


## THE RIGHT REVEREND *Charles Andrew Doyle* IX BISHOP OF TEXAS

Andrew Doyle, ninth Bishop of Texas, describes his six-word autobiography as: "Met Jesus on pilgrimage, still walking." Bishop Doyle received his M.Div. from Virginia Theological Seminary after receiving a fine arts degree from the University of North Texas. Previous to his election in 2008, Bishop Doyle served for five years as Canon to the Ordinary. He also served churches in Temple and College Station, as well as being elected deputy to several General Conventions.



He most recently served on the Structure Committee and is currently president of the Compass Rose Society, a global group of patrons and leaders making a difference in the Anglican Communion.

Bishop Doyle's focus for ministry is service, evangelism and reconciliation, planting 15 new churches and more than 50 new "missional communities" in the next five years. An avid reader and fly fisherman, Bishop Doyle has written several books, often mixing references from pop culture's music and movies with the latest in secular leadership trends in order to reach the broadest spectrum of readers and challenge Episcopalians to move into their communities with the Gospel in word and action. His writings include: *Unabashedly Episcopalian: The Good News of the Episcopal Church*, 2012; *Church: A Generous Community Amplified for the Future*, 2015; *A Generous Community: Being Church In A New Missionary Age*, 2015; *Small Batch: Local, Organic and Sustainable Church*, 2016.

## THE BISHOP'S STAFF - CROZIER

The crozier is a staff carried by a bishop. It is in the shape of a shepherd's crook, and reminds us of Jesus, the Good Shepherd. The crook and staff of the crozier is heavily decorated. The Diocese of Texas' crozier has been handed down to each bishop of Texas since 1891. That crozier has been carried by all 9 bishops of the Diocese of Texas. The word "bishop" means shepherd.

## From Sr. Warden Laura Buckner

Fall is in the air; oh joy! It's my favorite season, in spite of the fact an East Texas fall will never rival the West Virginia & Ohio autumns of my youth. For me, the season of fall brings a quieting of my spirit, a reminder of the cycle of life, a "gathering in" of resources (like squirrels putting up acorns) and a looking ahead to Thanksgiving, Christmas and the end of another year.

At St. Michael & All Angels, we're in a season of gathering in and looking ahead.

We've worked hard this spring and summer to address the physical needs of our property. Have you noticed the accessible restrooms, the ramp providing a covered accessible walkway between the parish hall and the church, the ongoing grounds-keeping work, the bright blue splinter-free fence and upgraded playground, the fresh coat of paint and repairs on the Joshua House, and any other number of repairs and upgrades around the property? It's amazing when you look at the lengthy list I've kept of what's been done thus far this year. One of our visiting priests recently complemented the Vestry on the way SMAA maintains its property. SMAA volunteers did most of that work.

We're working equally hard to meet the needs of our congregation. We have scheduled supply priests for every weekend service through the end of the year to ensure access to the sacraments and provide spiritual support. Haven't we met some wonderful priests this year? We've taken on ministries to meet the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of others; this summer's End of Summer Fling was a good example of our community ministry. Two new endeavors include feeding a large group of children once a month and beginning a college community ministry called Piney Woods Canterbury. Our building facilities serve a number of non-profit groups through the week. SMAA volunteers do most of that work.

But there are also tough realities at SMAA. We've gone a long time without a priest, and we long for that spiritual leadership. We've seen members leave for a variety of reasons; we understand when it happens but we miss those names and faces... they leave holes in our congregation that no one else can fill. And an obvious hardship is the drop in financial giving to the church; no doubt you've seen the reports in the weekly Grapevine and know the donations coming in don't match what was pledged and budgeted for the year.



In my more honest moments, I will admit to struggling with fear and worry for SMAA, and my concerns about our ability to maintain our beloved church. In fact, it's not hard these days to look around and have a lot of concerns...for our church, our community, our nation, our world.... and become overwhelmed with the enormity of the need and the seeming scarcity of resources.

But then, I stop...and I remember. I have a God in whom I trust. **WE HAVE A GOD IN WHOM WE TRUST.**

Our God reminds us in Matthew 6:25-34 (NIV)

"Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?

"And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the pagans run after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

As we were raising our sons, Ron and I always told them "God answers prayer, but He expects you to do your part". I know I speak for your Vestry when I say we appreciate what each of you is doing to support SMAA, for "doing your part." And I can tell you, your Vestry is a dedicated, committed and hard-working team of fellow parishioners who are doing their part...and so much more.

I don't have many answers, but I trust God has SMAA in the palm of His hand. We are a vibrant community of believers. We walk our talk. We give freely of our time and talents; we welcome anyone who comes through our doors and into our lives. We do our part and trust God is doing His, which includes all of SMAA's tomorrows.

May the fall bring a quieting of your spirit. God's got this.

# Meet Us at The Altar!!

What an exciting time in the life of St. Michael and All Angels' Episcopal Church! There are so many current and upcoming opportunities to be involved in Sharing God's Love.

We have joined several local churches in a ministry called "Jesus Loves the Little Children" (see below). St. Michael's has committed to feeding approximately 30 – 50 children on the first Tuesday of each month. Some are foster children, some from single parent homes, some considered under privileged, and some considered to be at or near poverty. Members of St. Michael's provide a warm, well balanced meal followed by praise and worship and a short activity lesson. If you have not yet served these children a meal, there is a blessing just waiting for you! Volunteers are always welcomed and encouraged to become a part of this rewarding ministry.

We have also joined with St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Kilgore to provide and share in a weekly Sunday evening fellowship meal for all college students (see front page and flyers/cards in entryway of church). This will include students from local colleges along with Kilgore College and LeTourneau University. Sunday evenings are limited for most students to receive a good meal as most campus cafeterias are closed. What better way to connect with younger adults than sharing conversation and a meal? Your meal and theirs will be paid for.

The Vestry of St. Michael's is actively seeking our next Shepherd and Priest. Members of our congregation recently completed a Rector Search Survey which was forwarded to our Diocesan contact to be tabulated and reviewed. The top indicators will reflect the characteristics and qualities the congregation of St. Michael's is seeking in our next Rector.



The adult Sunday school class will begin studying and discussing Jesus' parables recorded in the Gospels. This will be a new and creative platform to study and discuss how these parables are exhibited and displayed in our own lives.

The Daughters of the King met briefly in September. We discussed the impact and importance of prayer in our own personal lives. The consensus was our prayers are important and we should continue to lift up our church, its people, and its current and future ministries to God. We normally have two designated Daughters standing in the back of the church during communion to offer prayer for anyone in our congregation. We have so many opportunities right now to pray about! God is listening; He hears our prayers and He will send help and comfort; we just simply need to ask! James 4:2 tells us that "You do not have because you do not ask." We are asking for your help and for you, as a vital part of our congregation, to join us in a time of prayer. We will lift up St. Michael's to God and pray for our ongoing and upcoming ministries. We are asking for the entire congregation to "meet us at the Altar" on the 2nd Sunday of each month for 15 minutes to pray for St. Michael and All Angels'. You can pray silently or pray aloud, however you feel most comfortable. **Fifteen minutes, after church, 2nd Sunday of every month, at the Altar, on our knees, praying to God for St. Michael's Episcopal Church.**

Let's do our part...God is waiting...and listening.





# Adult Sunday School Class Series: The Parables of Jesus

She is a stained glass artist, writer, organic gardener, and caretaker to a 200lb Great Dane named Cyrus. Betsy believes that if you ask any artist about what is important, they will tell you that "light" is their most valuable tool. Before we pick up a brush, pencil, needle, camera, paint, or anything else, we move toward the light which is within and the light which surrounds. As a stained glass artist she thinks about how her work will interact with light and it is that interaction that inspires her work. The best moment for Betsy is when she holds a piece up and lets the sun shine through it. Her work is a celebration of God's first creation.

# Church Cleanup






## Sung Compline Service Sunday, October 9, 8:30pm Trinity Episcopal Church, Downtown Longview
