



Strength for the Day

It's March. Time for tulips to push their way up through the last of the snow drifts. Time to fly kites on the softening tundra of public parks and school yards. And time for the important spiritual journey of Lent to begin. Lent is the period before Easter when Christians are called to remember, to reflect, and then respond to the greatest love the world has or will ever know—the love of God as shown through His Son, Jesus the Christ.

We'll look again at the life and teaching of Jesus, and at the events leading up to his arrest and crucifixion. We'll silently wait—and then joyously celebrate as we run to—and see—the empty tomb on Easter Morning. And we'll share the good news of Easter with others.

What we're describing in our Lenten journey is the "2-Channel Rule of Communication." That is—if something's important for people to hear—it's important for them to see as well. Important news should be communicated both ways.

The Bible is the self-communication of God to people, to you and me. It's the self-revelation of God's mind, God's will, God's purpose and plan, and most importantly, God's infinite and relentless love for the world and all of humankind He has created.

The Bible is the quintessential love story in all of history. It's the story of a love so strong it found expression in creating something and someone to love. It's the story of love lost, spurned, rejected. A story of a pursuing and protecting love, a love that cares for and promises to save, the one loved. A love story that can have a beautiful or tragic ending, for each person who reads it.

With our recent blizzard, the following illustration seems timely. Maybe you've heard the story of the Iowa farmer and his wife sitting one night looking out their picture window during a late winter blizzard at a large group of sparrows who were getting blasted by wind-driven snow and were so disoriented they didn't know how to find shelter.

Knowing they would die if something wasn't done, the farmer braved the storm, clawed his way out to his barn, and opened the door so the sparrows could take shelter. The sparrows didn't seem to understand and kept getting blown around his yard. So the farmer went out again and turned on the flood light over the open door, hoping that would attract the sparrows. It didn't work. As the situation grew more desperate, the farmer, out of compassion for the little birds and his frustration with how to save them, blurted out to his wife, "If I could just be a sparrow for one minute, I could go out there and tell those birds to follow me to the barn, and I could save them."

Which brings us to the Living Word of God

"En arche hvn ho Logos, kai ho Logos pros ton Theon. Kai ho Logos HVN ho Theos."

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word WAS God."

"And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth." (John 1:1, 14)

The farmer did become a sparrow. But we can't stop here. Because we've only talked about one channel of the 2-channel rule of communication. Does the Bible, the Word of God, address the other channel? The one about seeing as well as hearing?

World Day of Prayer is an annual, worldwide movement led by Christian women. This time of prayer concentrates on mission work and its impact on promoting world peace. WDP originated in the late 1800s when Christian women in the U.S. and Canada introduced activities supporting the role of women in mission activities at home and abroad.

Their work is now recognized around the world as Christians focus their prayers on a pre-selected country or cause each year.

Prayer vigils honoring WDP 2017 will focus on the Philippines, which was struck by Hurricane Yolanda in 2013. The resulting devastation prompted Christians from all walks of life to lend a hand.

Waukee UMC will host a prayer vigil on Friday, March 3, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

We'd been discussing Jesus's parables for a few weeks, a topic I thought I knew inside-and-out. However, when I opened the teacher's guide to prepare for session 13, the title said, The Parable of the Forgiving Father. Had my Sunday school teachers accidentally skipped that one? Then, after reading the parable in the Bible, I realized it's "really" the Parable of the Prodigal Son. That set my mind churning.

Why would a parable get renamed? So I asked Pastor Jamie for input. Something he said reminded me our focus should be on learning about God when we read and study Scripture. After all, the Holy Bible is God's revelation of Himself to us. Somewhere in history, long before my Sunday School days, someone had titled that parable The Prodigal Son.

Since that day, anyone who studied The Prodigal Son has probably learned how important it is to do what Dad says, be careful with our money, admit when we're wrong, and be willing to ask for forgiveness. Those are solid lessons to take from that parable, but those are lessons about humanity, not God.

However, by making Dad the center of attention and focusing on his actions, you'll gain some key insights about God. He helps us learn how we're expected to live (through the Bible, prayer, fellowship, etc.), watches as we exercise our free will, and welcomes us back with Open Arms when we return to Him seeking forgiveness.

When that plot twist hit me, renaming this parable *The Forgiving Father* made perfect sense. The resulting discussion with our young Followers of Christ was lively and invigorating. Perhaps the best lesson learned (by all) that Sunday was the benefit of finding the silver lining in each cloud God places in our sky.
