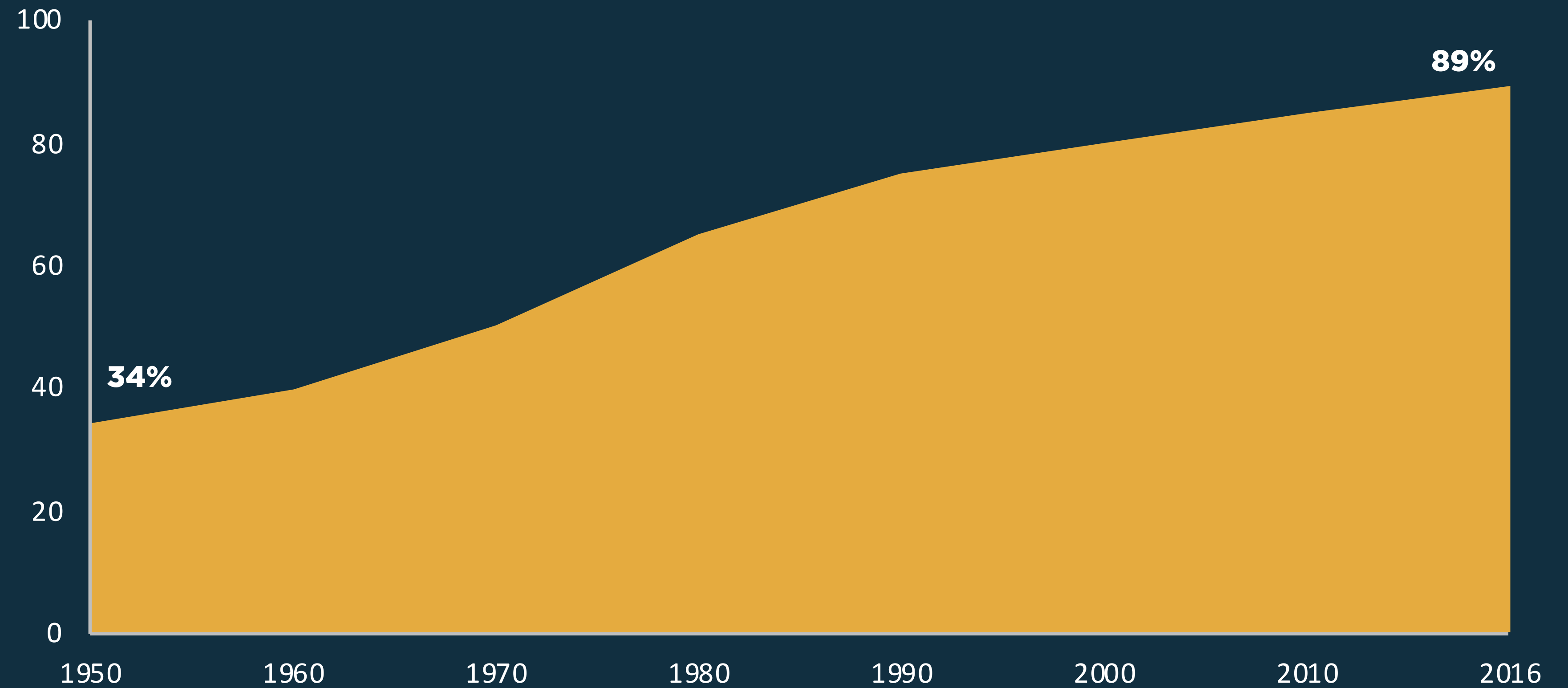

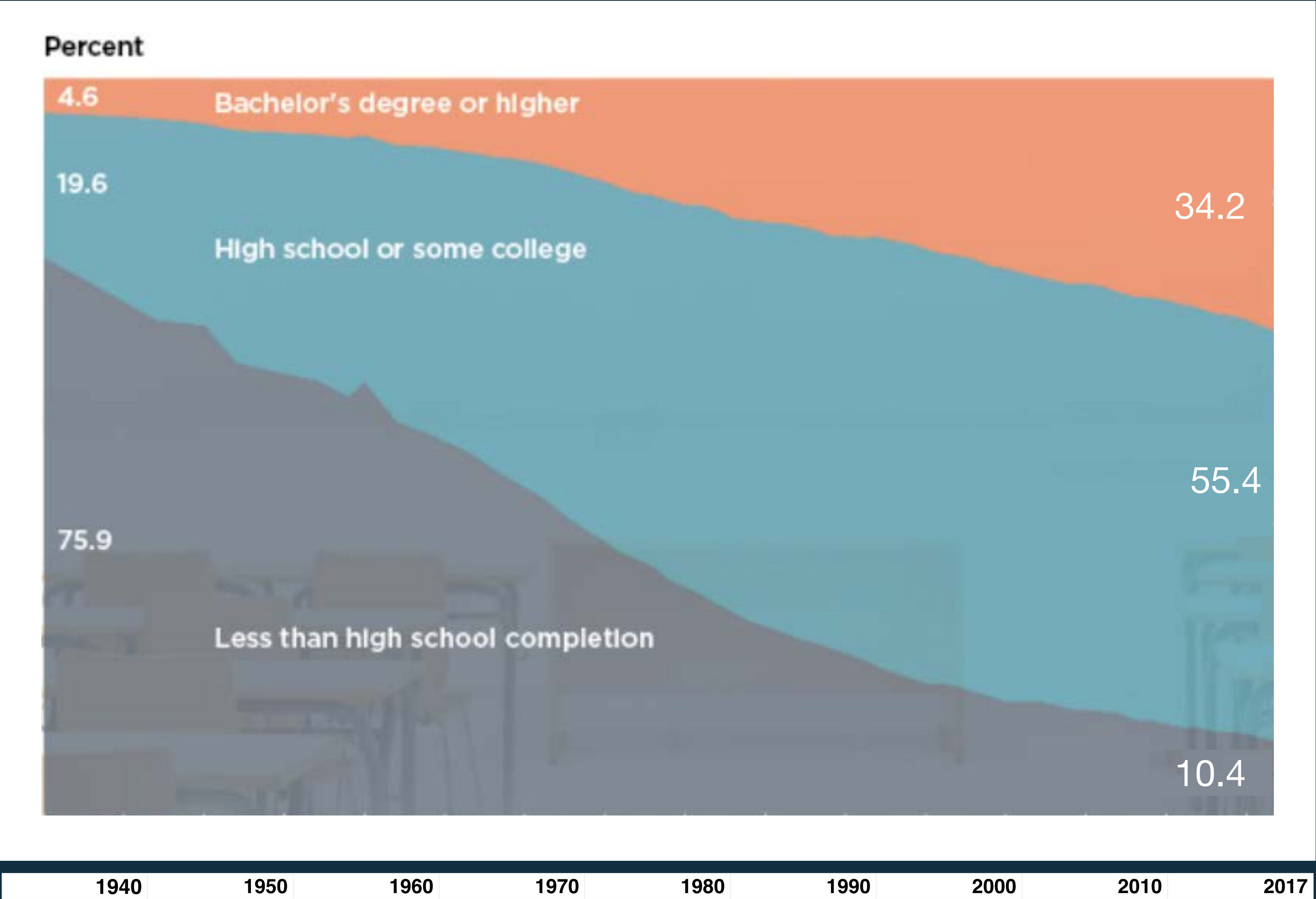

school degree



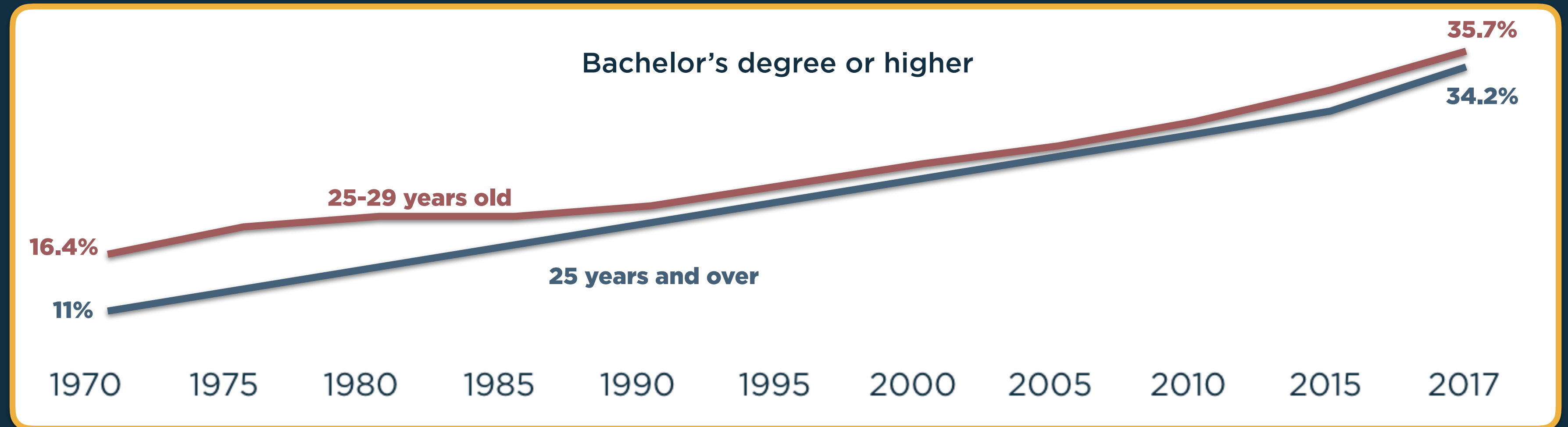
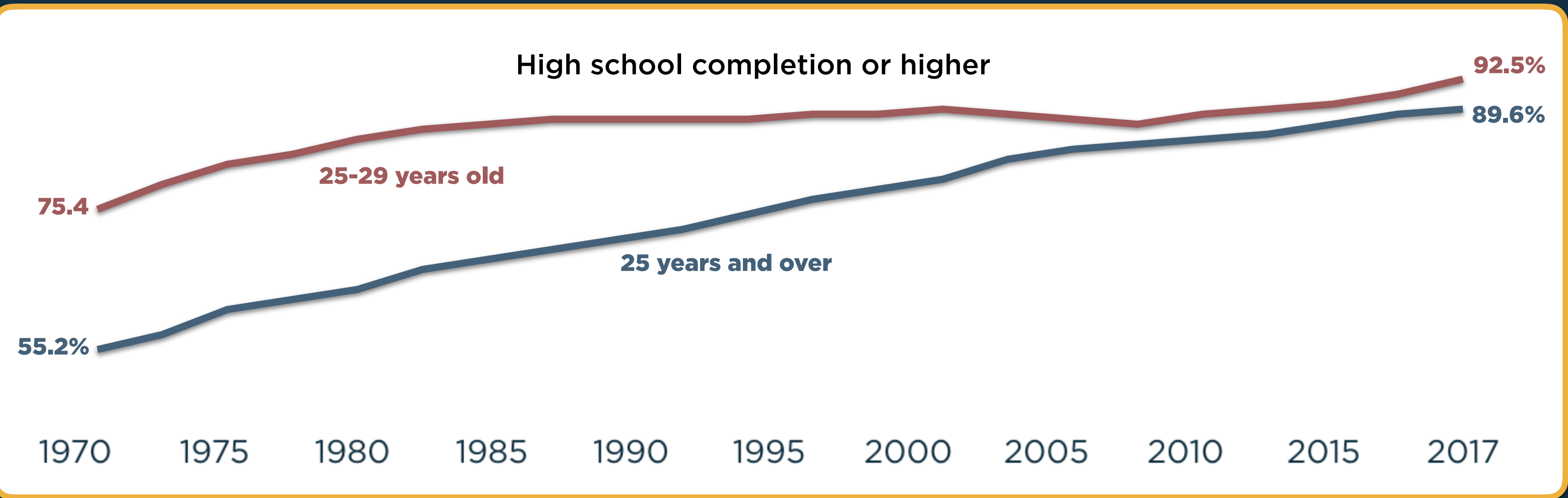
America's Education

Population Age 25 and Over by Educational Attainment



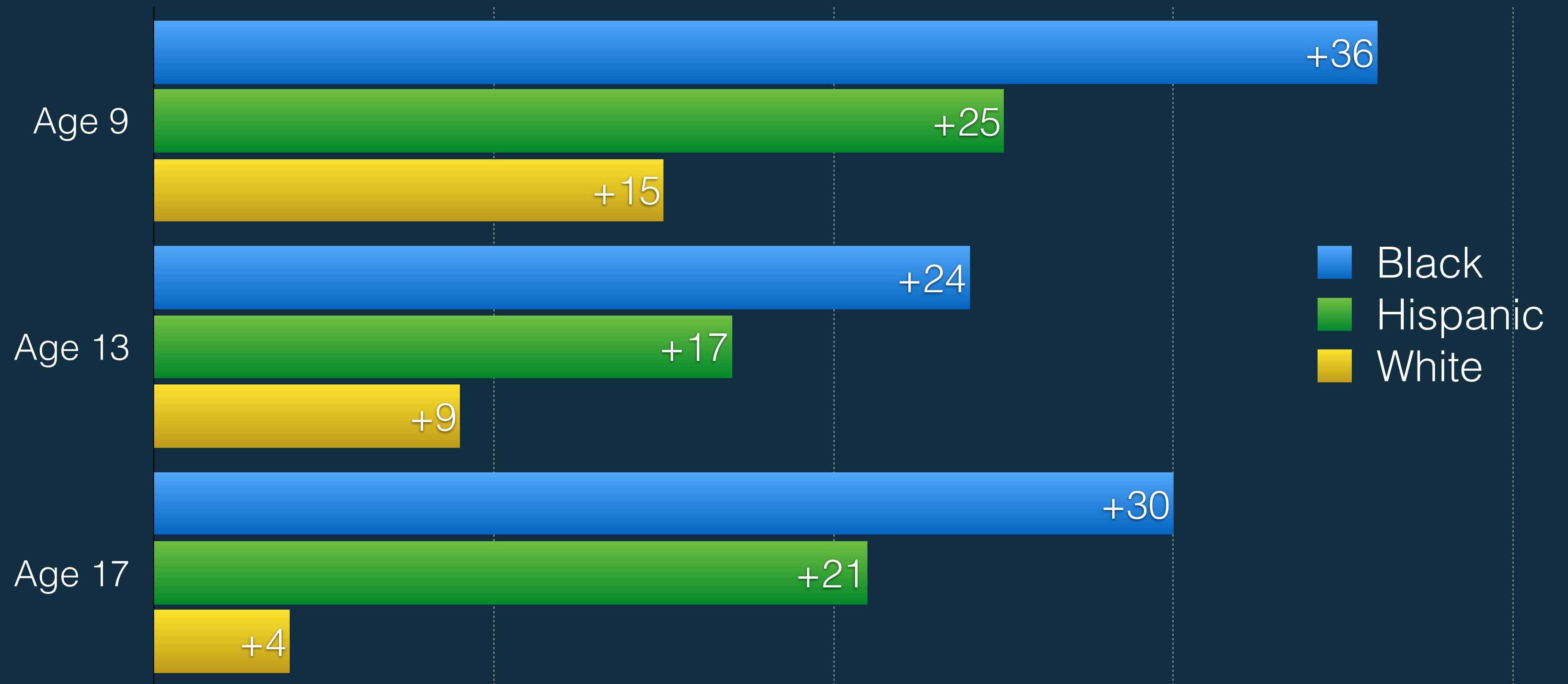

For every major racial and ethnic group in the U.S. student achievement is higher today than it was in the 1970's.

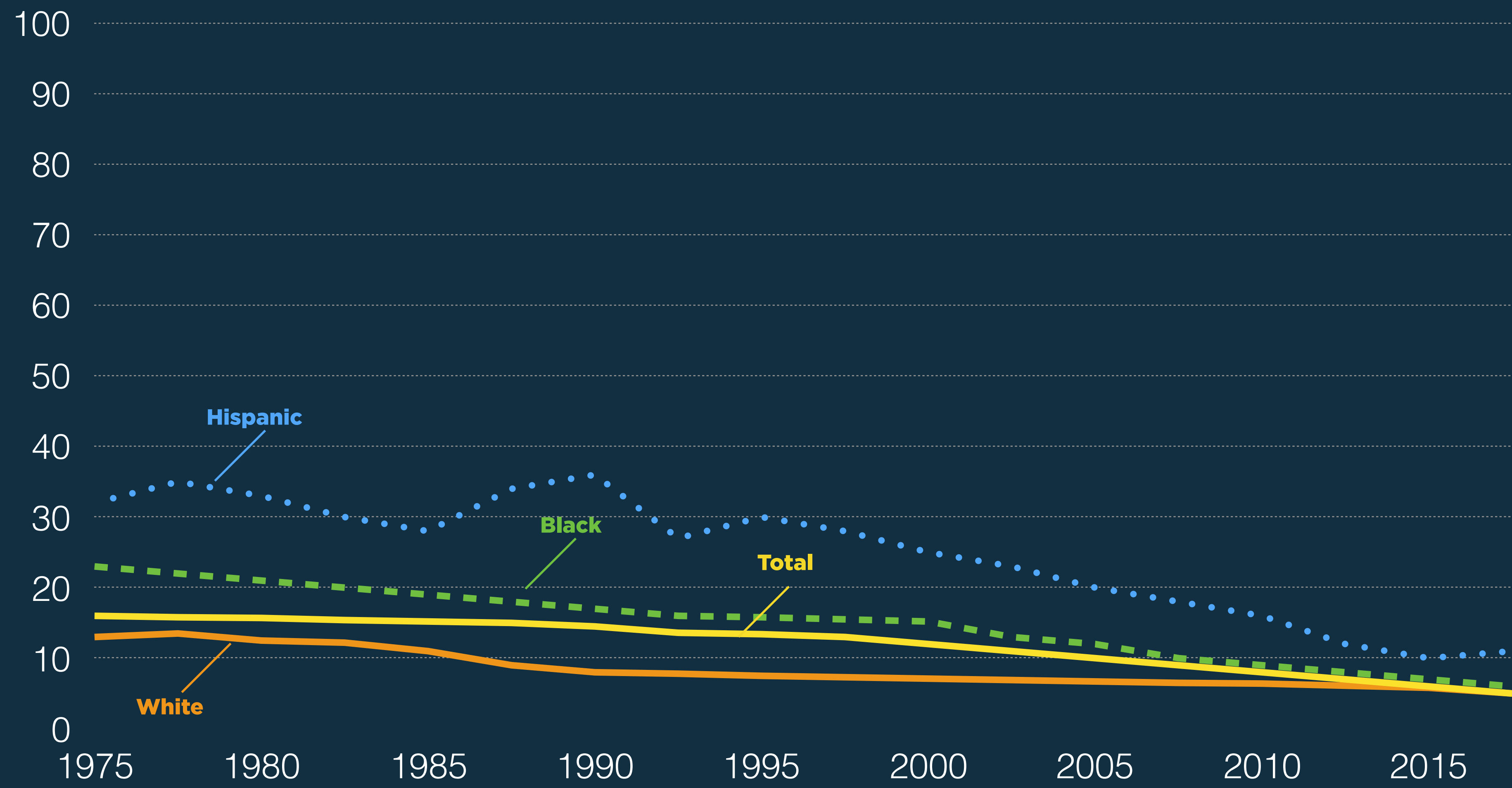
Reading Changes in NAEP scores by age, 1971-2012*

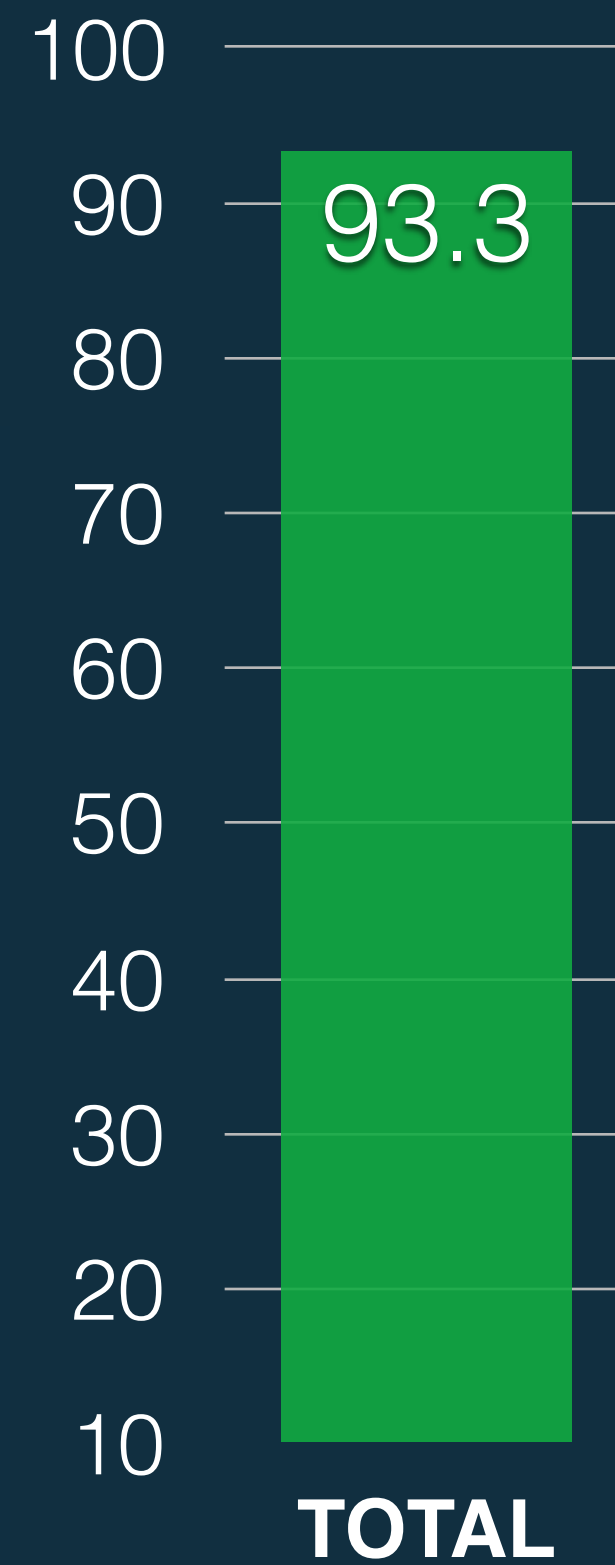
Percentage of high school dropouts among persons 16 through 24 years old (status drop out rate), by race/ethnicity October 1977 through 2017



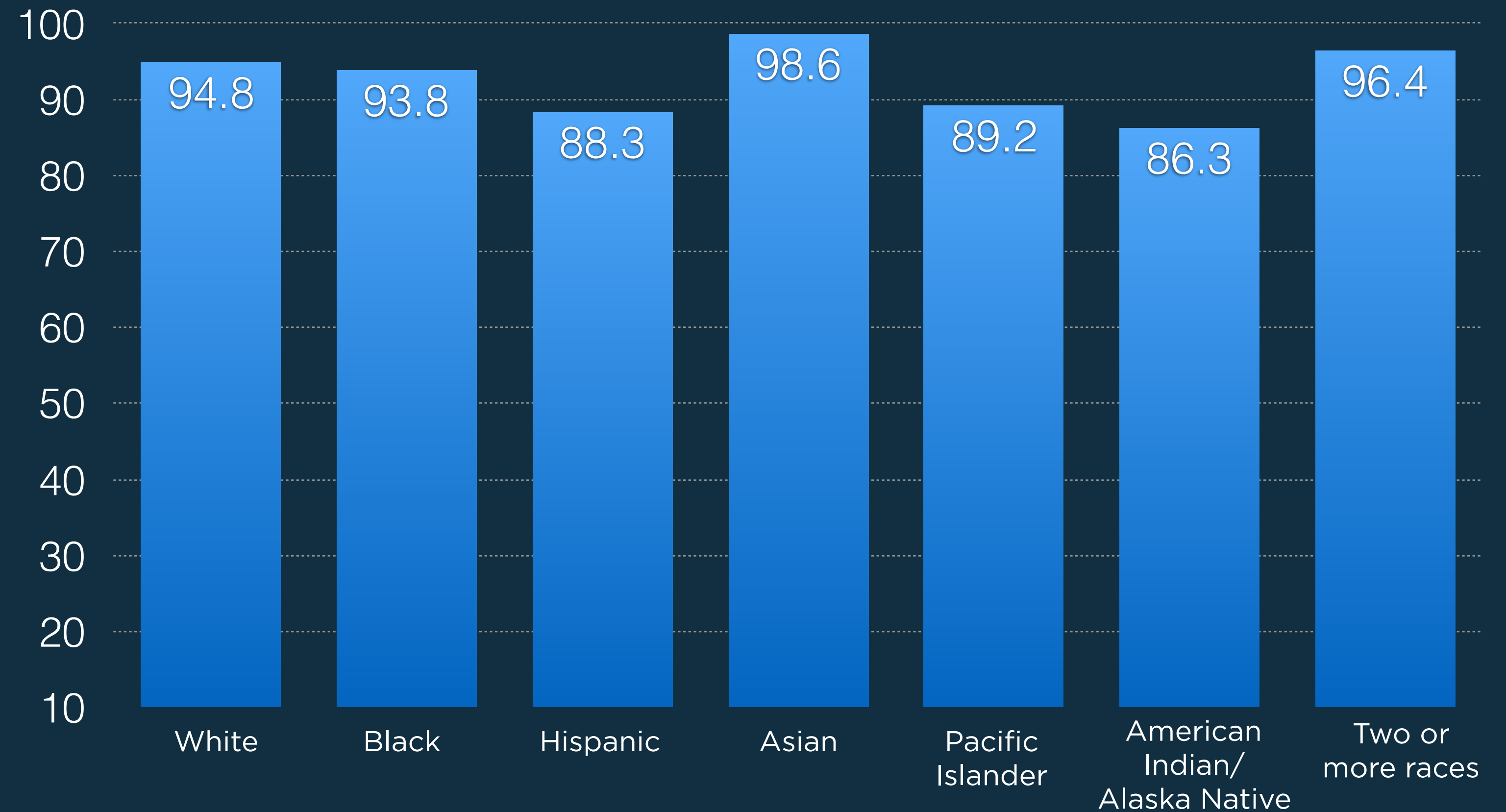

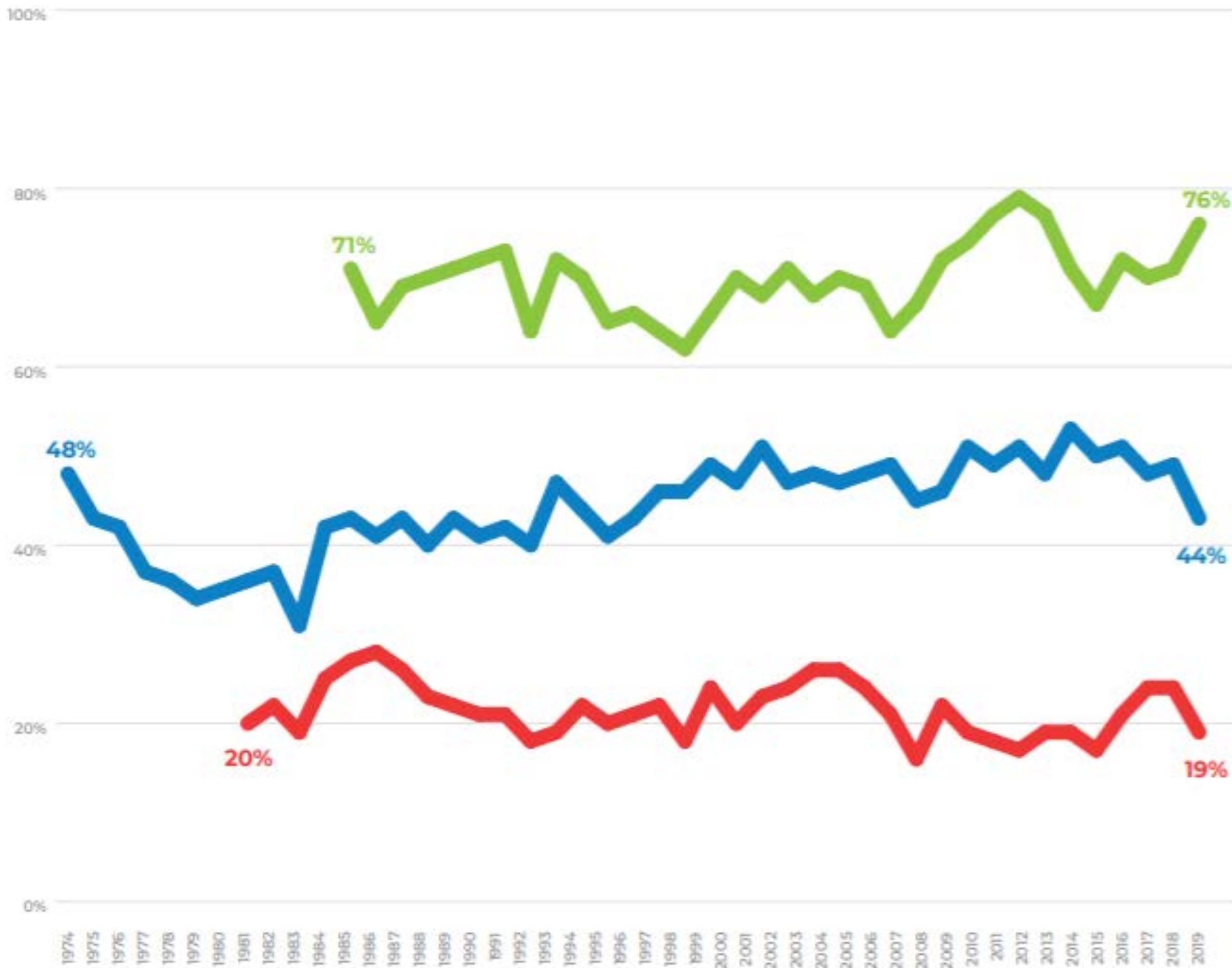

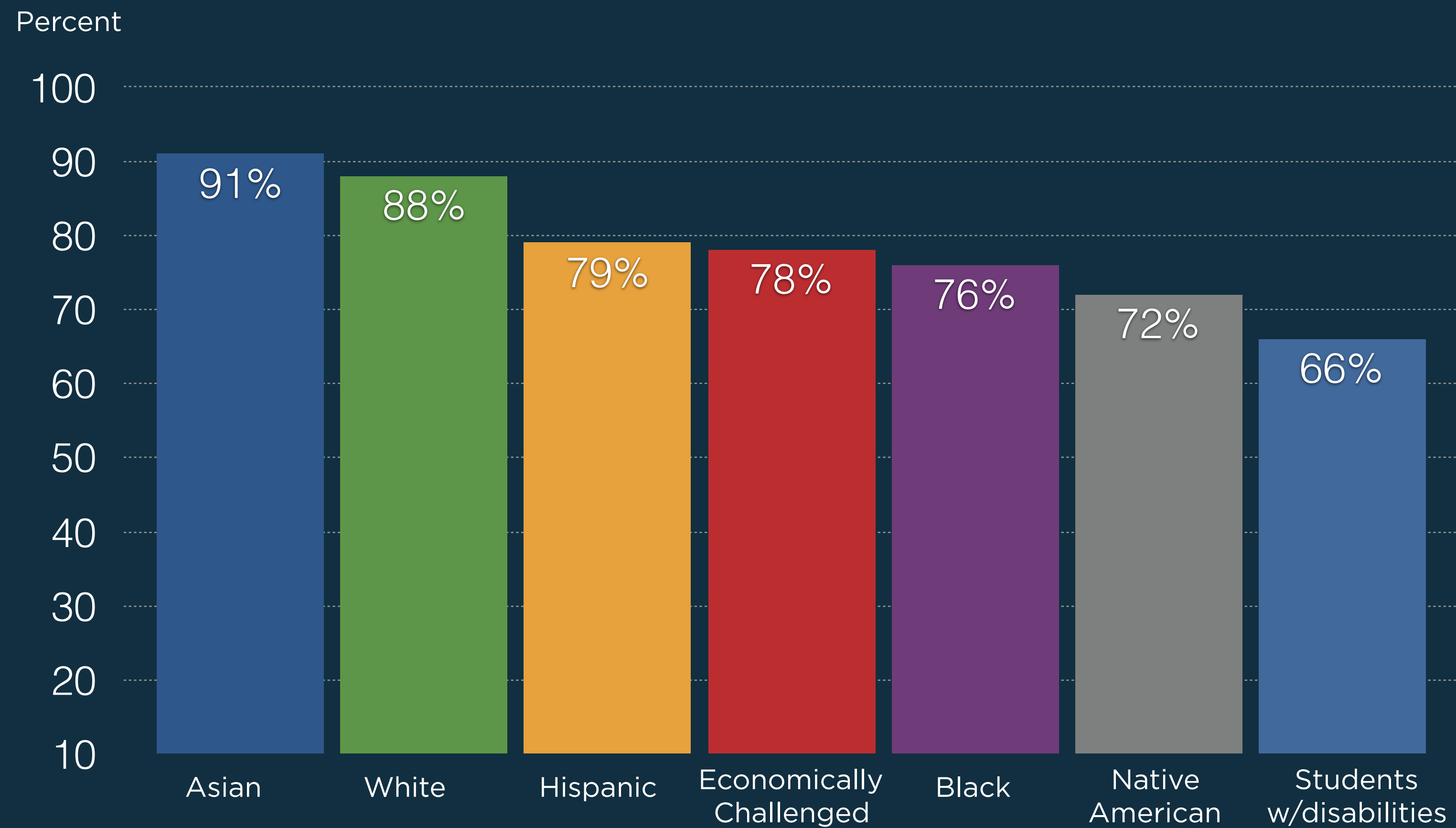

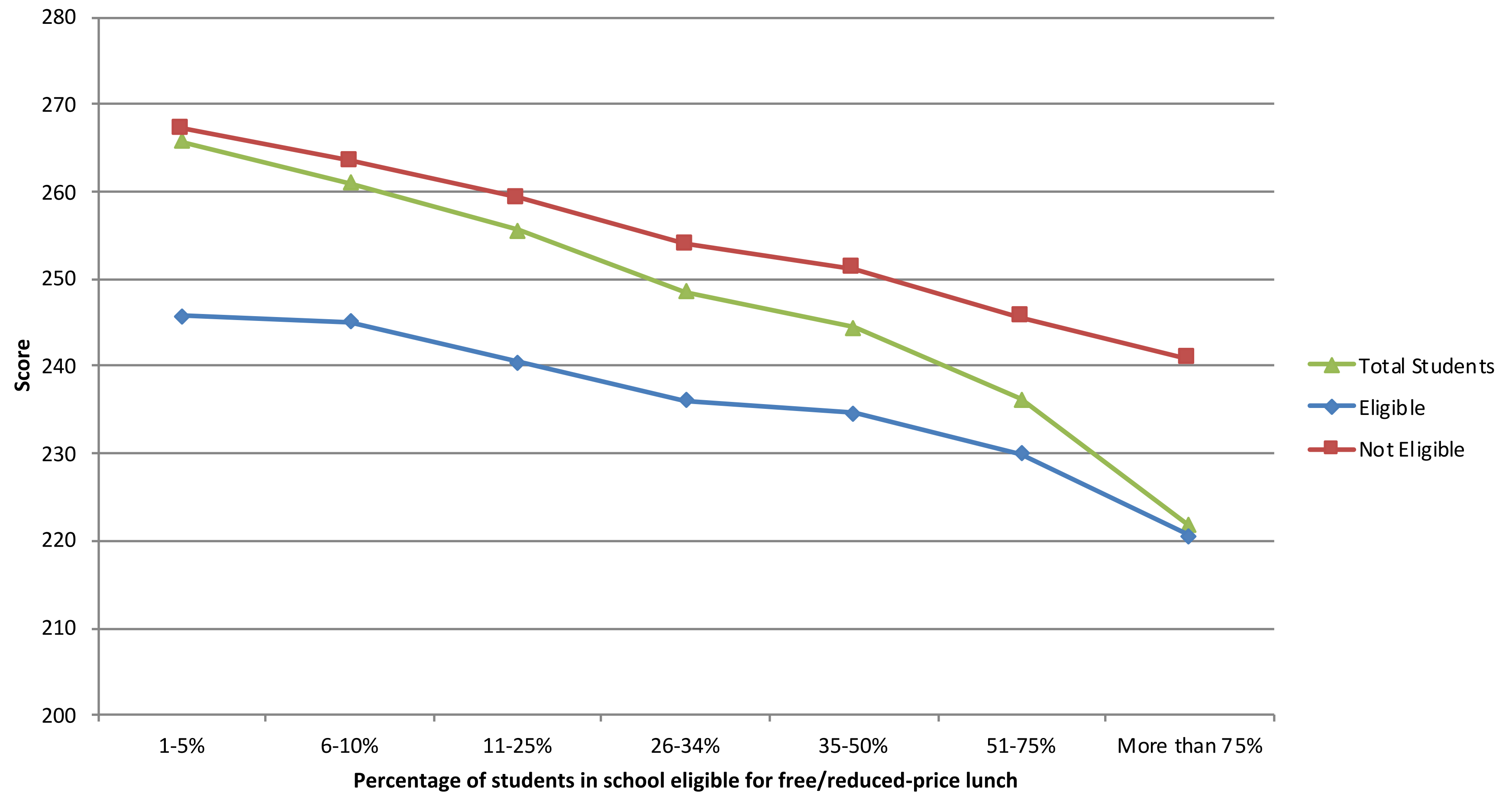
Estimated On-Time

2012-2013



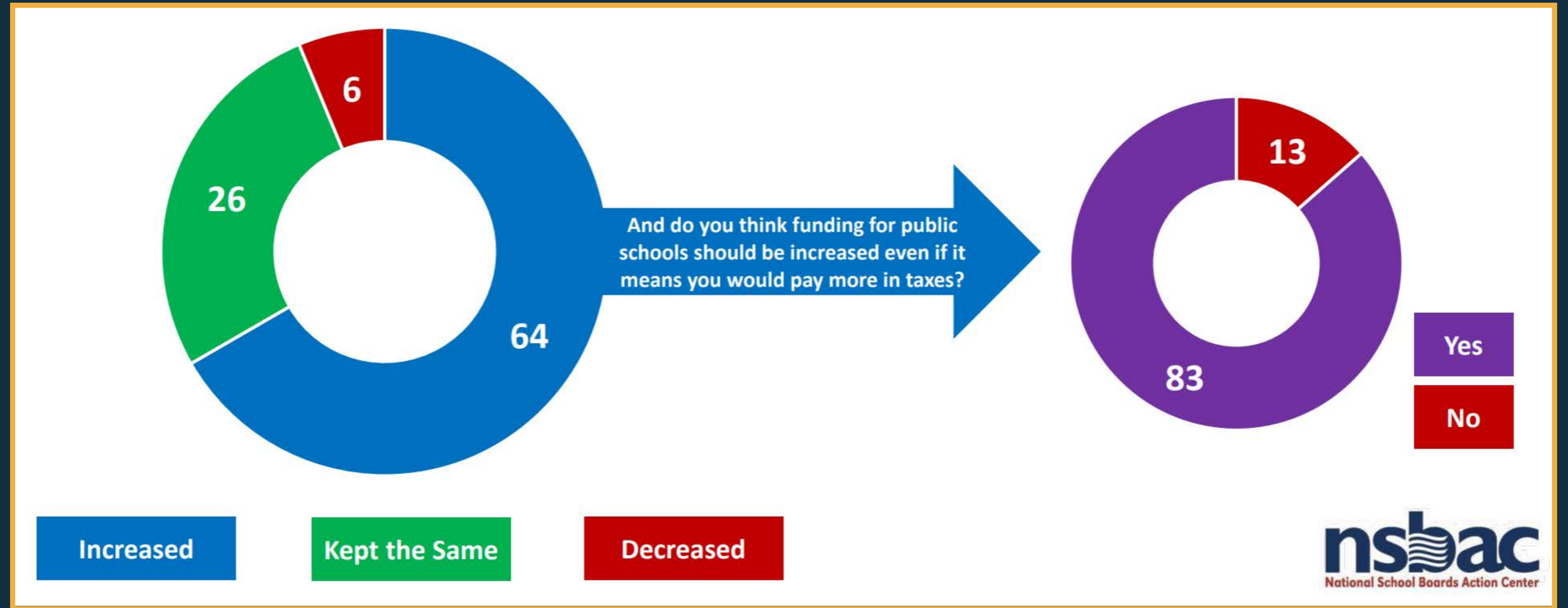

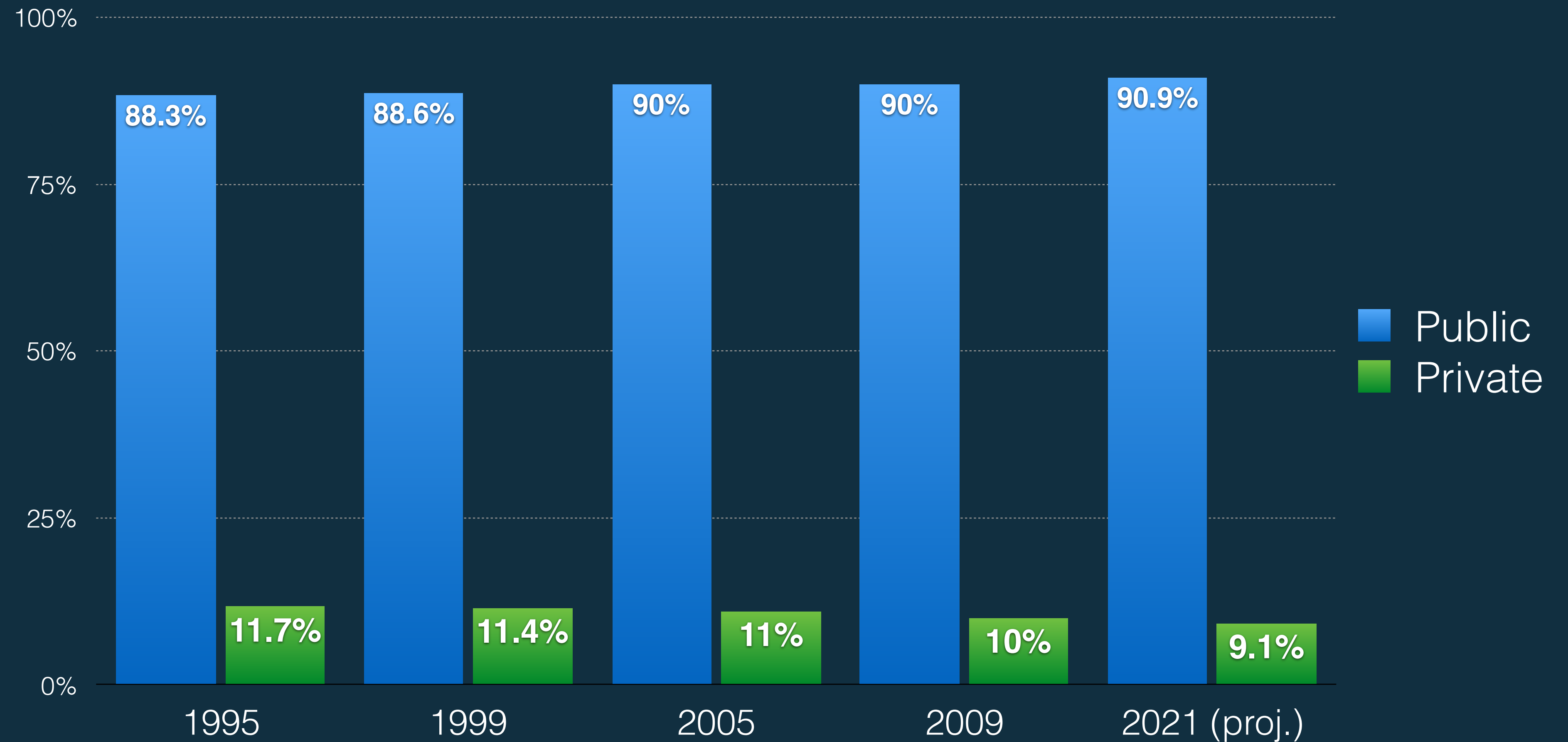

Generally speaking, do you think funding for public schools should be increased, kept at the same level, or decreased?

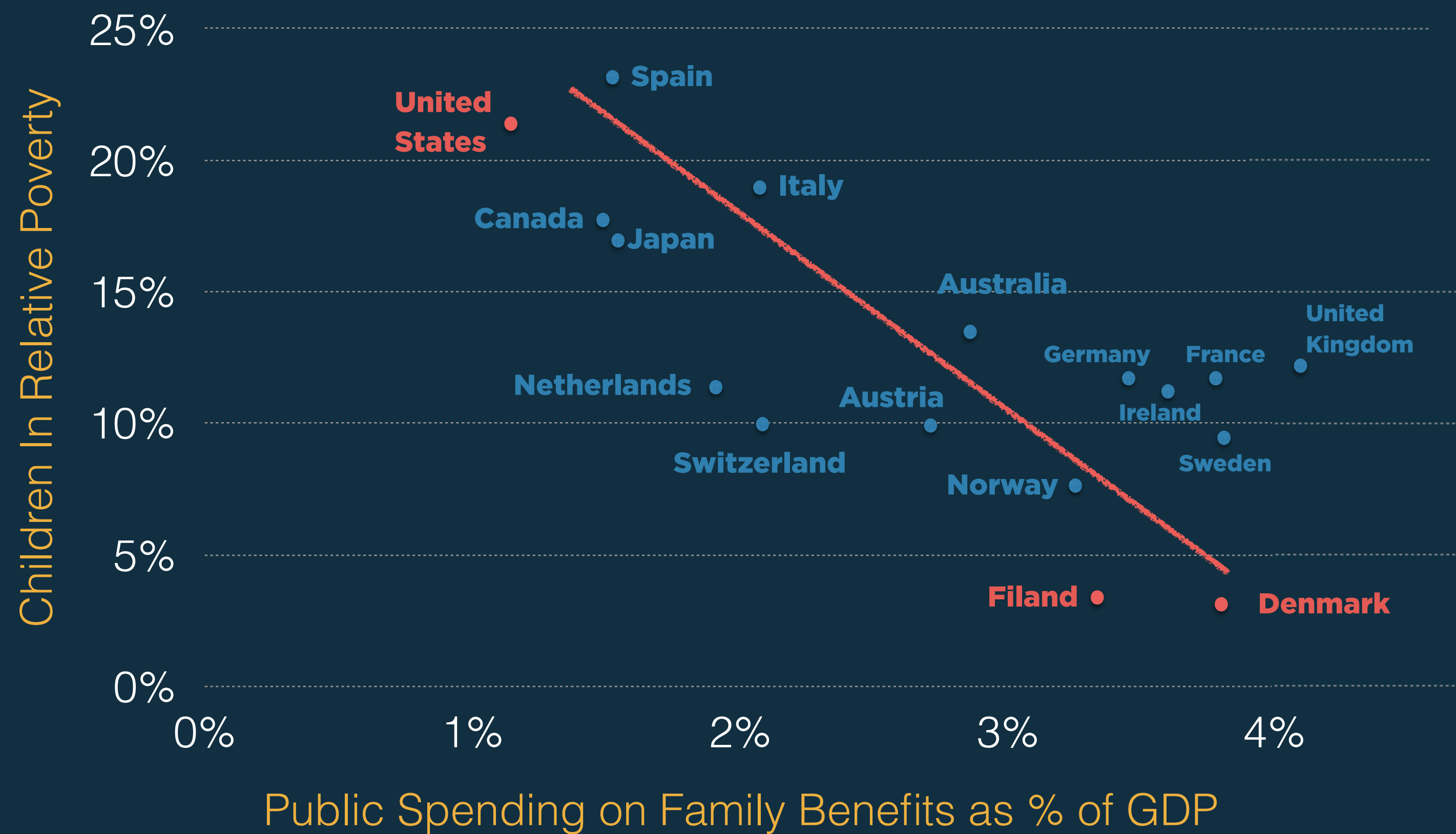


Perhaps even more surprisingly, the private school share of total enrollments has decreased over the past 15 years, from about 12 percent to 10 percent. This trend seems unlikely to reverse. The U.S. Department of Education projects that in 2021, private schools will enroll about 9 percent of preK-12 students, while public schools will enroll 91 percent.



Getting to the next level will require policy makers to address out-of-school factors influencing achievement, including high levels of student poverty and meager support for families.
