

## Resources for Conversation about Racial Justice, Racism, and White Supremacy

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### Questions for Personal and Small Group Reflection\*

1. Have you aggressively sought out more information in an effort to enhance your own awareness and understanding of racism (talking with others, reading, listening)?
2. Have you made an effort to learn some of the language of those in your community who may speak something other than standard English?
3. Have you reevaluated your use of terms, phrases, or behaviors that may be perceived by others as degrading or hurtful?
4. Have you openly confronted a racist comment, joke, or action?
5. Have you subscribed to a publication which will educate you in the area of a culture other than your own? Have you left copies of that publication in sight where your friends and associates might see it and question your interest in it?
6. Have you ended your affiliation with organizations which are racist, sexist, or ageist in their membership requirements?
7. Have you complained to those in charge of promoting racist TV programs, advertising, news broadcasts, holiday observations, slogans, etc.?
8. Have you contributed time and/or funds to an agency, fund, or program that actively confronts the problems of racism, sexism, homophobia, islamophobia or ageism?
9. Have you been investigating and evaluating political candidates at all levels in terms of their stance and activity against racism, sexism, homophobia, islamophobia, and ageism?
