We received our CUBAN visa at the Port of Miami when we checked in and simply presented it with our passport at Cuban immigration. The Havana cruise terminal was fairly modern. The modern, air conditioned tour buses were at the cruise terminal waiting for the guests to disembark. They had an ample amount of English speaking tour guides to escort each tour.
