin Luther King has been shot. He was standing on the balcony of his motel with his friends when a gunman took his life." Dr. King was dead, our teacher was weeping, and we were stunned into grief.

That night, Chicago was on fire. Even our pleasant South Side neighborhood erupted in violence. We could hear people shouting in the streets; some were shooting guns. My sister and I hid under our beds for a while, and I imagined, one month before my 9th birthday, that since Dr. King was dead, I was going to have to pick up his mantle and do his work. This was the beginning of my sense of call. I knew I'd join him in being a drum major for peace, that I'd work so that no matter the color of one's skin, one could be loved, celebrated, and have enough.

Now, 50 years later, I am the Senior Minister of the church of my dreams, the church of Dr. King's dream, the church of God's dreams. In all of our ethnic and cultural diversity, in all of our sexual orientations and genders, in the wide breadth of our ages and the ways we see God through diverse eyes—I am so in love with us, so very called to the work we are doing to heal the nation, to redeem her soul.

And, 50 years after Dr. King's death, I have a new friend, colleague, and partner in the move-

ment for love and justice. Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee alumna, Civil Rights activist and public theologian Ruby Nell Sales is coming to Middle Church. She will make her home here! Together, her non-profit SpiritHouse Project and Middle Church will form the The Center for Social and Spiritual Restoration. The center will be a national project that offers a common space where people of different social locations come together to address the spiritual and social impediments that stand in the way of up-building a beloved community and a more realized democracy that is both transformative and sustainable.

A few weeks ago, I was with Ruby in Charlottesville, listening to the way she speaks to people of all ethnicities. She calls them to action in her gentle voice, her brilliant insights pouring out of her like ginger tea. Strong, brewed with love. Meant for healing people. Meant for redeeming the soul of our nation.

Ruby has a wonderful spirituality, a deep religious soul, that she calls "black folk religion." In a conversation with Krista Tippet, Ruby described an experience of realizing that God is always present, healing her, redeeming her soul:

"I was riding down the road one day in Washington, D.C. after having been at a demonstration against the war in Iraq. And suddenly, out of nowhere, I started crying, and I realized that God had been with me even when I hadn't been with myself. And those moments made me really begin to seek, to go back to really think deeply about black folk religion and to really want to develop, in a very intentional way, an inner life that had to do with how I lived in the world."

Ruby and I will offer our annual Martin Luther King, Jr. teach-in on January 14, 2017, at 3:00p. We will talk about black folk religion, about completing God's dream, and about redeeming the soul of America. You won't want to miss it.

# Revolutionary Love in Action

## Responding to Puerto Rico

Middle Church congregants Edna Benitez and Michael Wiener traveled to Puerto Rico with a group from Fort Washington Collegiate Church in early December. Edna, Michael, and many Middle Church congregants have family in Puerto Rico still affected by the destruction of Hurricane Maria. The team distributed groceries and the supplies you donated in Miraflores, a poor, isolated rural town. Power continues to be out across most of the island. People in Miraflores DEEPLY appreciated the solar lamps and chargers. Michael returned the following week, with solar energy kits from Resilient Power Puerto Rico and personally installed one system at a church in Miraflores and one in Saltos. The church in Saltos feeds the community and provides supplies and medical care. Both Edna and Michael paid for their own travel so all of your donations would support the recovery efforts.



The Collegiate Church donated an initial \$10,000 to support Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Two \$4,000 water systems were purchased through Operation Oasis, and \$2,000 bought water filtration kits through Waves for Water. In a system-wide campaign in November, we raised \$5,000 at Fort Washington Church; \$4,000 at Intersections International; \$6,339 at Marble Church; \$22,423 at Middle Church; \$2,600 at West End Church. Then, the Outreach Committee of the Collegiate Church released \$15,000 in matching funds: \$5,000 for The Maria Fund and \$10,000 for Matria, an organization doing extensive work for the people of Miraflores. ## Standing for LGBTQ Rights

Rev. Dr. Jacqui Lewis spoke outside of the Supreme Court as justices heard the oral arguments in Masterpiece Cakeshop v. Colorado Civil Rights Commission. The case is about a baker who would not bake a wedding cake for a gay couple. Jacqui was a part of a coalition of human rights activists, clergy, and senators speaking out for LGBTQ rights. The decision of this case will have far-reaching consequences about whether businesses can discriminate based on religion.

"If religious freedom means we say no to our neighbor based on sexuality, race, or gender, that's not free. That actually costs something. And what it costs is humanity, it costs equality, it costs joy, it costs dignity and it costs a way of life. It costs our Constitu-



tion and the sum total of that cost is bigotry. So let's be honest, refusing someone a cake based on their sexuality is discrimination and religious bigotry. It's not religious freedom." Dr. Lewis said. "It's going to start with a cake for a gay couple and it's going to go to Muslims not being able to be served at a funeral home, or Jews not being able to be served at a nail salon." The ruling from the Supreme Court is expected in spring 2018. #OpentoAll

## Pageant Celebrates Our Diverse Community

Our children put a new twist on a Christmas pageant. Middle member Pam Edgar and staff Marte Samuelstuen wrote a script that cast the nativity characters based on who the children really are, not how they look. There were no rehearsals—the children we cast right on the spot, based on their unique personalities.

Marte asked which kids could be "vocal" and they were cast as angels who yelled, "DON'T BE AFRAID" whenever any character was afraid. The child who wanted to express joy became Mary. The child who always knew to do the right thing took the role of Joseph. The stage filled with shepherds (kids who could be scared and excited at the same time), animals, and a sparkling star. People of all ages on stage and in the pews wore crowns to claim their role as wise people. And we were all reminded—repeatedly!—not to be afraid. After all, God is with us!

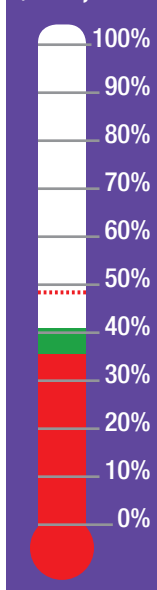
