## To make known His power to heal and grace to forgive

Our Sunday announcements always include an invitation to be prayed for in the side chapel, after communion, if you have a health issue or personal concern that is troubling you. Hearing this many parishioners may wonder just what is going on over there during healing prayer.

It is exactly that. Healing prayers offered in the simple act and Biblical tradition of the laying on of hands and praying for someone. In this case members of the Good Shepherd Healing Ministry ask about and then pray for the healing needs or concerns of those who come over for prayer after communion.

Through their prayers, they are invoking the Holy Spirit's healing power on someone's behalf. They pray that if it is God's will, then in His time and by

His command the things for which that person asks God's help, would be done for them in accordance with His will. Those who pray are not doing the healing, God does that part. Yes, it happens regularly, right here in our church, all the time. If you have a need or concern troubling you, bring it to God in this very humble yet powerful way by coming over for prayer.

It all starts with the question "what can we pray for" followed by the simple act of the laying on of hands and the calling upon of the Holy Spirit. He is always there with His power to heal and grace to forgive, waiting for us to ask for His help in Jesus' name. As those who pray carry on this Christian tradition of the laying on of hands in prayer, the amazing part has always been what actually happens after that healing prayer.

- **Rector's Brown Bag Book Read**

⇒ ***The Ragamuffin Gospel*** by Brennan Manning on Tuesday, February 20 at noon. Most of us believe in God's grace—in theory. But somehow we can't seem to apply it in our daily lives. We continue to see Him as a small-minded bookkeeper, tallying our failures and successes on a score sheet. Yet God give us His grace, willingly, no matter what we've done. We come to Him as ragamuffins—dirty, bedraggled, and beat-up. And when we sit at His feet, He smiles upon us, the chosen objects of His “furious love.” Brennan Manning's now-classic meditation on grace and what it takes to access it—simple honesty—has changed thousands of lives.

⇒ ***Pastrix*** by Nadia Bolz-Weber on Tuesday, April 17 at noon. Heavily tattooed and loud-mouthed, Nadia, a former stand-

up comic, sure as hell didn't consider herself to be religious leader material—until the day she ended up leading a friend's funeral in a smoky downtown comedy club. Surrounded by fellow alcoholics, depressives, and cynics, she realized: These were her people. Maybe she was meant to be their pastor.

Using life stories—from living in a hopeful-but-haggard commune of slackers of surviving the wobbly chairs and war stories of a group of recovering alcoholics, from her unusual but undeniable spiritual calling to pastoring a notorious con artist—Nadia uses stunning narrative and poignant honesty to portray a woman who is both deeply faithful and deeply flawed, giving hope to the rest of us along the way. Wildly entertaining and deeply resonant, this is the book for people who hunger for a bit of hope that doesn't come from vapid consumerism or navel-gazing; for women who talk too loud, and guys who love chick flicks; for the gay man who loves Jesus, and won't allow himself to be shunned by the church. In short, this book is for every thinking misfit suspicious of institutionalized religion, but who is still seeking transcendence and mystery.

## Happy New Year

I am aware that many are reading this message before the New Year has begun, but maybe that is for the better. Maybe some will be reminded that something new is upon us and we wish and hope that the new thing will be a happy occasion. My thoughts this new year are about the years that have passed since coming to this wonderful parish - of all the holy things you have accomplished in and outside the church, of the praise and worship of a generous and loving God that I have seen in and through you, and the continuing hope I see expressed especially in those who have experienced significant challenges and losses over these years. In these thoughts, I recall the words of Paul who encouraged the faithful saying, "Beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things. Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you."

As was true of the early church and the days of the kings and prophets before the church, we live in a world that challenges us and threatens to overwhelm some of us. I am grateful for the love of God shown through his church and especially this parish. The church and its people are the embodiments of God's truth and honor and its ministries are the incarnation of God's justice and holiness. They are pleasing and commendable and excellent and worthy of praise, and importantly they keep us grounded in the love of God when chaos and darkness enter our lives. In this New Year, I am reminded that these are gifts of God for the people of God. They are freely given and for a people, people like you and me, children of God who are dear to his heart. It is a simple thought, but God wants to give us something. He just gave us his son at Christmas, yet God is not done giving. We know that, but I wonder if have stopped receiving? Are there gifts God offers that we fail to receive because we have stopped expecting

to be surprised?

I was at our Tuesday soaking prayer service a few weeks ago and was gifted with a wonderful reflection on the presence of the Holy Spirit in this parish. These several weeks later that message is still inspiring my soul. I guess I needed to hear the Holy Spirit speak and maybe you do as well. I believe God is always offering gifts and I had to be there to receive that message I know was spoken to all, but I also know was meant just for me.

I pray that in this New Year all of us would think about the gifts of God that we may have left "unwrapped." Some may want to resolve this new year that they will not leave the gift of receiving Holy Communion unused. That gift is offered every Sunday and Wednesday. Some may want to start the new year with a renewed commitment to holy living through a formal act of reconciliation. Your priests are here for you. Some may resolve to seek the healing power of God by taking advantage of the intercessory prayers offered during Sunday worship and on Tuesday night. Your brothers and sisters in Christ are ready to pray for you. Others may want to recommit themselves to some form of discipleship, studying the Word of God and serving others in a renewed and intentional quest for the gift of holiness. May the light of Christ shine upon the path to the gifts you wish to receive and may the inspiration of the Holy Spirit lead you to greater gifts in this new year.

## From Fr. George:

This article commences with the year 2018 in the title. Like many of us, I have taken some time to reflect on the year 2017. Last year was a tremendous year of transition for me. For one thing, the vestry initiated early on a small stipend for my volunteer priestly ministry at Good Shepherd. The last act for a vestry to do in any official capacity was to ask – notice the word I put in quotes – for me to resign. Here, however, the stipend was unanimously approved by the vestry with the counsel of the Episcopal Diocese of Western North Carolina and the Pension Fund of the National Episcopal Church.

It is a tremendously complicated process simply to legally receive a stipend while on disability. Good Shepherd crossed the T's and dotted the I's to ensure that everything was done correctly. Where am I going with all of this? It means that I get to exercise a priestly ministry at Good Shepherd while not having to worry about financial or legal matters.

Before coming to Good Shepherd, I had served four Episcopal Churches: two as Assistant; two as Rector. Being a Rector is a special calling. The Rector, along with the Senior Warden work in concert to ensure that the Church is being faithful to their calling. Along with an extensive priestly ministry, the Rector also does a tremendous amount of day-to-day administrative work. Father Bill does this extremely

well; he also works extremely well with Tom Wilkerson, our gifted Senior Warden. It is nothing personal, but I do not miss this part of ordained ministry. I missed these parts of ordination: the liturgy; the pastoral care; the Mission Trips. Father Bill gave me an amazing amount of opportunities for these three in 2017.

Yes, there are other opportunities for priestly ministry; however, even more important was the fact that in 2017 at least 90 percent of the time at the end of each week was spent with Anne back in Tennessee. It is significant that Anne and I keep our relationship strong and not have the institutional church, in a negative manner, infringe upon our relationship. Fr. Bill and you gave Anne and me your blessing to do so last year.

In all of this, it is my relationship with God that is most import. That relationship with God is the relationship above all relationships. It is directional. It gently guides. It softly steers. And it will continue to do so into 2018.
