
CTE in Action

The Columbia College Fire Academy conducted a live burn training in Twain Harte in collaboration with the Twain Harte Fire Department. More than a dozen trained firefighters, captains, and chiefs volunteered to instruct academy students on hose drills, building searches, door breaching, and residential fire behavior.

FNR 86: California Naturalist

The California Naturalist Course debuted at Columbia College Spring of 2018. In this course we studied the natural and cultural history of California. Our field trips included Big Trees State Park in Calaveras, spending a day at Red Hills, exploring Table Mt, heading off to viewpoints of the Hetch Hetchy water system and Rim Fire footprint. Each student developed and implemented a Capstone Project. These projects were service-oriented, benefiting the environment and/or community while utilizing naturalist skills. Projects spanned a variety of foci: Native plant education, invasive species removal, a nature photography exhibit, a bat education community forum, inventory and monitoring of endemic species, and many more. Some of these projects were executed on campus. Gwen Craig took on the greenhouse project: getting it organized and ready for use by students. Amandalyn Madlin, Shawn Mathews and Melody Dicks created a culinary herb garden for the Hospitality Management program to use outside of the Manzanita building.

This course offers a certification through U.C. Davis Extension.


