From the Rector

New life! Spring, not Fall, is usually when we talk about new life. But today, new life is on my mind. This afternoon, Charles Garcia Randall entered our world, becoming my 5th grandchild, and first grandson. Born to



our son, Greg and his beautiful wife, Catalina (Cata for short), “Charlie” brings joy anew for Chris and me. “All the hopes and dreams of all the years” are always present in a new baby. Carl Sandburg

wrote that “a baby is God’s opinion that the world should go on.” I am personally proud and pleased that Greg and Cata will experience all the joys of parenthood. I am also more than hopeful that Charlie has been born “for a time such as this.” As with all these young children we have at ODEC, and with each one of us, God can write new stories of life, love, and hope... in us and through us.

New life... is so appropriate for our parish as well. Last month we began the ‘program year’ for Sunday school and regular teaching as well as our Day School sessions. Sundays are busy with 4 (some weeks 5) worship services, 3 adult education classes, 6 children and youth classes, plus two Youth Group gatherings. Our choir has had some new life also with several members joining them. Last Sunday, one of our stalwarts, Meredith Guzman, was accompanied by a new member, Jenn Turner Rennekamp on flute, for the most beautiful rendition of “Pie Jesu” that I’ve heard. Both were pitch perfect. Worship was made more beautiful thanks to their gift. The Saturday night prior was FULL of life as you packed Tucker Hall for a kick-off party for the capital campaign, “Faithfully Preserving our Heritage, Building our Future.” It was a WOW night. So much new life.

Confirmation

In October, the beat goes on. When Bishop David Jones visits October 16 at the 10:30 service, we will confirm a large class of youth and adults. This new life begins with new commitments to be God’s people in the world. The dozen youth who participated in J2A, plus others who weren’t able will be confirmed. We will have a number of adults who have prepared in one of the classes we offered in the past couple years. Some will be Confirmed. Others

will be received from other traditions, if they have previously made an adult affirmation of faith in Christ. Some will be ‘re-affirming’ their prior vows. If you have a desire to be included, or questions, please speak now with one of the priests.

That same J2A (Journey to Adulthood) class will host their “Stockholder Supper” that very evening. Those of you who generously contributed by buying stock certificates for this pilgrimage will be treated to a traditional Irish meal. Our youth will provide short descriptions of how God was evident in their time in Ireland with a marvelous display of pictures.

Old and New

Even what is OLD, is NEW. October 9, we will celebrate 100 years of worship in the old historic church since the fire and reconstruction. In 1916, the 1736 Church building was reconsecrated and on Oct 11 a new cornerstone was laid. Our parish history is full of death and resurrection. Read page 9 for details of what we are doing to remember and celebrate.

Capital Campaign

As noted above, we had a joyful kickoff party September 17. There were testimonies and encouragement and good food in the festive room. Great thanks to Laura Spink and Laura Horvath who co-chaired, and their super team. The night could not have been better. Already we have visited 48 families (12% of the congregation). 43 have pledged and others are praying and figuring what they can do. Some made immediate gifts. Others extend for 2 to 5 years. There is a spirit of joy and excitement as we attempt to assure we have the infrastructure to support our mission and ministry. The beauty is that it changes nothing about our historic church and the additions that are planned fit so well that they look like they were always part of this place.

As of today, your pledges (43) and what we had already received put our Building Fund at \$1,719,300! I hope you will jump on board with whatever you are able to contribute. I pray you are already doing your reflection about what kind of sacrificial offering you might be able and willing to make. ODEC is strong because so many of us are ‘all-in’ - each doing our own part.

From our Assistant Rector

We are a liturgical church, the Episcopal Church. What does that mean, exactly? Well, for us today, in a world where there are “liturgical churches” and “non-liturgical churches” it means that we have a set order and rhythm to our worship.

Our bodies were created for liturgy. We thrive on routine, on patterns, we form habits - good and bad - simply by repeating something a few times. And so it makes logical sense that our worship would follow a liturgical path. We are literally training our bodies to praise God, and through our actions week in and week out, our bodies lead our souls and our souls lead our bodies.

Think about the routines you have, the habits you’ve formed. They say something about you, they shape your life, they define you. If corporate worship, Eucharistic liturgy, becomes your routine and habit, it follows then that such a thing will inevitably influence your life.

I see that in Levi, my three year old, in the most beautiful way. He was born going to church, born amidst the liturgy and the words and the rhythms of worship. He came with me to all sorts of services through seminary and it has become a part of who he is. And he loves it.

Most Wednesday evenings, Levi accompanies me to the service when I’m celebrating, and has been welcomed by those in attendance as part of the congregation (for that I offer exceeding thanks). He loves to stand next to me at the altar, and takes his turn giving the bread to the person beside him in the circle when all gather around the table. This past Wednesday, he wanted to stand in front of me, right at the center of the altar. And as I was saying the Eucharistic prayer, “On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread...” his little voice joined mine and he recited all the words, words he doesn’t fully know the meaning of, right along with me.

That is what our liturgy does for us. It teaches us how to be in this world, before we can even fully understand it. And that is precisely why I believe in the importance of having children worship with us, as soon as they’re able, even if it means suffering some noise and distraction. Because they are being formed and raised in all that they do, and worship *should* be a part of that. What we immerse ourselves in makes us who we are. So why not immerse ourselves, collectively with no restrictions, in worship and see what we can become?

Do you know that Old Donation feeds from 120 - 130 hungry children, women and men on the first and second Sundays of each month? Plus, we feed an additional 30-60 more on the fourth Sunday of the month for the Mission of the Holy Spirit? For the two "Norfolk street feedings" food is purchased by ODEC members, prepared in our parish kitchen, typically on Saturdays, and transported to the Martin Luther King, Jr. Park in Norfolk at Church Street and Brambleton Ave. The hot entrées are served with joy to people who are thankful for a great meal offered in love. Members like Kathleen Heck, Sabrina, Bill and Melissa Waide, Leslie Brunick, and Penny Moulis, have been doing different parts of this.

We can use your help! Whether it is a one-time opportunity, or a regular offering of your help, every one of those parts of the job need occasional help. Sunday October 9 is the next scheduled date to "FEED MY SHEEP." For more information or to volunteer, phone: Melissa Waide 718-8599.

In July, 2015 the Diocese of Southern Virginia awarded a "Seeds of Hope" grant to ODEC based upon the application from members Bill and Melissa Waide. It partially paid for food in year one, and is now a regular part of the ODEC Outreach budget.

This year the Old Donation Endowment Fund provides \$94,800 to the ODEC General Operating Budget. That's about 12% of our total budget. Oct 16, 23, 30: The Kingdom of God is like...

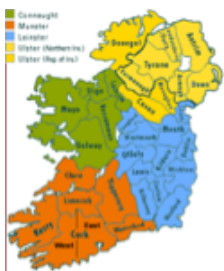

Healthy Living

Recent rain and flooding in our area serve as a reminder that weather-related emergencies consist of more than the occasional hurricane or snow storm. The hurricane season is still active, and winter will be here soon. Weather related disasters are not always taken seriously and can turn into serious, if not fatal, situations very quickly.

Hurricane season ends on November 30. A hurricane's bands of thunderstorms produce torrential rains and sometimes tornadoes. A foot or more of rain can fall in less than a day, causing flash floods and mudslides. Large rivers in the hurricane's path may still flood for days after the storm has passed. More people are killed by freshwater floods during a hurricane than by any other hazard. The storm's driving winds can topple trees, utility poles and damage buildings. Communication and electricity might be lost for days and roads are often impassable due to fallen trees and debris.

The Virginia Department of Emergency Management has resources and information to help you prepare for emergencies. The website also has lists to assist you with preparing a kit that includes, but is not limited to, medications, eye glasses, list of physicians, family member contact information, copies of important documents, and other vital information. There is also a Ready Virginia Mobile App to download.

After we get through the last hump of hurricane season, crisp fall air leads us into the chill of winter. Along with that chill sometimes come ice, freezing rain, snow, and the potential for hypothermia or frostbite.

Tips for Surviving Winter Weather:

- Stay indoors
- Dress in layers and keep dry
- Check on family and neighbors, especially the very young and very old
- Know the symptoms of hypothermia and frostbite
- Keep pets warm and inside
- Winterize your home
- Check batteries in smoke detectors
- Keep an emergency kit with ice scraper, flashlight, and blankets in your vehicle

For all weather related information, check commercial radio, television, social media, and various weather related apps to stay safe. If you have any questions or need help creating your disaster supply kit and family plan, please let me know and I will be glad to assist you.

Healing

What do Healing Prayer Ministers Do?

"Sometimes people just need another person to pray for them." At the September Vestry meeting, John Brown shared an example of his ministering in this way to a woman who walked into his empty store at Lynnhaven Mall. Something in her manner moved him and he assured her that he cared about her and so did God. (This reminded me of the times that the Gospel records Jesus taking action when seeing someone's need. *See resources below.*)

"Listen, love and pray" is the motto for healing prayer ministers. We listen to the supplicant, sometimes reading body language as part of being receptive. We listen also for God's inspiration. We don't judge, give advice or share information about people for whom we pray. We act as a channel of prayer when a supplicant has no words or just needs to know she is not alone.

In last month's article I talked about the importance of asking God for help. One way to do that is to come to the Healing Prayer Minister at Communion time; you may not be sure what it is you need except to feel God's love. As John Brown witnessed, this can happen outside of church as well; but here at ODEC we have people who have cooperated with God's grace to empower them to listen, love and pray intentionally.

Are you thinking as you read this, "I could pray with someone"? We have two training sessions planned in October "to equip the called." Please contact me or Mother Ashley now so you can join us in making healing prayer available at all our services.



Our Rich History

On October 11, 1916 a cornerstone was laid at the northeast corner of the church. This marked the restoration of the partially burned down church that had lain dormant for sixty years with only yearly services to keep the church from being acquired by the county. On Sep 16, 2016, as part of the celebration of 100 years since the reconstruction of the church, the cornerstone was cut out. A professional curator from Colonial Williamsburg Foundation painstakingly removed contents from a small completely rusted box in the cavity of the stone. The only contents proved to be a bottle cap, a coin, and a folded, unreadable and damaged set of papers.

On Tuesday, October 11 at 3:00pm, the stone will be replaced and forever sealed by the Ancient Free & Accepted Mason Lodge, the same lodge that conducted the ceremony one hundred years prior. Church members are urged to offer sacred reminders (rings, coins, emblems, small crosses, etc.) to be placed in the time capsule. Your offerings may be left at the Angel desk.
