

Get to Know Father Joe

Sharing the Joy of Service



St. Philip the Apostle School prides itself on shaping well rounded students while building a strong sense of community. One way the school accomplishes this goal is by teaching the students the joy of serving others. The Christian Community Service program starts in Kindergarten and is fostered throughout the student's time at St. Philip the Apostle School.

Parent volunteers, teachers and students work together to complete community service projects throughout the school year. Each grade focusses on age-appropriate activities that provide the students with hands on opportunities to make a difference in the broader community. Recipients range from the elderly and homeless to soldiers and babies.

Following are some examples of how the students are giving back:

- Kindergarteners spread holiday cheer to the elderly at Del Mar Park Assisted Living Facility.
- The first grade brightens the day of Meals on Wheels recipients with special cards throughout the year.
- Second grade students created placemats for the Senior Thanksgiving Luncheon.
- In honor of "Respect for Life Month," the third graders decorated boxes and filled them with baby items for mothers in need.
- Fourth grade students collected items like socks and toiletries for soldiers deployed abroad.
- The fifth grade welcomed the newest members of our parish by creating beautiful

Parents, students and teachers watched 8th grade student Anthony Stone play "Jesus" as he carried the cross to his ultimate crucifixion on the altar of the church.

All 8th grade students took an active role in the Living Stations as they stood around the altar taking specific roles while the audience reflected on each station. Religion teacher, Irma Bello, randomly picked students for roles

- Sixth grade collected socks and coffee for the homeless served by Union Station.
- Thanksgiving and Christmas meals were collected by the seventh grade for the needy of the parish.
- Four to five eighth graders purchase food, bring it to the Union Station and prepare and serve meals to the homeless every month.

Through Christian Community Service projects like these, the school is able to foster the joy of being of service to the broader community and start the students on a lifelong path of giving back.

Inspiring Young Scientists

Every year more than half of St. Philip the Apostle School children participate in a science fair. In February, Mrs. Gripp guided the 4th and 5th graders in their first formal endeavors of scientific inquiry. Every 4th grade student chose something to plant (seed or plant part), a medium to try and grow it in (soil, rice, styrofoam) and a container to grow it in (like a water bottle, can, boot or a ball). Fifth graders were able to choose their own experiments. Students had very creative ideas and hypotheses, and they had fun testing them and sharing their results with each other.

The junior high science fair was in March. In January, junior high students made an observation about the world around them and devised a question they wanted to address. They formed hypotheses, designed

and ran experiments, made observations and presented their conclusions. The varied projects encompassed many fields including the physical world (stains, parachutes, photography), plants, the human body (heart rate, tooth decay) and human behavior and emotions. On the day of the Science Fair, Ms. France coordinated almost twenty parents, grandparents and other friends who came to school to talk to the students about what they learned, new questions they had, and other types of experiments they could do to learn even more. During the process the students had a chance to ask interesting questions and learn that sometimes the answers are unexpected.

Spring was action packed for St. Philip students. Many grades traveled on field trips to experience science, history and our social environment first hand. Teachers and students enjoy the opportunity to get out of the classroom and find the field trips an exhilarating way to enhance the school curriculum.

Kindergarten visited the Long Beach Aquarium where students explored sea life in its natural habitat. Children observed and touched ocean creatures they had only ever heard and read about. While the bus ride alone thrills a kindergartner, little did they know that they'd be exposed to octopi, jellyfish and sharks. It was an exciting day from start to finish!

A trip to Knott's Berry Farm was certainly a highlight for the St. Philip third grade class. Most know Knott's as an amusement park, but it also offers educational adventures to teach children about American history

including early California and Native Americans. Through the use of hands-on activities, live demonstrations, genuine artifacts and encounters with historical re-enactors, students participate in interactive learning. The log ride wasn't the only excitement as Native American culture came to life for our third graders. What a memorable day!

Our fifth grade class visited the Glendale Community College Planetarium. This field study reinforced Mrs. Gripp's science curriculum pertaining to the solar system. Students learned about our planet's moons as well as magnetism and the positive and negative pull from the poles of our planet. They also had the opportunity to experiment with magnets.

These opportunities take a hands-on approach to learning are not only fun for all involved, but truly expand the students understanding.
