## From our Rector

"It is I, Jesus, who sent my angel to you with this testimony for the churches. I am the root and the descendant of David, the bright morning star." The Spirit and the bride say, "Come." And let everyone who hears say, "Come." And let everyone who is thirsty come. Let anyone who wishes take the water of life as a gift. *Revelation 22:16-17*

Advent is here. It is a season of invitation and preparation. God's invitation is the last word of the Bible is for us all to 'come' and taste the water of life. It is a free gift, paid for by the Son, Jesus. He is the "bright morning star" whose light overcomes the darkness of the world. *There is a train a'comin. We don't need a ticket, ... we just need to get on board.* (... at least according to the 60's gospel song).

We usually need to do some "course-corrections" so we can grab the train as it leaves the station. Literally, "repent" means to turn. If my back is to the tracks, I'll have a hard time grabbing the handles of the train. So, getting on board means I get ready, but we don't even have to jump. If I just reach out, the conductor will grab and pull me up. As my faith develops, I will hear the knock, open the door and Christ will come in. The Living Water and the fruit covering the Tree of Life will satisfy my eternal hunger. God's love takes root and grows.

Here comes Advent with all its beauty and challenge. We celebrate 3 'comings' in these four weeks. We remember the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. We anticipate Christ's second coming at the last day. And most importantly, we pray for Christ to be born now in our own hearts to guide and strengthen us for this world. I love the hymns, readings, candles in the wreaths, simple greenery instead of flowers, and sense of reflection. It all provides a sharp contrast to the run, run, run outside (or in the shopping mall). I am inspired by the daily emails that remind me of ways to be an Advent person. The annual handbell concert and Longest Night service change my pace, making me slow down. When I participate fully in Advent, my heart and soul are so much more ready to celebrate Christmas. I invite you to accept God's invitation... Enter into this living relationship with God who first loved you and accept God's gift.

### Lessons and Carols

One of our beautiful traditions will be held Dec 2 at 10:30. Advent Lessons and Carols is based upon the liturgy of King's College, Cambridge. We will have 5 Scripture lessons separated by choir anthems and congregational hymns. The lessons tell the Biblical story of

the Fall and God's loving response through the words of the prophets. We will conclude with Holy Eucharist. (At the same hour, St. Nicholas will be visiting the Gathering.)

### Worship - making it personal

We will make a small change in our worship that I'd like to explain. While our group was in English churches on pilgrimage, we noticed that unlike here, the entire congregation reads the opening prayer in unison. It is known as the "Collect for Purity." In the prayer we ask God, who knows us inside and out, to cleanse "the thoughts of our hearts" so we can love God and "worthily magnify your holy Name." In this first prayer of the worship, we are asking for the Holy Spirit to get us ready and prepared to encounter the living God. Most scholars have said that like the English Church, we should be saying it in unison because it is truly a prayer for the whole congregation to get ready for worship. For Advent through Epiphany seasons, we are going to read it in unison in all services (*if your clergy remember*). In Lent, we will evaluate. I think you will find it helpful.

### Stewardship

We are doing well for this point in the schedule. We had very good response to our "Celebration of Ministry" in September. More people found ministries for their time and talent. Financial pledges are doing well with many new members submitting their pledge for next year. About a dozen folks have been meeting in a new series of discussions about "Ministry of the Baptized" coming to understand why and how God invites us ALL to use our gifts and talents as leaders in the Church. Weekly one-minute stewardship videos have helped people understand the impact of ODEC in many different areas of life. If you have questions about getting involved with your talents or making a financial pledge, give us a call. If you haven't yet submitted your pledge, please get it in. We make staffing and budget decisions based upon what you tell us we can count on for the next year.

### Building Progress and Donations

The work in the kitchen is exciting! *Lots happening!* Read about it on page 5. If you are new, and want to know more about the program, or are now able to make a pledge or donation to the Building Campaign, this is a very important time. Call the office or talk with me. We have a team of folks who are able to help you help our part of God's dreams for the long-term mission of ODEC become reality. If you find it advantageous to make some end of the year charitable gifts for tax purposes, ODEC is a most worthy recipient.



## From our Assistant Rector

My friends,

Two weeks ago I went to a Gathering of Leaders conference at Camp Allen, in the Diocese of Texas. The conference was a group of Episcopal priests, who came together to share new ideas and ways to build and engage the church. The theme for this year was Racial Reconciliation, and though the topic is a hard one, the days spent there were *invigorating*. But one thing in particular came up for me constantly: the Mission of the Holy Spirit.

Our parish has spent some time with racial reconciliation, in various forms and capacities, over the past year and a half. And yet, I feel - and hear from many of you - that it still seems as though we aren't doing enough. How can we bridge this gap? How can we do more to be aware of our (our = white people) privilege, even if that privilege is unintended? How can we make a change, a difference?

We have the answer *right in front of us*. We go there, two Sundays a month to serve food, one Sunday a month to celebrate Holy Eucharist. The Mission of the Holy Spirit, 2:30pm every Sunday (for us, the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the month in particular for H.E.). There you'll find an incredible group of energetic, passionate, faithful Christians who are hungry for Christ, who sing their hearts out, who have so much to give, and who are all, with little exception, black.

My heart hurt at this conference, because suddenly I realized that I have been with them almost every month for three years, and I know the names of maybe 4 of them. I sit beside the altar, separate from the congregation. I smile, I say hello, maybe share a few words, but my time there is fleeting and I've done little to engage in real relationships. What a loss, for me. To not have been creating friendships with people whom I so greatly admire, to not be taking advantage of this opportunity to do what I *say* I want to do - be in communion with people who don't look like me, and share our stories.

I started, last Sunday, to make some changes myself. I sat in the congregation with them, got there a few minutes early, laughed and talked, and then had an

## From our Youth Minister

It's the season of Advent once again, and it is without a doubt my favorite time in the church calendar. I always get so caught up in the wonderful anticipation of knowing that something very special is about to happen. When I stop to consider that the phrase "God incarnate" means "God in the flesh," that "Emmanuel" means "God with us," I am always amazed.

Why do we suppose Jesus was brought into the world as a baby, and not as a mighty ruler? What is the design behind God showing intense vulnerability like this? Although Jesus was indeed God incarnate, he was also fully and utterly human. This means that in his physical form, Jesus was no different from any other infant. He was fragile and small and was not immune from danger or sickness. He was not a baby made of steel. He even nearly became the victim of a genocide, and his parents had to flee to Egypt to protect him. Perhaps one reason Jesus came as an infant was so God could show us what true dependence on Him looks like. As a baby, Jesus was completely dependent on his parents, but also on God, to sustain him and preserve his life.

As I write this, I'm very close to my due date - by the time Bell Ringer is mailed out, I may very well have a baby girl at home with me! (Unless she takes a while... fingers crossed she shows up sooner than that.) The fact that she will be totally and completely dependent on me sometimes bowls me over. I am also amazed by the fact that she doesn't just belong to me - she is God's and was formed and created by Him. She is totally dependent on Him, even though she won't realize it yet. Even in her vulnerable, tiny little state, the God of all creation pays special attention to her. God's heart is for those in need, the children, the weak, the vulnerable, the fragile. He cares most for the least of these, and the concerns of the powerful, the strong, and the rich will always take a backseat. Why? I believe it is to model for us how we ought to live. If we don't follow the lead of Jesus and fight for the most vulnerable, who will?

As we contemplate Advent, I pray that we may all take time to consider this. May we open our eyes to how upside-down and wonderful is it that our all-powerful God has shown us beauty in being vulnerable, so we have no choice but to be as dependent on God as a newborn child, and to care for others as He would.

## BUILDING PLAN UPDATE

### PROGRESS! (and in time for Oyster Roast!)

Many of you noticed major improvements in our kitchen. Scott Crumley and his merry band of workers and subcontractors were able to get the majority of the kitchen renovation new equipment installed and running before the Oyster Roast. It was miraculous to have it completed on time. The new walk-in refrigerator/freezer, the larger capacity ice maker and convection ovens were invaluable additions.

The project would not have been successful without Scott's tenacious work and oversight, Greg Burroughs for his knowledge and contacts, AND the coordination (and hands-on work) of Betsy Morris. She credits a large team for help, especially with logistics for the clean-out of the pantry including: Bill Waide, Bruce Woodhouse, Keren and Jim Pernini, Ben Perry, Zachery Bowles, Hayden Bowles, Steve Kamperschroer, Dave Wilkinson, and Gretchen Hood; plus Tony Putzig, Betts Werbiskis, and the entire Oyster Roast and Kitchen Design Teams. Betsy knows there were others, so please don't feel slighted! The rest of the kitchen redesign work will be done over the course of the next two months, trying to work around our many events and outreach meal prep.

Major thanks to all! A full report after all the work is completed will include pictures and a listing of our kitchen design team. But nothing beats a personal tour and inspection, so do your own walk-about.

### City Review of the Site Plan

We received the second round of review comments on our Site Plan for the building project from the City in mid-November. These appear to mostly be clarifications, though some often develop into more serious questions. The architect and engineers are addressing them and expect to resubmit the updated Site Plan soon. We must have approval of the Site Plan from the City before we can begin construction.

In the meantime, the architect (Ionic) and your Building Commission continue to refine the project design, while the construction company (Hoy) is collecting budget estimates from multiple subcontractors and developing some roof options for our review. We are finally getting enough definition of costs to help us see areas needing

another look and to begin identifying how much we can tackle in this phase of the Master Plan. We are moving from dreams into practicality.

### The Capital Campaign Continues

As such, this a perfect time to thank everyone who has pledged and contributed over the last three years of the Build Capital Campaign. For those of you that are new to Old Donation, welcome! If you have found a ministry or activity to join, you know that we need more space!!!! And, perhaps you have attended one of Father Bob's presentations on the building project. To date, we have


- Renovated the entire Day School wing and put on new roof.

- We are in the process of renovating the kitchen



Now is your chance! We're not talking revolutionary stuff here, friends. Just attending church together. Once a month. And we'll see what happens from there.

## Treasurer's Notes...

### 2018 Charitable Deductions

For those who so generously support Old Donation Episcopal Church with their monetary contributions, please be aware that donors must deliver checks **on or before Monday, December 31, 2018** in order to claim a charitable deduction for 2018. According to IRS policy, checks that arrive to the church on or after Tuesday, 1 January, 2019 will not qualify for a deduction in 2018, even if the check is past-dated to 2018, or was actually written in 2018. However, under the so called "mailbox exception," checks that are written, mailed **and postmarked** in 2018 will be deductible in 2018 even if the church does not receive them until 2019.

Therefore, to ensure you receive the proper credit for a 2018 contribution on your end-of-year statement, please ensure checks are placed in the Sunday, December 30, 2018 offering, or mailed **and postmarked** by December 31, 2018. Your help in this matter will be appreciated.


