Irving Park, Addison on the Blue Line Are Latest CTA Stations to Get New Public Artwork

Stations among many receiving new artwork to improve the commuting experience as part of Mayor Emanuel, CTA's commitment to expanding public art on transit system

New, one-of-a-kind artwork will serve as the finishing touch for the Addison and Irving Park Blue Line stations, which recently underwent significant renovation and upgrades as part of Mayor Emanuel's *Your New Blue* program, a major modernization of the O'Hare branch of the Blue Line begun in 2014. The Chicago Transit Board today awarded contracts to two renowned artists to commission new public art for permanent display at both stations.

Under the Mayor's leadership, CTA's public art collection has nearly doubled since 2011 to more than 60 works of art on all eight rail lines. The collection includes mosaics, art glass and sculptures created by nationally and internationally acclaimed artists, many of whom are local.

"Original artwork adds tremendous value not only to CTA stations but also to our customers' overall transit experience," said CTA President Dorval R. Carter Jr. "The addition of new artwork at Addison and Irving Park by these two talented artists will transform these stationhouses into gateways for the surrounding community by reflecting a piece of their story."

CTA's collection will further expand over the next few years by nearly a dozen new works of art, including those announced today. Other new artwork is planned as part of the completed *Your New Blue* station renovation work at Western and Damen, as well as the new Washington/Wabash Loop station opening in 2017; the bus turnaround facility at Austin and Chicago avenues; and the Wilson station and 95th Street terminal on the Red Line, both of which are currently being reconstructed.

The CTA has selected Chicago-based artist, curator and educator Dan Devening for new artwork at Irving Park station, and internationally acclaimed Italian artist Francesco Simeti for artwork at Addison, selecting the artists from nearly 350 proposals submitted to the agency as part of a Call for Artists issued in February 2016.

CTA will host public meetings with the selected artists to gather community input, which will assist the artists in their development of site-specific artwork. Meeting details will be announced in the coming months.

The artwork will be paid for with Federal Transit Enhancement funds provided by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA). The comprehensive budget for both projects is estimated to be \$200,000, which includes costs associated with artist fees, fabrication, shipping/delivery and contingency.
