Canadian Partnership

In mid-March, representatives of the City of Biddeford and city of Saco, Sen. Angus King's office, the Economic Development Corporation and the Chamber met with David Alward, General Consul of Canada and Brenda Garrand, Honorary Consul at Portland.

This was a fantastic opportunity to highlight the economic growth we are experiencing as well as discuss our close connections with Canada on Trade and Tourism.

Canada is the United States' largest trading partner. In Maine, 38,500 jobs are created and \$1.3 billion in goods are traded. The two-hour meeting was very productive and informative.

One take away from the meeting was that while we need to ensure that our borders are safe, we also need to make it streamlined going both ways so we do not deter travel and tourism.

I travelled to Washington, D.C. in early March and had the opportunity to have lunch with our Congressional delegation.

Workforce Retention
