## HMFP Brings Strong Presence to African American Museum Conference

Ahmad Ward spoke on his experience as Executive Director of Historic Mitchelville Freedom Park on the 'Things I Didn't Learn At Hillman: Lessons Learned from First-Time Executive Directors panel discussion at the 2019 Association of African American Museums (AAAM) conference in Jackson, Mississippi. He was joined by three other executive directors from across the nation: Christina Shutt, Mosaic Templars Cultural Center; LaNesha DeBeardleban , Northwest African American Museum; and Timothy Barber, The Black Archives History & Research Foundation of South Florida. Additionally at the conference, Katherine Seeber, Mitchelville Archaeology field director, presented on the Historic Mitchelville project during The Presence of the Past: the Power of Collaborative Archaeology session. Historic Mitchelville Freedom Park Executive Director, Ahmad Ward was recently named to the AAAM Board of Directors. ## Mitchelville Bench by the Road Honors the Passing of Beloved Namesake



On April 16, 2013 the Toni Morrison Society placed its 8<sup>th</sup> Bench by the Road in now named, Historic Mitchelville Freedom Park. This bench was placed in honor of the community of formerly enslaved African Americans who fought in the Union army and who escaped slavery in the South during the Civil War.

The Bench by the Road Project is a memorial history and community outreach initiative of the Toni Morrison Society. The Project was launched on February 18, 2006, on the occasion of Toni Morrison's 75th Birthday. The name "Bench by the Road" is taken from Morrison's remarks in a 1989 interview with World Magazine where she spoke of the absences of historical markers that help remember the lives of Africans who were enslaved and of how her fifth novel, Beloved, served this symbolic role.
