Emmanuel's Strategic Plan

2022. Seems like a long way off, doesn't it? In a sense, it is. Those of us who have small children, will have a hard time imagining how much bigger they will be in five years. Many of us will reach important milestones within that time period — graduations, weddings, career changes, new children and grandchildren. Thankfully Emmanuel is growing too, and with new members to be welcomed, ministries to be nurtured, and personal relationships to be forged over the next five years, we have the wonderful opportunity now to help define what the future will look like for our church community.



Over the past year, several members of the Vestry have worked with Chuck and our ministry teams to develop a five-year strategic plan for Emmanuel, which we are calling "2022". This plan captures a snapshot of who we are as a church community, including our current mission and vision, our core values, how we are organized and carry out our ministries, and how each and every person who walks in our doors can be an active member of our church community.

As a part of our outreach for this process, we heard from each part of our church community: long time members, and recent arrivals; ministry leaders and regular volunteers; and each and every ministry from our Sunday School to Service and Outreach to the Altar Guild and everyone in between. Some groups shared their detailed plans for specific activities, while others shared a long-term vision for their part of our parish's mission. From all of this input, we defined five overarching statements of how we would like to describe Emmanuel Episcopal Church in 2022:

Strong as a Community
Active in Ministries
Nurturing to Individuals and Families
Connected to Tradition
Financially Sound & Well Tended

Our strategic plan — 2022 — is a living document. We seek and welcome involvement from throughout our parish in helping us to define the specific goals and strategies that will help us achieve our vision for 2022. To begin with, the Vestry will be creating Vestry Liaison Teams for each of our strategic goals. These Vestry Liaison Teams will be tasked with developing more concrete proposals for each strategic goal over the course of the next two years. A sampling of possible proposals is included in the

2017 Annual Giving Campaign Wrap-up

We're happy to report that the 2017 Annual Giving Campaign was a HUGE success! While we fell just a bit short of our 'stretch' goal of 160 pledging units (20 of them being new pledgers) totaling a goal of \$425,000, we ended this year's campaign with 145 pledging units (19 of them new pledgers) for a total of \$408,724. While we can't say this is an 'official' record for the amount ever pledged to Emmanuel Episcopal Church, we're pretty comfortable saying it's the most amount pledged over the past 20 years here at Emmanuel.

Thank you, thank you and thank you again to all who pledged and to those who thought to and decided otherwise. Pledges for 2017 will be accepted throughout the year, so if you have a change of heart and wish to pledge — you're more than welcome to help us achieve our goal of reaching \$425,000 pledged this fiscal year. Not long ago, my seven year old grandson asked me, "What do you do in church?" I proceeded to outline what goes on in terms he could understand: sing, pray, sit, listen, have a snack, see friends, play on the playground. He got it and has enjoyed his recent visits. To be clear — sing, snack, and play are his favorite activities and I think that's a good start.

But here is the adult version of what we do in church: we do liturgy! "Liturgy is sacramental. Outward and visible realities are used to express the inward and spiritual realities of God's presence in our lives. Liturgy reflects the belief of incarnational theology that tangible and finite things may reveal divine grace and glory. By the Spirit, through liturgy, the church manifests the love of God and the unity we share in Christ. Liturgy is a public and social event. It engages our lives and faith, our thoughts, feelings, hopes, and needs — especially our need for salvation in Christ. Liturgy includes actions and words, symbols and ritual, scriptures and liturgical texts, gestures and vestments, prayers that are spoken or sung. It is also shaped by the seasons, feasts, and fasts of the calendar of the church year and the lectionaries for the Holy Eucharist and the Daily Office (BCP, pp. 15-33, 888-1001). Liturgy is to involve the various members and ministries of the church so that all are drawn together into one living expression of divine worship. It expresses what we believe and know about God, including belief and knowledge that cannot be completely stated in words."



Ash Wednesday

March 1 is Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, which signals the approach of Easter Sunday, April 16. We will have two Ash Wednesday services: Noon and 7:30 p.m. All are welcome.

Ash Wednesday marks the first day of the 40 days of Lent, a roughly six-week period (not including Sundays) dedicated to reflection, prayer and fasting in preparation for the celebration of Easter. Lent ends on Maundy Thursday by marking the Last Supper and Jesus' washing the



feet of His disciples. During Lent some people fast from food or certain activities, while others may add something to their life, such as reading a daily devotional or volunteering to help others.

Where do the ashes we use come from? Ashes are obtained from the burning of the palms from the previous year's Palm Sunday, the Sunday before Easter. Palm Sunday marks Jesus' return to Jerusalem, when people waved palm branches to celebrate his arrival. The ashes, applied in the shape of a cross on our foreheads, are a symbol of mourning and mortality. Centuries ago, participants used to sprinkle themselves with ashes and repent much more publicly, but the practice fell away sometime during the 8th-1oth century before evolving into what it is today. Participants in the Ash Wednesday service typically "wear" the sign of the cross throughout the day as a sign of humility and in anticipation of celebrating the Lord's resurrection on Easter.

We look forward to seeing you at one of our Ash Wednesday Services.

The Way of the Cross

The Way of the Cross refers to a series of images (stations) depicting Jesus Christ on the day of His crucifixion and accompanying prayers. The stations grew out of imitations of the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem which is believed to be the actual path Jesus walked to Mount Calvary. We pray the accompanying prayers to help us as the Christian faithful to make a spiritual pilgrimage through contemplation of the Passion of Christ. This has become one of the most popular expressions of our faith during the season of Lent. Here at Emmanuel we will pray the Way of the Cross each Friday night during Lent (beginning March 3) at 7:30 p.m. The service lasts approximately one half hour. All are welcome.

Easter Flowers

The Altar Guild is once again looking forward to a fabulous spring, and



decorating the church with some beautiful arrangements for Easter!

We now invite you all to contribute to our Easter flower fund. It's a beautiful way to honor loved ones, or mark any other special life event, such as a birth and birthdays, anniversaries, baptisms, confirmations, the memory of a loved one, or as a thanksgiving for life's blessings. These honorariums, remembrances and thanksgivings are then acknowledged in the Easter Sunday bulletin.

All gifts, great and small, are graciously appreciated, but we suggest a minimum of \$60. There is also a sign up sheet in the back of the church.
