- **Episcopal Summer School, An Outline of the Faith commonly called the Catechism** on Sundays in June and July @ 12:15 pm in the Undercroft

The Book of Common Prayer is a treasury of reference for the faith, worship, and life of Episcopalians. Part of that treasury is a

teaching outline of the faith in question and answer format known as 'the catechism.' The very early church used such teaching materials to instruct newcomers, seekers, and those to be baptized, and a catechism has been included in the Prayer Book since the first edition in 1549. Many raised in the Episcopal Church learned the Prayer Book catechism as part of their preparation for confirmation. It may be that some have forgotten what the Prayer Book catechism teaches and that others coming to the Episcopal Church as adults have never studied the Episcopal Church's teachings on questions such as "What is the Church?" "What are sin and redemption?" "What is prayer?" "What is the mission of the church?" and "What is the Christian hope?"

All are welcome. This conversation is facilitated by Fr. Bill.

## Something New

Adult Spiritual Formation has limited book studies during Sunday School for a good reason. Most book studies require regular attendance of 100% or pretty close to it in order for the class material to remain in context and for knowledge and understanding to grow. This means that, especially during the summer months, many people are reluctant to start a book study because they know they will be missing one or two or maybe more classes.

A book study was suggested to the committee and we have investigated it. The book is *The Mockingbird Parables* by Matt Litton. Using *To Kill a Mockingbird* as a core for discussion the book has a unique property. Each chapter is a discussion about a character or event in the story of *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Each chapter is a self-contained story/discussion. The chapters are not long, nor is the style of writing cumbersome to read.

Adult Spiritual Formation has devised a program that we hope will include many people in the Sunday School class. On Wednesday evening May 24 at 7:00 pm we will be showing the movie *To Kill a Mockingbird*, in the Parish Hall. Popcorn and sodas will be available. The plan is to show the movie several times, at different times of the day or maybe on the weekend, whatever works so as many people as want

to may see it at their convenience. We also are encouraging people to get out their copies of *To Kill a Mockingbird* and reread this American classic. The Library has purchased three copies to share. Seeing the movie does NOT mean that you have signed up for the class. Everyone is welcome.

The Adult Spiritual Formation Committee asks that people who wish to attend the Sunday School class see the movie again and/or re-read the book before starting the class.

On Sunday, July 9 at 9:15 a.m. the first chapter of *The Mockingbird Parables* (The Parable of Boo Radley) will be discussed. This will be a facilitated discussion that we hope you will enjoy. We ask that participants in the class obtain, share, or borrow a copy of the book *The Mockingbird Parables* by Matt Litton and have the introduction (which explains the power of parables) and the first chapter read. ## Maranatha

One of the few Aramaic words in the New Testament, *maranatha* means both “Our Lord, has come” and “Come, Lord.” We say maranatha to proclaim that God has come to earth. We say maranatha to affirm our belief in the incarnation. We say maranatha in witness to the on-going ministry of Christ in the world through the church. It is a word befitting a church that has seen Christ and still sees Christ incarnating the world through the church in places where disease and darkness remain. Into our present darkness, against our present darkness, we cry “maranatha.” It is our proclamation of hope. It is our one word gospel in a nutshell. In the Easter season, our Epistle lessons come from the Book of Acts. Reading Acts, one sees that much of the preaching of the very early church focused on maranatha. See, for example, the preaching and ministry of Peter (1:22-35; 3:12-26; 4:8-12; 10:34-43), Stephen (7:2-53), Philip (8:29-35), and Paul (13:16-41; 17:2-3; 17:22-31; 22:3-16). The proclamation of the early church was that the man Jesus, who was killed in Jerusalem, was the messiah, but that after three days, he rose from the dead and by his life and death made atonement for all who would believe. Maranatha!

It is also a word befitting a church in waiting, a church that has seen our Lord come, who knows something of the power of his love, and looks forward to that time when Christ will come again - a time when God will create a new heaven and earth, when wars will cease, when there will be no more crying, and when death will be no more. “Maranatha. Come, Lord Jesus and save your people. Your Kingdom come, your will be done on earth as in heaven.” This maranatha is a cry, a petition, and a pleading that our Lord return

quickly. It is a maranatha that points toward the end of our liturgical year and the Feast of Christ the King. This year, we will hear from the gospel of Matthew. The Lord has returned with his holy angels and sits in judgement of the world, separating the sheep and the goats. How we live as the church in waiting does matter. It has never been the case that all that is required is belief. As James (2:17) writes, “... faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead.” Charitable acts, works of mercy, doing good for another and praying for the well-being of others are all indications of a living faith. The ancient Christian theologian Tertullian (b.160 AD) quoted this pagan view of the early church, “Look,” they say, “how they love one another and how they are ready to die for each other.” Can you imagine nonbelievers saying the same of the church today? Perhaps? We might pause before we next cry “maranatha” and ask ourselves how we are doing.

## Reed Organ Loft Tour, May 16

On May 16, the Arts and Spirituality Ministry is sponsoring a tour of Jerry Taylor's Organ Loft in Young Harris. Since space is limited, tours are being offered at both 11:00a.m. and 2:00p.m.. Jerry's love of history and story-telling abilities, combined with the unusual reed organs, make this an experience you won't want to miss.

Jerry's interest in reed organs began when he was a youngster and discovered his grandmother's old reed organ in "the back room" of her house. The organ offered him so much entertainment on his visits there that he asked for it "when she broke up housekeeping." She told him he could have it if he could get it in working order, and, as Jerry writes in the April edition of The Free Reed: "So began my passion as I took it apart using bread ties to color coordinate connecting pieces and cleaned out years of dust, cobwebs, and neglect....Amazingly, it took on new life as I heard 'the music'." Since

then Jerry's collection has grown to 30+, spanning the time period of reed organ production in the U.S., the oldest being an 1847 lap organ and the newest a World War II era Estey chaplain organ. Jerry opened the Organ Loft in 2007 and it's there that he shares "the music" with others as he plays each organ and tells the stories (in his own unique, delightful way) of how he discovered and shipped "the reeds" over the years and from all over the country.

There is a sign-up sheet for this tour on the Events board in the information hallway. We will carpool from the church at 10:40 and 1:40. Space is limited to 15 for each tour, so sign up early so you won't miss this unique experience.
