Muslim communities have always been attached to their masjids. The role of the masjid at the time of Prophet Muhammed, PBUH, was not restricted to being a place of worship, or a location for performing rituals. Instead, it has served as a symbol of the unity and identity of the Muslim community and acted as an institution that plays a central role in the religious, cultural and social life of all Muslims.

) Unfortunately, this is no longer the case in many masjids in countries where Muslims are a majority, since they rely on different institutions to carry out some of the masjid's tasks. In countries where Muslims are a minority, it is vital that the role of the masjids becomes more comprehensive as they serve as religious, educational and social institutions. Alhamdulillah, MAPS have been playing an exemplary role in this regard and it should continue on this path as it faces more and more challenges, especially as our community grows to become larger and more diverse.

-) The different roles played by a masjid should not come at the expense of its religious and spiritual role. While performing these different roles, the masjid should remain to act as a place for Muslims to live their faith, inspired by the teachings of the Quran and Prophet Muhammad (PBUH).
-) As our community becomes larger and more diverse, it gets harder for any executive committee to deliver all the needs of the community. One way to address this problem is to harness the power of the crowd by enabling and empowering the community members and obtaining needed services, and ideas by soliciting contributions from a large group of people. In this regard, MAPS would act as a platform that facilitates the means for every member to contribute something to the community in an inclusive and tolerant environment.
-) Two groups that MAPS should pay special attention to are women and youth. MAPS should continue to develop a welcoming and adequate environment for women in accordance with Islamic teaching to enable them to continue to contribute to the masjid. Likewise, the masjid should create a welcoming environment to keep the youth attached to it. This should not be done by only creating programs targeting women and youth. Rather, we should enable them to create their own programs as well as contribute to the community at large, take leadership roles in the community and participate in the decision-making processes. This is particularly important for the youth, not only to educate and engage them, but also to prepare the next generation leaders of our communities.
