Evening presentation in the Nave, 7:00-8:30pm


“Interfaith Dialogue for Challenging Times”

About the Interfaith Amigos

Rabbi Ted Falcon, PhD, spiritual guide, author, teacher and therapist, has taught Jewish traditions of Kabbalah, meditation and spirituality since the 1970s and founded and served meditative synagogues in Los Angeles and the Seattle area. The author of several books, he has a private spiritual counseling practice, seeing people in his Seattle office as well as via Skype.

Imam Jamal Rahman is co-founder and Muslim Sufi Minister at Interfaith Community Sanctuary in Seattle and adjunct faculty at Seattle University. Originally from Bangladesh, he has a passion for interfaith work and travels often, teaching classes, workshops and retreats locally, nationally and internationally. He is available for interfaith weddings and ceremonies and, like Rabbi Ted, has penned several books, and has a private spiritual counseling practice.

Pastor Dave Brown of Immanuel Presbyterian Church, a growing, progressive community in Tacoma, is the innovator of award-winning Blues Vespers, a Blues concert with poetry and reflection. He leads pilgrimages to Iona, Scotland, and organized four Habitat builds in Guatemala. A graduate of Princeton Theological Seminary, he served as staff for the National Council of Churches Committee on Public Education and Literacy.

Pastor Don Mackenzie, one of the original Interfaith Amigos, has authored books with Rabbi Ted and Imam Jamal and continues to join them when they are traveling. Pastor Don moved from Seattle to Minneapolis in 2013, so for many local programs **Pastor Dave Brown** stands in for Don and becomes one of the **Pacific Northwest Interfaith Amigos**.

With their willingness to openly address the usual taboos of interfaith dialogue—the “awkward” parts of each tradition—the Interfaith Amigos create authentic conversation, between themselves and with their audiences, giving people an opportunity to step more fully into the rich promise of the interfaith experience. Their work is dedicated to supporting more effective interfaith dialogue that can bring greater collaboration on the major social and economic issues of our time and focus energies toward furthering greater peace and understanding.
