Are We Listening?

"When the Lord restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dream." –

On April 20, the Rev. David Jimenez-Cardenas (Memorial UMC, Elizabeth River District) shared a message at the VAUMC chapel service titled "On Dreaming with Christ". He invited us to dream with God about our futures and to claim "the power a work within us [that is] able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20). It reminded me o how God is speaking to us and to our churches, even today, and as we read in the Book of Revelation, I believe God is writing a letter to each of our churches. We have a responsibility, a duty to respond to hear what God may be saying to our churches. We are called to discern what the letter might be saying to us today and what our faithful response should be.

No one can deny that we are living in challenging times. Reading the letters to the churches found in Revelation we see that Christians in the first century were also very challenged. The churches in Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamum, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia and Laodicea were facing a myriad of problems. Jesus is speaking to them and saying "I love you just as you are but I love you too much to leave you where you are."

Churches move from growth to health to maintenance, preservation and life support. It is possible to "start over"; however, it requires an honest evaluation of where we are and intentionally investing in the future. Through the letters in Revelation, God spoke to the early churches. God speaks today as well. Are we listening?

The Beaverdam and Rouzie's are exploring the possibility of providing gift certificates to the food truck in welcome baskets to people who move into the area as a way to welcome them to the community. This is a win / win for our community. A business is growing, and relationships are being built in our community and in our church.
