Second, life has unexpected turns but at each turn Jesus Christ is there at the corner ready to walk around the turn with us. "For I [Jesus] am with you always" (Matthew 28:20b). Third, for me, I need to listen to my wife for she was telling me all that morning before I went to my library, "You don't need to go to Starbucks again." (Ephesians 5:22ff).

I also wrote this to make you laugh. Sometimes we take life too seriously. You see, if you were in the Starbucks that morning, and knew what had occurred earlier at my home, and then you witnessed the coffee flood, you would be slapping your leg in laughter, and saying, "Told you so."
