FIRST FRUITS

When a farmer sees the first fruit of his crop, he runs back to the house, grabs a string and ties it around that fruit or stalk, and declares. "This is *Bikurim*." This *Mitzvah* only applies to the seven famous fruits of *Eretz Yisroel* as mentioned in *Parshat Eikev* (*Devarim* 8:8): This does not apply during a *Shmita* year, when the land rests. The first of any or all of these famous seven *Minim* (species), must be marked and brought to *Yerushalayim*. This is called "*Bikurim*." *Bikurim* are a gift for *Hashem* and is presented to *Hashem* as you'd give a present to your friend, in a nice basket.



The best time to bring *Bikurim* is between *Shavuot* and *Sukkot* (but you can still bring *Bikurim* until *Chanukah* if need be.) The first fruits are paraded through the streets of *Yerushalayim* and are eventually eaten by the *Kohain*, who is dedicated to the service of *Hashem*. This is *Hashem's* gift to the *Kohain* who has no land of his own in Israel.

DID YOU KNOW....

Did you know that Israel airlifted over 23,000 Ethiopian Jews out of Sudan and Ethiopia in three operations known as "Moses" (1984), "Joshua" (1985), and "Solomon" (1991)? Operation Solomon was the most impressive: In 36 hours, non-stop flights of 34 Israeli aircrafts, including cargo planes, transported 14,325 Ethiopian Jews to Israel. The operation set a world record for single-flight passenger load on 5/24/91 when an El Al 747 carried 1,122 passengers to Israel.

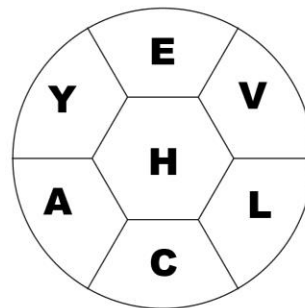

Altruism- Al·tru·ism

TORAH GREATS: THE FIRST KOTZKER REBBE 1787- 1859

Menachem Mendel Morgenstern aka The Kotzker Rebbe (KR) was born near Lublin, Poland in 1787. He received a thorough Torah education from his father, Leibush Morgenstern, who was a zealous opponent of Chasidism. When the KR was 13 years old he had mastered the entire Talmud. A year later he was married. Soon after he became an ardent follower of the Chozeh (Seer) of Lublin and Rabbi Simcha Bunam of Pshis'cha, whom he eventually succeeded.

When he became the Rebbe of Kotzk, thousands of chasidim flocked to that city and a great number of outstanding young Torah scholars were attracted by his saintly personality and wide range of knowledge. Reb Mendel attracted a young, brilliant, aspiring youth. He demanded self-analysis and disdained mitzvot performed with a whiff of self-interest. He recognized the centrality of the ego, but refused to accept it. He taught that neither old age nor vast wealth should prevent a person from growing spiritually. The KR is considered to be the founder of the Ger Chassidim as Rabbi Yitzchak Meir Alter was one of his most prominent students. He never published any works, and while he did write many manuscripts, he had them all burned before his death.

Several collections of his famous sayings have been published, most notably *Emes VeEmunah (Truth and Faith)*. In 1839 he decided to live a life of seclusion, and barely left his home for the last 20 years of his life. He was married twice, and had five children. His eldest son, Dovid, succeeded him as Rav. Rabbi Jonathan Morgenstern of the Young Israel of Scarsdale is an 8th generation direct descendant of the Kotzker Rebbe. His grave in Kotzk, Poland is still an important pilgrimage site for many Jews today.
