

FALL 2017 THEATRE AUDITIONS

First Round:

For the Fall 2017 semester, TDPS will be hosting a first round of auditions for both shows, *Antigone* and *Love and Information* (see show fliers on the call board across from Schoenbaum for more details). Students will have the opportunity to strut their stuff for a panel of faculty members – including Jennifer Barclay, Leslie Felbain, Lisa Nathans, and Scot Reese.

Monday, April 3rd from 6 – 9pm
& Tuesday, April 4th from 4 – 7pm
in the Cafritz Foundation Theatre (Rm. 2740)

To Prepare:

- 90 second Contemporary Monologue

If auditioning for *Antigone* please also prepare:

- 30 - 60 seconds of a poem, song, or classical monologue

Callbacks:

After the first round of auditions, each show will host its own set of callbacks, with the director and a faculty liaison present. Each callback may require students to prepare additional materials. These requirements will be distributed to those who receive a callback.

Antigone: Saturday, April 8th from 10am – 1pm
Love and Information: Sunday, April 9th from 6 – 9pm
in the Mulitz-Gudelsky Rehearsal Studio (Rm. 3730)

Eligibility Requirements:

In order to be eligible to audition for TDPS productions, students must meet the following criteria:

1. Maintain a minimum overall GPA of 2.7
2. Uphold the University Honor Code
3. Be in good academic standing with the University
4. No incoming freshmen or incoming transfers will be eligible for main roles – a second round of auditions will be held in the fall if there are open roles or understudy roles available.

Being a part of a TDPS production is a privilege, not a right. We trust each student to behave and act accordingly.
