Just recently, my Chevy HHR was disabled because of a battery and ignition cylinder failure (covered under warranty). The location was HWY 55 in the town of White Lake, WI—the closest cities being Shawano and Antigo.

I called my AAA Roadside Assistance number at 8:30 a.m.—took about 5 minutes or so to describe the problem and give my membership number; then the tow truck was there by 9:10 a.m.—fast service to say the least. What really pleased me about all of this was the professional service received. The towing under my policy covers a max of 100 miles. I also have roadside assistance on my auto insurance policy. With AAA, there was no paper work and/or forms to do, and no credit card or payment. I did not enjoy the car breaking down, but I did appreciate their service. If you do have roadside assistance through your car insurance company, make sure you read the "fine print" on the coverage.

One last reminder: when traveling in fog, please make sure you turn your vehicle's headlights on. During daylight fog, the automatic headlights do not turn on the rear red lights.
