We'll have more on that one when Bill Scharf finishes his bird-banding time!



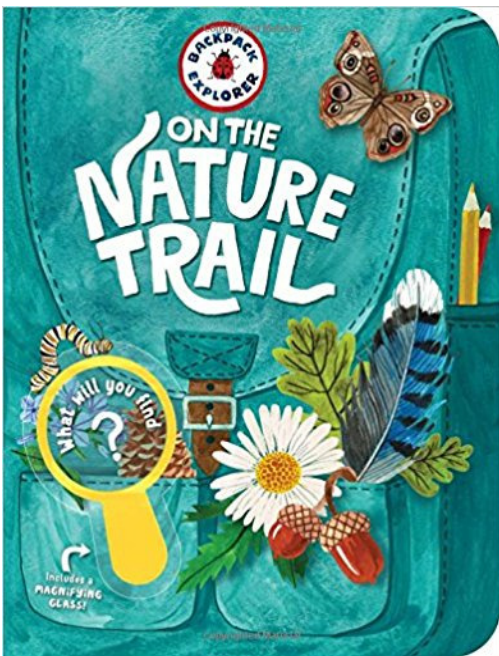

Social Justice

Spring has finally come. Has it? Will we get a spring or go straight into summer? We here in Northern Lower Michigan see differences in our weather, but that is just the surface of our changing climate. Ocean waters are really affecting weather all across the globe. And that is affecting people, other animals, agriculture, etc. One thing we may not be thinking about is that it is also affecting the sex life and sex ratios of some animals.

Just one example is the Australian bearded dragon: “

It's normal for some of these lizards to hatch as females when they have the chromosomal makeup of males. That's because the species doesn't rely solely on chromosomes to determine their sex. [The lizards are also influenced](#) by the temperature at which their eggs are incubated. So in a warming climate, it's possible that the species could see a snowball effect of females primed to produce female offspring, spurring a growing sex imbalance. Eventually, there could be so few males that the species would lack the genetic diversity needed to stay strong in the face of their warming world.”

This process is happening in many documented species from turtles, fish and more.

BBC has said it very clearly: “While humans and many other animals determine sex genetically, many reptiles and some fish use the incubation temperature of the eggs to set the gender of their offspring. This means that changing global temperatures could alter the ratio of sexes produced, making it harder for these animals to find mates.”

Some plants and animals, including birds and fish, are changing their habits. Burying egg-laying animals are seen to be laying their eggs deeper where it is cooler. Other species are changing their mating times. These changes often do not coordinate with the adjustments of their prey species meaning that predatory animals, especially birds, and fish, are finding less food to feed their offspring. Less food, less

survival rate, weaker adults, decreased survival in the winter months, etc.

Several studies have shown a change in fidelity with climate changes. So sometimes this led to extra young being born, but it also can affect the rearing and health of the both broods. And of course, last but not least, there has been evidence that climate is affecting human sex ratios.

A 2015 working paper by the National Bureau of Economic Research found a correlation between hot temperatures and low birth rates in the US. On a single hot day when temperatures went over 26C there was a decline in over 1,100 births. It isn't clear whether this was due to a reduction in the frequency of sex – hmm, is it too hot to do anything? – or to reduced fertility at high temperatures?

There is another possible solution: air conditioning. But air conditioning needs power to run, and if that power comes from burning fossil fuels, we would end up warming the climate even more.

A 2016 study in Japan found a correlation between extreme temperatures, whether hot or cold, and [increasingly sex-biased miscarriages](#), producing a female-biased sex ratio in newborns. Since climate change is predicted to increase the frequency of extreme weather events, in theory it could affect human fertility, too.

Interesting! In the mean time, enjoy!

Budgeted income includes the total of all pledged and unpledged donations and miscellaneous income including building rent, etc. “For Those in Need” collections are in addition to Budgeted Income Received and are disbursed quarterly to worthy causes, including Congregational Care, Tuesday Community Lunch and other Community needs outside our congregation. The percentage reflects the portion of the total amount of income or expense budgeted for the fiscal year.

Several members have chosen to prepay their pledge for 2017-2018. As a result, we are continuing to be “in the black” for the year. However, monthly income has not kept pace with expenses the past four months. If this pace continues, we will likely end the year with a deficit. Mystery at UUCGT!!

May, 2018

A great mystery at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation on Center Road was recently solved!

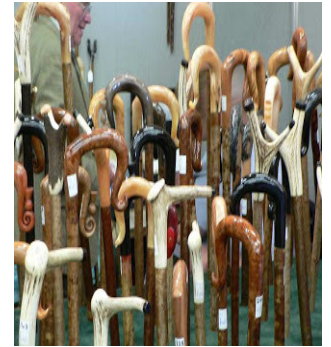


Sleuth Ellie Smith and Area Adopter Kim Sibilski were responsible for solving a long-time mystery that baffled many UU Congregants. As people walked into the church, passing by a small circle planted with a tree and a few flowers, many were heard to wonder out loud, “What *is* that thing? It’s so weird!” or, perhaps “I’ve never seen anything like that!”

What they were looking at: a small shrubby-looking tree in the circle center, with gnarly, twisty, branches.

Take a close look next time you walk by – it’s amazing! It’s all cleaned up now, with the suckers gone, courtesy of Kim Sibilski – and with the leaves out, it’s a wee bit harder to see all the twists and turns, but they are certainly there. This shrub is a dwarf variety of a tree known as **Harry Lauder’s Walking Stick**. *Say what?* you ask: Read on.

Properly known as *Corylus Avellana Contorta*, this shrub is part of the Hazelnut family, although this variety generally produces no fruit. This twisted, gnarly variety was discovered as a sport in an English hedgerow in the mid 1850’s. A “sport” means it just happened naturally: no one bred this on purpose. You will find ‘sports’ in many botanical varieties (roses have ‘sports’ for instance). Until very recently, this shrub was propagated by grafting onto a different root stock – the major reason we cut off all the root suckers this spring, and will be putting that in our Annual Plan so that it happens every spring. Today, although not easy, you can find Harry Lauder’s Walking Stick on its own root stock, no pruning required. This shrub is very low maintenance, disease free, and we have a great specimen of it – definitely good enough to enter into the Missouri Botanical Garden’s “garden locations” of specimen plantings.

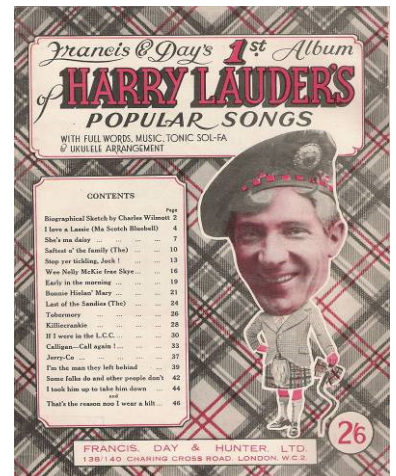


“Wait! Who the heck was Harry Lauder, and why do we call a crazy tree like this after him?”



Ah, yes. Well, the story goes on: Harry Lauder [1870-1950] was an extremely famous singer & entertainer from Scotland, who performed all around the world in all the countries of the Commonwealth and the U.S. (where he had his very own railroad car: “The Harry Lauder”). He entertained troops in both World Wars. He usually performed in full Highland regalia: kilt, sporran, tam o’shanter, and the twisted walking stick known as a Cromach. Today, Cromachs are often finely carved, but traditionally, they were twisty and gnarly --- just like our tree.
