Message from Thack

Have you ever jumped to conclusions? Jumping to conclusions can be a dangerous habit, especially when other people are involved. When we assume something is a fact without evidence to support such an assumption, we may say or do something consistent with that erroneous assumption that could be damaging and hurtful. That's why it's important to gather your facts, ask thoughtful questions, *listen*, and pray before you assume anything.

Interestingly, parachutes come to mind when I think about those who jump to conclusions. If you think about it, minds are a lot like parachutes. They only work when they're open. Yet, you will occasionally run into those rare individuals who tend to have all the answers. They are easy to identify because their minds are so tightly closed that it would take an EEG (electroencephalogram) to determine any brain activity at all.

Why is it that we tend to suffer from occasional bouts of closed mindedness? It could be because in this world of facts, data, and the accumulation of knowledge, there's a side of us that cannot stand ambiguity. There has to be a definitive answer or reason to every situation in life. And if there isn't, we will be happy to supply one. The problem with this is that we are usually wrong in our assumptions, and this leads to damaging consequences. Maybe that's why Bishop Charles Duval once said in a sermon he was always wary of those with "an insatiable need to be right."

In his book *Wellsprings*, the late Anthony DeMello, S. J. wrote, "Certainty is the sin of bigots, terrorists, and Pharisees." DeMello was right, of course. Extremists, regardless of political stripe, religious preference, or nationality justify their actions in the name of certitude. This also happens among people of faith. Whether conservative or liberal, fundamentalist or new age, this need for certainty always leads to painful divisiveness.





So, what is the solution to this problem of jumping to conclusions in our futile quest to resolve ambiguity? I believe we need to realize that ambiguity is the reality of daily life. Someone with a healthy spirituality knows this, and this leads to open mindedness and patience. Jesus is the perfect example of what I mean. The parable of the weeds among the wheat in Matthew's Gospel is a good illustration of this quality. The owner of a large farm sowed wheat in his fields. While he was asleep, an enemy came in and sowed weeds among the wheat. Later, when the wheat came up, so did the weeds. The servants wanted to rush into the fields and pull the weeds out. But the owner cautioned them against doing this, saying, "No; for in the gathering of the weeds you would uproot the wheat along with them. Let both of them grow together until the harvest." (Matthew 13:29-30). In this parable, Jesus was saying, "Don't rush in. Be patient. Otherwise, you may destroy the good with the bad."

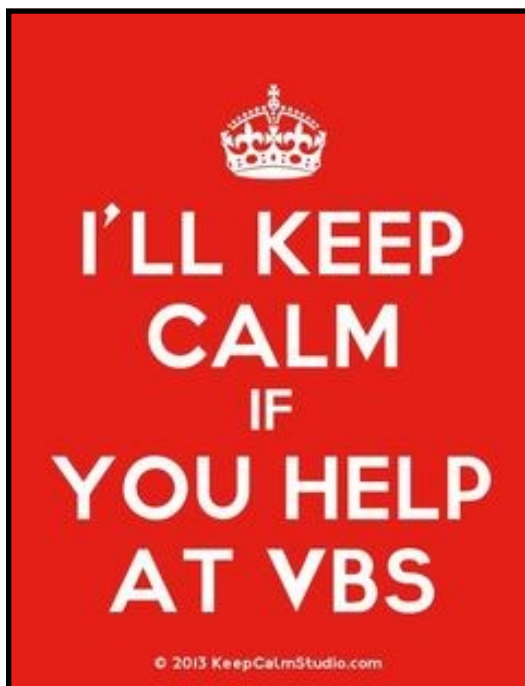

MAD CAMP

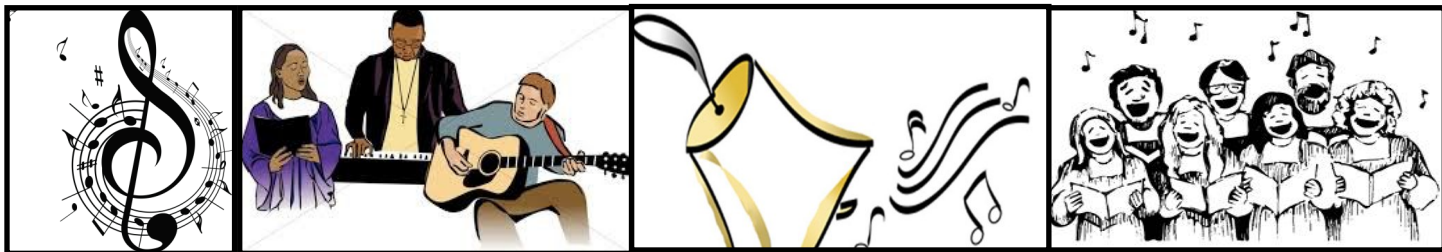
MAD Camp Dates: July 9, 11, 12 (Music Arts and Drama Camp for middle- high school students, or any adults who would like to help with setup or VBS week)

That will mean a great deal.

Looking to the fall:

On the 13th, I'll share a good, 16 minute video from the Taize Community in France, which will give you a good sense of what they're all about and about their Worship. The only exception to Thursday nights is in the month of April, 2019, when we meet on the Monday night of Holy Week for Taize Prayer and Holy Eucharist combined.

Music ministries to consider:

New Song and Parish Choir- open to singers from high school, on up. Both groups rehearse on Wednesday evenings.

Hand Bell Choir- open to ringers from 5th grade on through grandparent age. Rehearsal day and time TBA after I know what works for the group.

Kids and youth: I know that the kids and youth of St. Paul's are a very busy bunch outside of school. So we limit the number of requests we make of you during the church year- mainly, we focus on the Christmas Eve pageant and on VBS.

VBS- we'd like a group of kids to help lead the songs and actions for VBS. See the MAD Camp sign-up.

Christmas Pageant: we'll be calling for a choir for Christmas Eve. All kids and youth are welcome!

Parish Nurse News

A current hot topic in both the healthcare world and the community at large is the opioid crisis. I wanted to take a few minutes this week to give you a little background on the issue. In the next edition, I'll share information to hopefully increase awareness of the alternatives and the safe use of opioids.

Interestingly enough, this is not our first rodeo with an opioid addiction crisis. In the 1840s – 1850's, opium began to be widely used. Many “tinctures” contained opium and were used freely to treat any number of maladies from tiredness to severe chronic problems in both children and adults. There was limited information about the long term effects of opium. The problem was increased by the availability of injectable morphine in the late 1880s combined with very poor control over the sale of morphine. An injection of morphine would magically relieve distress which pleased both doctors and patients. There were few other alternatives to symptom treatment and disease cures were scarce at that point in our history.

By 1920, we began to see a decrease in the use of opioids which corresponded to the tremendous advancements in medicine. Antibiotic discoveries, alternative pain relief discoveries such as aspirin, and stricter prescription laws all worked to drive down the indiscriminate use of opioids. Improved information about the risks and side effects of opioid use led to better prescribing practices by the physicians. At that point, over prescribing of opioids was considered a hallmark of older or less competent physicians. Younger and better trained physicians were more cautious in the use of opioids.

The sharp rise to our current crisis began in the mid 1980's when a publication was released stating that long term use of opioids to treat chronic pain was safe. Now, in retrospect, there is acknowledged concern about the full validity and methods of the study. In 1995, the extended release opioid Oxycontin became available. The drug manufacturer funded large numbers of pain related educational programs aimed at promoting the use of opioids for chronic pain.

Also in 1995, the American Pain Society introduced a campaign titled “Pain is the Fifth Vital Sign” (after heart rate, blood pressure, temperature, and respirations). The campaign challenged physicians to treat pain as aggressively as they would an alteration in one of the other vital signs. The Joint Commission (the organization which accredits hospitals and health care facilities) embraced this campaign and it became a hot line of questioning during their surveys.

The Center for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) got on board with adding “how well did the staff do everything they could to help you with your pain?” to their mandated patient satisfaction surveys. Since facility reimbursement is directly linked to the survey scores, satisfying patients with regard to their pain became a big deal. This resulted in, within reason, the philosophy of trying to keep patients pain free. Which isn't a realistic goal in many circumstances.

With the significant increase in opioid related deaths starting about a decade ago, policy makers began to try and reduce the deaths by focusing stricter enforcement on the non-medical use of opioids. Non-medical use is defined as using an opioid without a prescription, for a reason other than why it was prescribed, or for the experience or feelings it causes. This increase focus did result in an overall decrease of non-medical users but the opioid related death rate continued to climb. Recent studies have shown only 10% - 15% of opioid related deaths were non-medical users.

This quickly brought the focus to the medical use of opioids and brings us to our current situation. The prescribing of opioids is highly monitored by federal and state authorities as is the dispensing of opioids (pharmacies). All medical personal with controlled substance prescribing authority (including dentists and veterinarians) are tightly scrutinized for any practices that could be potential areas of abuse. This focus is aimed at decreasing the over use of opioids for the treatment of pain and encouraging the use of alternative therapies.

In the next Tentmaker, I will review the alternatives to opioids and how you can use opioids safely and effectively.
