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The Cries We Hear from the People of Haiti

I recently attended a wonderful retreat for priests hosted by the Episcopal Diocese of Virginia. The outstanding retreat speakers were two brothers from the Society of St. John the Evangelist who live in a monastic community in Cambridge, MA. Brother Curtis, the more senior of the two monks, shared with us that he learned something astounding from the L'Arche Community in France which serves the needs of people living with intellectual disabilities. Brother Curtis shared that the L'Arche community learned over time that babies cry when they know someone will respond, and they stop crying when they perceive no one cares. It was a mike-drop moment for me in the retreat — that babies cry when they know someone will respond, and they stop crying when they perceive no one cares. Stunning. I'm not sure I will ever be able to respond the same when I hear a baby cry — knowing now that the baby is crying because the baby has learned I will respond because I care.

I think it is fair to say that we, the people of the United States, and we, the people of Emmanuel Episcopal Church hear the cries from the people of Haiti. We hear the cries of the people of our partner parish, Ste. Croix, in Léogâne, Haiti. We hear the cries of Rev. Sonley Joseph ... we hear the cries of the people Sonley loves and serves. In a country where every day was already challenging enough, things got a whole lot worse on October 4 when Hurricane Matthew hit their shores. Matthew left in its wake an estimated US \$2.25 billion in damage and at least 546 confirmed fatalities, and possibly as many as 1,600 unconfirmed because those people have not yet been found. The high winds and accompanying floods severely damaged around 200,000 homes. Nearly complete crop damage has left the impoverished population without a source for food. Parts of the country are still unreachable. I can only imagine the cries we hear from the people of Haiti.

What are we to do about this? Well, we could do nothing more because we have already done what we can ... visited Ste. Croix and Rev. Sonley and sent money to aid. No one would expect anything more from us; but what do we expect from us? If after prayerful consideration you feel like you are being called to respond to the cries we hear from the people of Haiti please let [Sean Ellis](#) and [John Maass](#) know. It is our sincere hope that in the after-holiday winter time frame we'll gather to do some sort of a focused fundraiser to continue to help Rev. Sonley help the people of Ste. Croix, Léogâne. Sean and John could use your help. Can you help?

Thank you for your continued prayers, support and passion for loving God and loving others. God hears your cry. I am so grateful to be counted among your number.

User-Friendly Dictionary: Pew

This month's word came at Chuck's request, so here it is as stated in my favorite reference*:

Pew

A long bench, typically with a back, for congregational seating in church. Seats were not provided for the congregation in the early church, and this practice



continues today in the Eastern Orthodox Church. The use of pews in the naves of churches has been dated from the thirteenth century. Some pews have been elaborately carved, and some have served to separate the occupants from others in the church. Chairs are now used for seating in some churches because chairs allow greater

flexibility in the arrangement of liturgical space. Chairs also may present less of an obstacle than pews for the gathering and uniting of the community for worship.

Pew Rents

The renting of pews was the primary way that churches in many denominations collected funds prior to the twentieth century. Most of the time families were seated in separate pews. The closer a family sat to the altar or pulpit, the higher its social or economic position. See Free Pew.

Free Pew

The renting of pews was the primary way that churches of many denominations collected funds. Pew renting persisted into the nineteenth century. The use of free pews began first in city missions for work among the poor in the larger cities. These missions were supported by dioceses and missionary societies. It appears that the first self-supporting Episcopal churches without pew rents were the Church of the Holy Communion, New York, and the Church of the Advent, Boston.

I don't know about you, but to me any pew I sit in at Emmanuel is perfect — and priceless!

Vestry HiLites

At its regular meeting on October 12, the Vestry...

- heard a report from Outreach Ministry Leader Sean Ellis concerning the post-hurricane situation in Haiti and how it affects our support of Ste. Croix Parish and School. The proposal to vastly improve the kitchen and kindergarten toilet facilities will be implemented with the funds we have on hand pending communication with Fr. Sonley. The project may have to be postponed as more immediate aid is required. The congregation will be kept informed of developments as they become known.
- received the report of the auditors indicating that the church financial records as well as the Rector's Discretionary Fund records were in good order.
- received the Treasurer's report which indicated that the church's financial condition is 'solid' at this time.
- learned that EEC member Claire Elser is pursuing ordination to Holy Orders and has asked that Emmanuel be her sponsoring congregation. Leo Cruz, representing the Vestry, will meet with Claire and Chuck and a representative of the Diocese to discuss setting up the Parish Discernment Committee.
- learned that the 2017 Stewardship Campaign, *Church of Dreams* (text: 1 Corinthians 3:9) will begin Sunday, October 16 and end with the presentation of pledges on Sunday, December 4. The goal is \$425,000 from 160 pledges, 20 of which are new.

IRA Rollover

For those aged 70 1/2 or older, it is possible to make tax-favored charitable gifts from traditional and Roth IRA accounts. A total of \$100,000 may be transferred directly from traditional or Roth IRAs each year to one or more qualified charities, including Emmanuel Church and Emmanuel Church Foundation, free from federal income taxes. Contributions given in this way count toward the donor's required IRA minimum withdrawal amount for the year of the gift. However, they do not entitle the donor to a charitable income tax deduction.

To make such a gift, it is important that you have the donated assets distributed directly from your IRA to Emmanuel. For those with check-writing privileges on their accounts, this may be the most efficient way to make a gift directly from your IRA to Emmanuel.

If you are interested in making a gift of IRA assets to Emmanuel Church or the Emmanuel Church Foundation, please contact your IRA administrator for instructions on making a charitable transfer or, as noted above, simply write a check to Emmanuel from your IRA account.

Help Refugee Families in Alexandria

Prompted by news of the Syrian refugee crisis, Christ Church hosted a Refugee Resettlement Day in April, guided by the Diocese of Virginia Mission & Outreach and Episcopal Migration Ministries, to understand both the worldwide and local situation and needs of internally displaced persons and refugees.

Christ Church along with several other local churches (including Emmanuel) met after this event to discuss what the local Alexandria faith community might do to respond. They formed the Refugee Support Group and identified that many refugees and asylum seekers were already living in the City of Alexandria and need help. Many of these families became known to the group through the Lazarus ministry — seeking assistance with bills, food, and healthcare needs. Often, these families have slipped through the cracks — they are no longer supported by refugee assistance programs or are not

qualified for certain benefits because of their undocumented status (asylum seekers).

So far, the Refugee

Support Group has been assisting 7 refugee families from Afghanistan, Pakistan, Eritrea, and Egypt. Teams of two meet with the refugee families once a month to identify issues and urgent needs or perhaps to help with daily tasks like using the Metro system or obtaining a library card. There are many other families out there that need help. Some have friends or family

here, but most often they are on their own and need help with everything. Each family has had a different set of needs and circumstances.

Examples of assistance the group has provided includes: housing, transportation, furniture, clothing, access to affordable food, school registration, resume writing, locating pro bono medical or legal work, fun family outings to movies, Mt. Vernon, etc.

Some parishioners at Emmanuel have asked how we might respond to the current refugee situation. It would be great if we could be involved in the Refugee Support Group and be part of the dialogue and solution here in Alexandria.

Here are some specific ways that we can get involved:

- volunteer to mentor (as part of a 2-person team) a refugee family here in Alexandria
- attend monthly Refugee Support Group meetings at Christ Church as our Emmanuel representative to bring back news and needs to the rest of Emmanuel
- collectively Emmanuel could "sponsor" a local refugee family
- respond to specific needs identified by a mentor (for furniture, skill, training, etc.)

Haiti

Hurricane Matthew hit Haiti very hard on October 4, causing widespread devastation, loss of life, and property damage. Although it appears that Ste. Croix Parish school in Léogâne, which Emmanuel Church has supported over the past few years, was not heavily damaged, the students and families there are in greater need than ever. In addition to financial contributions to the school, the Outreach Team has just started a collections effort for school supplies and toys, and all proceeds from this year's Giving Tree (beginning November 20) will also benefit the children at Ste. Croix.

Alexandria Tutoring Consortium Thank-You

Emmanuel Church supports a number of organizations each year that provide social services and resources to our neighbors here in Alexandria. This support is in the form of monetary contributions designated by the Outreach Team — funds that comes from our collective pledges and contributions to EEC. One of these organizations is the [Alexandria Tutoring Consortium](#) (ATC) which aims to provide a foundation for future learning by ensuring that children in Alexandria public schools can read at or above their grade level. EEC's support goes towards purchasing new books for children in the ATC program to choose and take home to read with their families; these new books will often be the only ones that children can call their own.

We received the following letter from ATC that we

wanted to share with the parish:

As you may recall, the origin of ATC almost twenty years ago at its founding was the joining of a number of faith communities for the purposes of tutoring to elementary students. Since that time, we have served over 2500 kindergarten and first grade students, most of whom went on to become mainstream readers with full participation and success through their school years. This is the kind of success that our supporters have allowed us to have.
