Arts & Spirituality Invites You to Share Your Icons

During the month of October, the Arts and Spirituality Ministry will stage a special exhibition of icons in the Parish Hall. The foundation of the exhibit will be the 17 icons created at Good Shepherd last March during a week-long workshop. Some of Father Bill's beloved icons will also be on display, and you are encouraged to share icons that you may have made or collected.

For those not yet familiar with the world of iconography, an icon is a religious work of art, most commonly a painting, usually depicting Christ, the Virgin Mary, saints, or angels. Though the tradition of writing icons originated in the Eastern church, recently it has become popular in our own tradition.

If you would like to share your icon in the exhibition, please attach your name and identification of the icon on the back. Bring it to the

Please be aware that the plan is to hang the icons on the walls of the Parish Hall. The committee has made provisions to hang the pieces with 3M velcro hanging strips that hold up to six pounds. This way neither the icons nor the walls of the Parish Hall will be damaged. But if you do not wish to have your icon hung, you will need to provide a table display stand for it. You can retrieve your icon after the services on Sunday, October 28.

From the Pastor:

As I write these words on Friday, September 14, I am looking out the window at pure "Carolina Blue" skies and fluffy white clouds. It's hard to believe that right at this minute Hurricane Florence is churning away on the North Carolina coast, flooding towns and villages as far west as Goldsboro and Fayetteville. High winds are blowing down trees and knocking out power lines. It will take weeks to assess the damage and years to recover – some people never will.

We watch the destruction on television, we track the path of the storm, and we quietly lift a silent prayer of thanks that it looks like the worst of Florence will miss us. And we send our thoughts and prayers to those caught in the wake of the storm. But we all know that thoughts and prayers are just the beginning. Soon we will need to act; as individuals, as a parish and as a diocese. The calls will come in for help, at first for donations of money, later for donations of time and energy as mission teams are formed to go east to help with the massive clean-up. And knowing the folk of Good Shepherd as well as I do, I am fully confident that we will respond graciously and generously, reaching out in love to those in need.

Sometimes I wonder how often we look out our metaphorical windows and, because things are going well for us and those like us, assume things are "blue skies and fluffy clouds," for everyone else? There are storms raging throughout the world – storms of poverty and starvation, war and destruction, political oppression and societal upheaval. And yet, if it doesn't touch us, if it doesn't hurt someone we know and love – all too often we ignore it, act as though it doesn't exist. Jesus Christ calls us to a different standard, to a different way of looking at the world. The appointed Sunday Gospel Readings for September and October are from the book of Mark, there Jesus says things like this to the disciples (and to us):

"If any want to be my followers, let them deny themselves, take up their cross, and follow me."
Mark 8:34

"Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all." Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them, "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me. . ."
Mark 9:35-37

"You lack one thing; go, sell what you have, and give the money to the poor . . ."
Mark 10:21

". . . whoever wishes to be become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served, but to serve."
Mark 10:43-45

It is a vital part of our calling as a Christian community to look beyond our immediate surroundings and our own personal comfort to see the pain and needs of others. As we give thanks and praise to God for the many blessings we have received, let us never forget to pray for, and take action to relieve, the needs of others.

My daddy was a good man, a church-going man, but he wasn't much of one for Bible reading or praying – in fact, I don't recall ever seeing him do either. Once, when I was a teen-ager, I asked him about that. He took a drag on his cigarette, grinned a little and said, "Your Mama and me are a team. When it comes to religion, she does the talking – I do the heavy-lifting." In that moment I remembered all the times I had seen him helping people in need, without a word said to anyone about it or a thought given to being praised or thanked. He was a man who really saw his neighbors, saw when the gray clouds and difficult times had come in their lives, looked beyond his own "blue skies and fluffy clouds," to see something that needed doing – and did it.

From Fr. George

Let us go forth in the name of Christ. Go in peace to love and serve the Lord. Let us go forth into the world, rejoicing in the power of the Spirit. Let us bless the Lord. The Deacon or the Priest says this part. The People always respond, *Thanks be to God.* We use the words, *Alleluia, Alleluia* unless we are in the Church season of Lent as a part of the Dismissal. Some churches are also creative in the bulletin with the line - *The worship is over. Let the service begin.*

I remember as a child my thought was basically, *thank God that's over with.* It was just a silent thought and not a verbal expression. I was not that blunt but happened to teaspoon of culture to keep quiet. My simplistic and sarcastic understanding of church was that it was about an hour of time to get over within the context of a beautiful building. We heard the Bible, listened to a sermon, sang some hymns, ate flakey bread and drank wine. And then left. I was missing a key component of the dismissal - the *and then left* part of the service.

So much of my beliefs were a compartmentalization of faith. There were things that happened in the holy place of the church. It even had a different feel to it than other indoor and outdoor spaces. There were other things that happened outside of the holy place of the church. In my mind, there was no connection of one to the other. I went to church, and then I left. Ticket punched. That was the end of that.

What do you do after you leave? It is a complex issue. We are not human *doings*. We are human *beings*. I have a Master's Degree in Divinity, as well as 25 years of ordination to the priesthood but still

cannot make this a simple spiritual subject. Here are some questions for all of us to consider: What did you hear in the Scripture texts and in the sermon? What did you sing in the hymns? What did you experience when you went to the Altar to receive the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ?

It is still a complex issue that even the *correct* answer will not be able to resolve. Faith, however, is not about correct answers.

Faith is more experiential than academic. For instance, I am a strong supporter of Mission Trips. When you *go in peace to love and serve the Lord*, you never know where that will lead. Will you go on an International Mission Trip? Will you go on a National Mission Trip? Will you serve the mission needs of this local community? In the midst of the mission, the singular of *you* becomes the plural of *we*. When we, as the church community of Good Shepherd, go and serve other communities, transformation occurs. Pounding nails, working in a food pantry, staying at a homeless shelter together transcends theological and even political views.

We worship together. We go out into the world together. Where will that lead us? The only way we are going to find out is to do it together. When the worship is over, then the service begins.
