Dear People of God at Trinity,

I want to thank you for the great participation yesterday in the preliminary discussion of the Future of the Lutheran Presence on the Plateau. It appeared everyone had an opportunity to share their perspective. I would especially like to extend my gratitude to all the discussion leaders and recorders. I'm anxious to read the many responses which Teresa Boyes will be compiling. We will be sharing a summary with you.

It is important that we reiterate a couple of key points regarding our discussions.

- This is an ongoing conversation which may continue for many months into the future. Yesterday was not your only opportunity for input. This dialog will be ongoing.
- There are no preconceived assumptions regarding the outcome of this process. We are not going to be immediately changing anything. In fact, one of the very real options is that nothing will change. At this time there is no plan to combine worship services, to join our assets, and certainly not to organically combine.

The purpose of the entire exercise is to discern what God is calling us to do as a Lutheran Christian presence in Enumclaw and on the Plateau. With that as our ultimate goal, please continue to share your thoughts and visions at future gatherings and forums.

The next step will be for the council leadership to meet with Hope's leadership to share observations. Hope is also having a discussion on the very same questions we considered yesterday. Then we will meet with Bishop Jaech and Kim Latterell. They will be helping us discern the next step in the discovery process. That meeting will not be moving us into any immediate implementation of some organic union.

God bless both Trinity and Hope as we continue in mission.

WHAT'S IT ALL ABOUT?

Trinity Lutheran church offers a men's Bible study Saturday mornings at 7:30 AM at the Enumclaw golf course café. This Bible study includes members of other churches in the local community and is open to new members. The group has been meeting off and on over the last six years.

Most recently the focus of the Bible study has been on the red letters of Jesus. The group has been going through the book of Matthew. Each Saturday morning a section of Matthew is read but only the red letters. The idea is to highlight the literal words of Jesus. This can be challenging as the context of the words may not be completely known without reading the associated passage. Of course, at times, the group does read the associate words to help with understanding although they try to minimize that. There are definite themes that stand out as they read through the red letters. These include Jesus desire for the Jewish people to recognize that the kingdom of heaven is near, to teach kingdom values through parables and to demonstrate God's love and power through his miraculous healing power.

Members Attend Stephen Ministry Training Event

Pastor Walt Rice, Evie Bjornson, Signe Lukasiak and Laura Lurry were among over 200 pastors and church leaders at a Stephen Series Leader's Training Course in Orlando, Florida in June.

The fast-paced weeklong course began on a Sunday evening, and concluded the following Saturday at noon. A lot of information and long days ended with the team coming home with a 3,000 page Leader's Manual which will step them through the entire Stephen Ministry system.

The Stephen Leaders will direct the new Stephen Ministry in the congregation. They will soon recruit, select, train, and supervise Stephen Ministers and locate people with needs for care, matching them with a Stephen Minister.

The training at the LTC differs from the 50 hours of Stephen Minister training in the congregation because the LTC focuses on the administrative and supervisory aspects of Stephen Ministry. Our first Stephen Minister training course, which will focus on the actual caregiving skills, will begin in early 2018!

Answers to Frequently Asked Questions about Stephen Ministry

What Exactly is Stephen Ministry?

Stephen Ministry is a ministry in our congregation in which trained and supervised lay persons, called Stephen Ministers, provide one-to-one Christian care to individuals facing life challenges or difficulties.

Who is involved?

Stephen Leaders are the ones who oversee and direct our Stephen Ministry. They recruit, select, train, organize and supervise the ministers identify people in need of care and match them with a Stephen minister.

Stephen Ministers are the care givers. They complete 50 hours of training in Christian caregiving, including general topics such as listening, feelings, boundaries, assertiveness, and using Christian resources in caregiving. In addition their training covers special topics such as ministering to the divorced, hospitalized, bereaved, and aging.

Care Receivers are the recipients of Stephen Ministers' care. They are people from our church or community who are experiencing grief, loss of job, divorce, loneliness, hospitalization, terminal illness, or any of a number of other life difficulties. Stephen Ministers usually meet with their care receivers once a week for about an hour for as long as the care receiver will benefit by the relationship.

What do Stephen Ministers do?

Stephen Minister are caring Christian friends who listen, understand, accept, and pray for and with care receivers who are working through a crisis or a tough time.

Are Stephen Ministers Counselors?

Stephen Ministers are not counselors; they are trained lay caregivers. Their role is to listen and care--not to give advice or counsel. Stephen Ministers are also trained to recognize when a care receivers' need exceeds what they can provide. When that happens they work with care receivers to help them receive the level of care they really need.

Can I trust a Stephen Minister?

Trust is essential to a caring relationship, and Stephen Ministers are people you can trust. Confidentiality is one of the most important principles of Stephen Ministry, and what a care receiver tells his or her Stephen Minister is kept in strictest confidence.

Why the name Stephen?

The name Stephen comes from St. Stephen, who was the first lay person commissioned by the apostles to provide caring ministry to those in need as recorded in Acts 6.

What's the Pastors Role?

Pastors will always be the primary caregivers, but there is no way pastors can meet all the needs for care. God has called all of us, not just pastors, to minister to one another. Stephen Ministry multiplies ministry by turning pastors into equippers so they can enable lay people to provide caring ministry as well.

Where did it all start?

Stephen Ministry has been around since 1975, when Kenneth Haugk, a pastor and clinical psychologist, began it to multiply the caregiving in his congregation in St. Louis, Missouri. Trinity is now one of more than 10,000 Stephen Ministry congregations from more than 150 denominations!

What's next??

Your new Stephen's leaders are busy assisting Pastor Walt with the new Spiritual Gifts Course this fall, which will be held each Sunday between services beginning October 8th.

Their hope is to soon begin to recruit church members who are interested in participating in a 50 hour training, to start late January 2018. Stephen Ministers make a commitment to train and to serve care receivers.

Sharing of a Mission Experience by Kadyn Eldridge

This summer I had the privilege to live in the Dominican Republic for 8 weeks. I lived with two other girls in the town of Barahona located on the south-west coast of the country. I wrote this piece for the blog that we kept during the trip.

"The thrill you feel on first seeing some delightful place dies away when you really go to live there ... if you go through with it, the first thrill will be compensated for by a more quiet and lasting kind of interest" - CS Lewis, Mere Christianity

I feel like this quote is so applicable to my experience with the different trips I have been on in the Dominican Republic. During a short-term mission, you feel the thrill. That feeling of love for a place and a people that is overwhelming and fills your entire being. I felt that love for the DR in my two, week-long trips there. The people you are with, the constant excitement and new things, the mission trip romances... all add to this thrill and infatuation with the place. You constantly see and feel God's presence and know His plan is so much bigger than you could imagine. It's incredible and life-giving and I would recommend going on a short-term trip.

But, when the time came to actually *live* in the Dominican Republic, the thrill faded away. It's unfamiliar, there's frustrations that arise, and a language you don't quite fully understand. As we experienced the culture, people, and lifestyle of Barahona, I began to feel this interest that Lewis describes. We have a commitment to the people we have lived with, served, and been served by. A longer-term mission trip creates deeper roots in the place and with the people there. I love this place and the people who I've become friends with and I have a stronger commitment to this place. Being on a longer-term mission allows you to experience daily life and truly get to know the people you are with. This quiet and lasting interest in this place is something I will have with me for a long time.

I do believe that in the spectrum of missions, each trip is crucial to God's plan and each person has a purpose no matter the length of their stay. But, what is necessary, is for there to be a long-term mission in the place and lasting relationships being made in the community. The short-term trips help support the long-term mission. They're the quick bursts of energy, labor, excitement, and encouragement for those living in the community every day. The long-term people are the ones who are there daily and have committed their lives to God's mission in their community.

This summer I questioned mission trips altogether and wondered if they were good for the people in the community being served. God has been showing me that each type of mission is important to Him. **He can use any type of commitment someone has given up for His work.** He has helped me to change my perspective on why missions are important and how they further the kingdom and His plan.
