User-Friendly Dictionary

"What in the heck am I sitting on???" Have you ever sat down in an aisle seat in the pew and found it uncomfortable? You have probably sat on a red/black/green hardback book, *Lift Every Voice and Sing II: An African American Hymnal* (a/k/a LEVAS). To help ease your irritation, let me tell you about this very special book.

The collection was published in 1993 by the Church Hymnal Corporation as a supplement to The Hymnal 1982 (the blue book in the pew rack). It contains 234 hymns and songs, and 36 selections of service music for the Holy Eucharist. The music is drawn from the following genres: Negro spirituals, traditional and contemporary gospel songs, adapted Protestant hymns, missionary and evangelistic hymns, and service music and Mass settings in both traditional and gospel styles. The Episcopal Commission for Black Ministries developed the book with the Rt. Rev. Arthur B. Williams, Jr., former Suffragan Bishop of Ohio,


as chair of the editorial board. Dr. Horace Clarence Boyer was general editor, and Dr. Carl Haywood was service music editor. The volume was dedicated to the Rev. Curtis Winfield Sisco, Jr. (1958-1992), who was liturgical editor. (Note: Horace Boyer led our Parish Retreat at Shrine Mont a few years ago and had every single person there singing like never before.)

And the book's title? Often referred to as the "Black American National Anthem" it is a song written as a poem by James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938) in 1899. The hymn was publicly performed first as a poem as part of a celebration of Abraham Lincoln's birthday on February 12, 1900, by 500 school children at the segregated Stanton School. Its principal, James Weldon Johnson, had written

the words to introduce its honored guest, Booker T. Washington. The poem was set to music soon after by Johnson's brother John in 1905. In 1919, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) dubbed it "The Negro National Anthem" for its power in voicing the cry for liberation and affirmation for African-American people.

So next time you sit on it, pick it up and take a look — and when you see a notation in the bulletin that we are singing a LEVAS hymn, lift your voice and sing out!





Douglas Adams' highly entertaining *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy* came out in 1983. It's a book about a book.

"It's the story of a book — not an earth book, never published on Earth...never seen or even heard by any Earthman.

A remarkable book and also a highly successful one — more popular than "The Celestial

Home Care Omnibus", better selling than "Fifty three More Things to Do in Zero Gravity," more controversial than Oolon's philosophical blockbuster: "Who is this God Person Anyway?".

In many of the more relaxed parts of the Galaxy, the "Hitchhiker's Guide" has already supplanted the great Encyclopedia Galactica as the standard repository of all

knowledge and wisdom!"

Adams' science fiction phone book remains a best seller — a hilarious, self help star chart to help you find your place in the cosmos. Now we Episcopalians are the People of the Book: Two remarkable books actually — the Bible and the Book of Common Prayer. In worship every Sunday we use both — just printed on different paper.

While scripture is always primary, it is with the Book of Common Prayer that we both proclaim our faith and stake out our place in God's universe.

So on five Sunday mornings this fall at 9:15 a.m. in the Memorial Room, you are invited to stick out your thumb and join me for the *The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Book of Common Prayer: An Anglican Roadmap to the Cosmos*. Together we'll explore the traditions, prayers, sacraments, history, spirituality, and ethics found in the pages of the BCP.


The sessions are designed to be interactive and hands on. Each participant will receive their very own copy of the BCP!

Carpenter's Shelter Dinner Coordinator



Emmanuel is looking for a volunteer to coordinate our monthly dinner at the Carpenter's Shelter. We have a passionate and committed group of volunteers that make our dinner a success each month — the coordinator does not necessarily need to participate each month, but rather make sure we have adequate volunteers and groceries, and step in when needed.

Our dinner ministry cooks and serves a hot meal to approximately 50 to 75 guests once a month (the first Wednesday) at the Carpenter's Shelter in Alexandria. The Carpenter's Shelter aids chronically homeless families and individuals by providing safe housing, job-seeking assistance, and other social services to aid in their transition into independent living. Volunteers like EEC provide 100% of meals at the shelter and this ministry makes a big difference in the nutrition and comfort of many families and individuals. Children

under 18 years old are not allowed to volunteer in the shelter.

The coordinator will be responsible for the following:

- Coordinate volunteers to serve at the shelter from approximately 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. to set up the dining area, cook food, serve dinner, and clean the kitchen.
- Recruit new volunteers and make announcements to keep the parish informed.
- Coordinate volunteers to drop off dishes or ingredients in advance.
- Plan dinner menu. The current menu is Mexican fare and consists of quesadillas, tacos, Mexican salad, and dessert (cookies or ice cream sandwiches).
- Serve as EEC contact with Carpenter's Shelter staff and volunteer coordinator for any issues that arise with this activity.

Big Impact, Small Commitment

Each year, several Emmanuel parishioners volunteer with the Alexandria Tutoring Consortium to work with first grade and kindergarten students. We need a new Tutoring representative to cheerlead and monitor their efforts. It's a simple position that makes a big impact. The Tutoring representative recruits tutors in the fall and gives periodic reports to the Outreach Team. Anyone can serve in this position; you do not need to do tutoring yourself and ATC coordinates all scheduling with individual tutors. We are interested in growing our opportunities to serve more youth across Alexandria; the tutoring chair can help to frame our future efforts. Please see [Kelly Dresen](#) for more information.

Haiti Visit

Emmanuel members John Maass and Sean Ellis visited Ste. Croix Parish in Leogane, Haiti, for four days in July as part of the Outreach Ministry's efforts to support the needs of that church and associated school. In the past, Emmanuel has donated at least \$5,000 per year to this impoverished parish, led by Rev. Sonley Joseph, who visited EEC for several days last January. Our support has primarily been to provide 250 school kids lunch each day they are in school, which is often one of the only two meals they eat daily. Sonley hosted John and Sean at the rectory for their visit, and led them on tours of the school, the church (constructed since the 2010 earthquake), a nearby hospital, a nursing school, and a distant mission church, which was also devastated by the earthquake. They were able to see the school's classrooms, library, and other facilities; the primitive building where the school lunches are cooked over open fires; a new kindergarten building currently under construction; and meet with several teachers at the school.

Sean and John were able to transport over 40 pounds of much-needed school supplies to the parish as well. Several additional areas of support for Emmanuel to consider include improving the school kitchen and adding a water supply to it; rebuilding the kindergarten latrine; providing playground items such as frisbees and jump ropes; providing books and other educational materials for the students and teachers; and a 2017 mission trip of volunteers from our parish to help with maintenance, painting, and a week-long summer music camp at the school. These issues will be discussed at the next Outreach Team meeting on Sunday, October 2.

Additionally John and Sean will be showing slides and talking about their recent trip after both services on September 18.

A Taste of the Evening School at VTS

"Faithful Leadership in the Face of Social Unrest and Racial Division"

How do we balance the various "lives" we bring to the issues of social justice and race relations in this country and how does scripture frame our view? As a black woman, former police officer, mother of a young black male and now as a clergyperson, Rev. Gayle Fisher-Stewart provides a window on the "conversations" that continue to take place in our churches and communities. Her lecture titled "Faithful Leadership in the Face of Social Unrest and Racial Division," will be featured at this year's Taste of the Evening School event.
