Easter Cantata

Come to Good Shepherd Episcopal Church on April 7 at 7:00 pm to hear that Chancel Choir perform an Easter Cantata: "What Love Is This?" is a moving musical and worship experience for choir and congregation alike as it walks through the last days of Christ's earthly life, from the jubilant entrance into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday and the difficult days of rejection and crucifixion to the triumphant resurrection of Easter Sunday. The fullest spectrum of music is represented in this dramatic thirty-five-minute work from composers Lloyd Larson, Mary McDonald, Brad Nix, Marty Parks, and Larry Shackley. A single speaker weaves the narrative between anthems ranging from celebratory to contemplative.

Upcoming

- *The Jesus Fatwah* on Mondays, April 2 thru 30 - 5:30 pm - Dr. Robert Schneider will be in the Library facilitating a video/discussion course. The program is written and produced by Living the Questions. This 5 week program explores the Muslim faith and pairs the conversation with the Christian faith. Dr. Schneider has lived and worked in 2 mostly Muslim countries and has personal knowledge of the subject matter. Classes will last about 1 hour. - Rector's Brown Bag Book Read — *Pastrix* by Nadia Bolz Weber on Tuesday, April 17 at noon. Heavily tattooed and loud-mouthed, Nadia, a former stand-up comic, sure as hell didn't consider herself to be religious leader material-until the day she ended up leading a friend's funeral in a smoky downtown comedy club. Surrounded by fellow alcoholics, depressives, and cynics, she realized: These were her people. Maybe she was meant to be their pastor.

Using life stories-from living in a hopeful-but-haggard commune of slackers to surviving the wobbly chairs and war stories of a group for recovering alcoholics, from her unusual but undeniable spiritual calling to pastoring a notorious con artist-Nadia uses stunning narrative and poignant honesty to portray a woman who is both deeply faithful and deeply flawed, "giving hope to the rest of us along the way.

Wildly entertaining and deeply resonant, this is the book for people who hunger for a bit of hope that doesn't come from vapid consumerism or navel-gazing; for women who talk too loud, and guys who love chick flicks; for the gay man who loves Jesus, and won't allow himself to be shunned by the church. In short, this book is for every thinking misfit suspicious of institutionalized religion, but who is still seeking transcendence and mystery.

- *The "Big Picture" Bible: God's story and our story* - Saturday, April 21 - 9 am - 4 pm - The Rev. Dr. Delmer Chilton tours churches offering his stimulating and joyful talk about God and includes us in the Spring Tour. The Bible is his topic on April 21 in Good Shepherd's Parish Hall. This event will be offered at no charge. Delmer describes this as a "romp through the Bible from Genesis

- Rector's Brown Bag Book Read — *The Great Divorce* by C. S. Lewis on Tuesday, June 19 at noon. C. S. Lewis' *The Great Divorce* is a classic Christian allegorical tale about a bus ride from hell to heaven. An extraordinary meditation upon good and evil, grace and judgment, Lewis's revolutionary idea in the *The Great Divorce* is that the gates of Hell are locked from the inside. Using his extraordinary descriptive powers, Lewis' *The Great Divorce* will change the way we think about good and evil.
- Confirmation, Reaffirmation, Reception—Sundays at 12:15 pm To be an Episcopalian is to be a member of a worldwide fellowship of some 80 million Christians who find common ground in their belief in the triune God of holy scripture and the liturgies of the Book of Common Prayer locally adapted. It is customary for us to welcome baptized adults and youth over age 12 into this fellowship through a course of preparation preceding the annual visitation of the diocesan bishop. This course is meant for those seeking confirmation, for those already confirmed in the Episcopal church who wish to reaffirm their confirmation vows, and for those confirmed in another Christian church who wish to be received into this church. - *First Light* - Sundays May 6 - June 10 - 9:15 am - Kathy Wright will be Facilitator. This is a Living the Question series production. John Dominic Crossan and Marcus Borg present a course about the time Jesus lived. The course covers daily living, economics, literacy, the politics of Rome, and much more. Borg and Crossan are internationally renown Jesus scholars with a wonderful ability to speak to us clearly of these times and issues. The class consists of a short video and discussion each week. Study materials will be provided. The entire program is 12 weeks. We will be doing the first six weeks now and balance of sessions in September after our summer break. Going to Galilee

"But go, tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you.'"

- Mark 16:7

Have you been to Galilee? It is that place where Jesus was from, where his family lived and where he was reared. Had he been born in more modern times, it may have been that his home in Nazareth would have been turned into a tourist destination with website, advance ticket purchases, and strict tour times. No lolly-gagging and holding up the line. Be sure to stop at the Manger Gift Shop which doubles as the exit. One would also be able to see where he went to primary school, attended church camp, and the stadium where he played quarterback for the Nazareth Saints. People in the area still talking about that "Hail Mary" play his father, the coach, called and that he pulled off on that Good Friday against the Gehenna Demons. I do not know what is to be found in the real Galilee, though I suspect there are plenty of places claiming to be the authentic place where this or that happened. I have not yet been to that Galilee, though I have been to Galilee.

The evangelist Mark ends his gospel with a mysterious scene from Easter morning. Some of Jesus' followers are headed to where he had been buried, carrying spices and other things that would commonly have been used for a proper burial. With the Passover coming and it being late in the day when Jesus died, his body was simply wrapped in linen and placed in a tomb. So these women were coming to do what was proper. Their concerns were practical. The right thing needed to

be done, did they have enough spices, and who would roll away that large stone they had watched being rolled into place a couple days earlier. Perhaps they hoped the guards would help them. What they find is an empty tomb and a messenger saying that he is not there, that they will find Jesus in Galilee. "There you will see him, just as he told you." How often it is that we want to go back to what used to be, to try to fix things, to try to make things better. How often it is that we get stuck in places where something precious has died. Jesus calls us out of those places into new life. That is Easter. He has gone back to where it all began and where it all continues. He is out there among his people, teaching, healing, feeding the poor, welcoming children, and raising the dead. Have you seen that Galilee? Have you been there?



Mark tells us that the women who went to the tomb were frightened by what they saw and heard, and so told no one. Well, we have the story, so apparently they did tell someone. They told what they saw and heard, and importantly, they told others where they could find Jesus. He is out in Galilee. Have you been there?

We set up and decorate the Parish Hall, serve refreshments supplied by the congregation and then clean up afterward. Of late, we have been asked to give suggestions for appropriate dishes. These are a few suggestions for "finger foods":

Spiritual Direction at Good Shepherd with the Rev. Dr. Delmer L. Chilton

What is Spiritual Direction?

"Spiritual Direction is not psychotherapy nor is it an inexpensive substitute. Spiritual Direction is not pastoral counseling, nor is it to be confused with the mutuality of deep friendships, for it is unashamedly hierarchical. Not because the director is somehow "better" or "holier" than the directee, but because, in this covenantal relationship the director has agreed to put himself aside and so that his total attention can be focused on the person sitting in the other chair."

"I see Spiritual Direction as a relationship within which one Christian accompanies someone else along the journey of faith towards maturity as a follower of Jesus Christ. It takes place in conversations that cover all aspects of life. It is privileged and confidential; its aim is to be as

honest and open as possible. There is a clear recognition that God is important and present as a third party in the relationship, which unfolds against a background of prayer."



From Fr. George

All one has to do is face towards the Altar and gaze in awe of one of the most peaceful *stained-glass windows* that there is in the Episcopal Church, or almost any church for that matter. Ironically, there is no stained-glass to it at all. The glass is perfectly clear so that it does not cover up any of the splendor in the distance. There is a series of mountains that are extraordinarily adorned in any season of the calendar year: the vibrant, varying jade greens of summer; the explosion of a gamut of nearly unpredictable, multi-colors in autumn; the powdery, white snows and leaden grays of winter; and the inkling of emerald, inflamed buds just starting to pop out from their winter doze.

Words do not do anything that is close to recounting the naturally splendid beauty that these mountains portray. It is like something spiritual is reaching down into our most intimate part – our soul – to whisper that creation is reflecting a Creator. The longer I have lived in Hayesville, I continue to be stunned by the splendor the area of Western North Carolina and North Georgia communicates.

Mountains and fresh water – there is something incredibly special about the combination of those two. And this is coming from a guy who always has been mesmerized by sand, shells, and salt water.

We can look out upon those mountains every Sunday or any other time you happen to be at Good Shepherd; nevertheless, where we call home additionally has the hypnotic gifts of bodies of water. Lake Chatuge spans North Carolina and Georgia. Additionally, Fires Creek, Tusquittee Creek, and the Hiwassee River twist and turn their way throughout where we call home, literally in some of our backyards. If, however, you are willing to do some exploring of the origins of the rivers, creeks, and streams, you might just find yourself in an environment that takes you by complete astonishment.

I believe that *Creation reveals a Creator*. Admittedly, it is not that hard of a stretch for a priest to hold to this belief. There is, nonetheless,

quite a difference to experience it along a root-riddled, rocky trail leading to a whispering waterfall. Over time the whisper grows louder as the conversation of the falling water picks up in volume. Quite suddenly the conversation becomes a pleasing roar that woos me to discover what I barely even visually behold.

White water stunningly succumbs to gravity down and off elevated rock formations. It even splashes outward and onto uneven rock outcroppings, as well as micro-forests of Mountain Laurel. Sometimes my glasses and my cell phone camera mist over with the imperceptible union of the blending of air and water. The entire atmosphere plainly feels both pure and powerful. I simply stay and breathe it all in.

While a drop of water is an absolute wonder, combine it with other tiny drops of water and a miraculous transformation occurs. Archbishop Desmond Tutu wrote this: *Too frequently we think that we have to do spectacular things. Yet if we remember that the sea is actually made up of drops of water and each drop counts, each one of us can do our little bit where we are. Those little bits can come together and almost overwhelm the world. Each one of us can be an oasis of peace.*

The pouring of fresh water from our baptism brings us into the Church community where *each one of us can be an oasis of peace*, as well as part of something bigger than we could ever be as a single drop of water. As a single drop of water and as hundreds of drops combined, you and I are part of God's creation, where God is our Creator.

Cursillo, a Spanish word meaning "a short course in Christianity" is a program to help Christians know God's love and grace, and live out their personal vocations as Christ-centered leaders in the world. It begins with a weekend retreat of healing and renewal and continues with small weekly support groups called Reunion Groups and larger periodic group meetings called Ultreyas (which means "Onward").

Our diocesan Cursillo is in a period of discernment and is not holding Cursillo weekends at this time. Many Good Shepherd members have found great spiritual blessing in Cursillo or similar 3-day renewal
