QUESTION #3: WHAT SPECIFIC ISSUE WILL BE YOUR AREA OF PRIMARY FOCUS?

JOHN P BURKEY

Things that affect citizens everyday lives. Two in particular.

DRAINAGE: I'm not talking about the problems incurred from rain as experience with Harvey but the problem after a normal heavy rainfall. Without proper drainage there is stagnant water. Stagnant water not only doesn't smell great but it is a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

ROADS: The city just complete a paving project. I'm sure the roads completed needed to be repaved but were they the ones in most need? There is a "pothole" approximately 72"x48" and 3" deep at the intersection of Taylor and Cleveland. Now that impacts your everyday life. The roads in that entire area of our city need immediate attention.

I know the city will gladly fix these problems, they just need a reminder as to where they are. I'll remind them.

JOEL CASTRO

My two primary areas of focus will be development and beautification. Alvin is growing and we need the businesses and amenities that will keep pace with that growth. However, we do not want growth to adversely affect the hometown feel nor the space needed for families to enjoy Alvin.

JAMIE VAUGHN

Drainage — In the event of another storm, our citizens shouldn't have to pump water out of their neighborhoods in order to leave their homes. **Economic development** — Maintaining and building on what previous councils have done in order to bring more business to Alvin.

QUESTION #4: WHAT HAS BEEN YOUR INVOLVEMENT IN THE CITY (INCLUDING VOLUNTEER WORK)?

QUESTION #7: WHAT EXPERIENCE DO YOU HAVE WITH COMPLICATED BUDGETS? WHEN YOU ARE GIVEN A 300+ PAGE BUDGET, WHAT WILL BE YOUR PROCESS TO DETERMINE IF IT IS A GOOD BUDGET FOR THE ORGANIZATION?

JOHN P BURKEY

I have worked with high dollar budgets, but none 300+ pages. The process begins by comparing the budget to the previous years. If higher, why. Then review each departmental funding request i.e. gas and water, general operating funds etc. Always looking for areas where money can be saved.

I realize a reviewing a 300+ page budget line item by line item will take time but it needs to be done. It isn't difficult, just time consuming. You accomplish it the same way you would eat an elephant--one bite at a time or in this case a page at a time. A good budget will provide adequate funding to it's departments thereby allowing them to adequately provide services to the customers and results in a year end surplus. That's as simple as I can describe my process giving the 150 word per question limit.

JOEL CASTRO

Unfortunately, I do not have a lot of experience with 300+ page budgets. But, just like the a lot of the citizens here in Alvin, I am not rich and budgeting is a lifestyle. This does not mean that I cannot apply myself, review the facts, study the material and make the best decision. As stated earlier, I will dedicate the time needed to be an effective council member. If this means spending additional hours reading and asking questions, I will do that.

To determine if it is a good budget I will consider the need against available funds and review the potential outcome.

JAMIE VAUGHN

I've had to create, modify and maintain budgets both for business and personal use. My process would be, making sure that all departments are adequately funded, while also reinvesting any surplus of funds back into the community.

QUESTION #8: REALIZING THAT YOU MAY BE SERVING THE CITY OF ALVIN IN AN ELECTED CAPACITY, IDENTIFY ONE THING YOU WANT TO SEE ACCOMPLISHED?

JOHN P BURKEY

If you have attended the city council meetings or watched them online you know the city has some major expense items coming up. The building and outfitting of a new fire station and the probable replacement of a fire truck. These are necessary but very costly expenditures. The one thing I want to see accomplished is the city meeting all of its financial and service obligations and the funding of these items without an increase in property taxes.

JOEL CASTRO

As an elected official of Alvin I want there to be economic growth; business creates jobs and jobs means people can put money back into the city.

JAMIE VAUGHN

I would like to see our City continue to grow, in both areas, new residents coming into the City and new businesses.

QUESTION #9: ARE YOU HAPPY WITH THE GROWTH OF OUR CITY & WHAT WOULD YOU DO IN REGARDS TO IT?

JOHN P BURKEY

The city has annexed a lot of developments in the previous and current fiscal year. We need to have controlled growth in this area. When we annex a development the developer typically pays to connect the properties to city services and of course the homeowners pay for the services and property taxes. We need to ensure this new revenue enough to offset the cost of services to the city? Will we need to hire additional police or city personnel to cover the annexed areas? Are the water and sewage treatment plants large enough to handle the increased capacity or will they need to be upgraded? If so will this result in another increase in these rates? What's the impact on traffic? As a council member I would need answers to these questions.

JOEL CASTRO

I think we have seen some positive areas of growth but still have room for improvement. There is a lot of potential in Alvin. We have undeveloped land that could be used to bring in different companies than what we have right now. We could create more family-friendly event centers that will encourage more families to consider Alvin for their next home.

JAMIE VAUGHN

Yes, I've been very pleased with our City's growth in the past few years. Ideally, I would like to see it grow even more; with new residential construction (single family homes but also apartments/townhomes) and additional businesses (small/local businesses and corporate/franchise business).

QUESTION #10: WHAT DO YOU FEEL IS THE CITY'S FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY IN CREATING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT? HOW WOULD YOU PRIORITIZE THESE EFFORTS?

JOHN P BURKEY

Economic development, by definition, is the process by which a city improves the economic, and social well-being of its people.

With this in mind I believe the city's responsibility in creating economic development is to entice businesses to our city that will provide jobs to its citizens, a reasonable tax base and hopefully a service or product that doesn't currently exist.

When prioritizing these efforts I would consider the cost to the city to entice the business to locate here, the impact it will have on our infrastructure, how many local jobs will be created and their pay scale and the overall economic impact the business will have on the city.

JOEL CASTRO

The city must not take a "by any means necessary" attitude regarding economic development. Although we can all see the benefits of growth, it should not be at the cost of the infrastructure of Alvin or the basic needs of our citizens. The city is the 'first line of defense' in regards to how our development deals help or hurt the city today and tomorrow. That is how we need to prioritize development deals, based upon immediate affect and long-term effect on the city.

JAMIE VAUGHN

I believe the City's fiscal responsibility is to support economic growth in such a way to increase business growth and jobs for our citizens.

But, with commitment and dedication to the job they can all be accomplished and in doing so strengthen our economy and improve our quality of life. We can ensure that Alvin remains the most admired city in the area and the most desirable in which to live and raise a family.

JOEL CASTRO

I think we need to do a better job of listening to the needs and wants of our citizens. Realistically a city can not provide every single request to every citizen but we must do a better job of reviewing and examining options proposed by our citizens. When citizens feel they have a voice and are part of the community, they support the community financially, socially and physically. They buy local, they promote local and they encourage local.

Secondly, social media is a great tool to connect people within the city of Alvin and those in the surrounding communities. I think a City of Alvin app would increase communication and let the council know the needs of our citizens. For example, if there is a pothole that needs to be repaired someone could take a picture of it and send it to the city through the app. The city could also send out information about events or help keep in contact during emergencies.

JAMIE VAUGHN

It is my opinion that the city is doing a good job in terms of economic growth. However, I do believe there is also greater potential to expand it even more.
