SCHOLARS IN RESIDENCE



RABBI YONA REISS | DECEMBER 1-2

A noted Torah scholar, attorney and jurist, Rabbi Reiss is the Av Beth Din of the Chicago Rabbinical Council and a Rosh Yeshiva at YU, where he previously served as Dean of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary.

After graduating summa cum laude from Yeshiva College, he received a law degree from Yale Law, where he was senior editor of the Law Journal. He received semikhah from YU/RIETS, and earned the distinction of Yadin Yadin (ordination as a rabbinic judge/dayan).

At the Beth Din of America Rabbi Reiss worked to resolve cases of agunot and popularized the use of the Rabbinical Council of America pre-nuptial agreement as a protection against future agunah problems.

From 1992 to 1998, Rabbi Reiss was an associate at the international law firm of Cleary Gottlieb Steen & Hamilton in Manhattan. He is a certified mediator for the City of New York court system, and a member of the Family and Divorce Mediation Council for New York.

Rabbi Reiss serves on the editorial board of Tradition Magazine. He has published widely in Jewish publications, as well as in the Wall Street Journal and New York Law Journal.

Rabbi Helfgot was previously Director of the Judaic Studies Curriculum at Ma'ayanot Yeshiva High School for Girls. He is the author of Divrei Berakah U'Moed – Halakhic Essays on the Topics of Holidays and Blessings, and the editor of Community, Covenant, and Commitment: Selected Letters and Communications of Rabbi Joseph B. Soloveitchik and Mikra and Meaning: Studies in Bible and its Interpretation. Rabbi Nati Helfgot will join us after Sunday morning breakfast for a class (around 9:30 AM) – what better way to spend a long weekend?

Shuli Taubes received her Master of Divinity (MDiv) from Harvard Divinity School and her BA in history from Barnard College.

a four-part series with Rabbi Fox

Though the Book of Yonah is only read in Shul on Yom Kippur (the Haftorah at Mincha), it is an incredibly profound and relevant book for the entire year. It's the story of the power of one man to effect change, the compassion of Hashem, the consequences of rebellion, and the opportunity for rebirth. It is the story of a Jewish prophet being sent to save a non-Jewish city. And of course, it's the story of Yonah living in the belly of a fish.

Come and learn the depth of this story, the various understandings of the commentaries, and its rich symbolism. Each class will focus on approximately one chapter from the book, so we hope to cover the entire book over the course of the series.

UNIVERSITY?

A DEEPER LOOK AT COMPELLING TOPICS

As we reimagine Torah learning at BJC this year, we will be rolling out four courses for you to choose at BJC.

Following the style of our longstanding Shabbat University programs, sourcebased classes on exciting and original topics taught in four-part semesters will allow us to dig a little deeper.

All classes will take place on Tuesday nights at 7:30 PM.

JEWISH PRACTICE IN A CHANGING WORLD a four-part series with Rabbi Albert

Change might be the only constant, and throughout Jewish history, our eternal Torah has adapted to changing conditions. In this class, we will enter four unique moments in history, and understand whether Jewish practice stood strong or shifted in light of great change.



JUDAISM WITHOUT A TEMPLE: The Shift to Rabbinic Judaism

Possibly the most cataclysmic event in Jewish history, in 70 CE, the center that held Jewish life and observance was destroyed. But the rabbis of the Mishnah found a way, against all odds, for Jewish ritual and unity to continue. Come learn how.

Tuesday, February 20th

EMANCIPATION JUDAISM: How did Torah leaders react to the sudden freedom of the 19th century?

Emancipation was one of the most powerful forces of modern history, and it left Jewish leaders asking profound questions. How does one remain a committed Jew in a society that offers it freedom? How can one engage in Christian-European culture while still remaining dedicated to faith? How does one interact with Jews who have rejected their Judaism? We will explore these questions and more, and trace the effects of emancipation on the Halachic system.

Tuesday, February 27th

WOMEN'S EVOLVING ROLES IN ORTHODOX JUDAISM

Women's increased roles in the 20th and 21st centuries left open questions in all strands of Judaism, and continue to be debated in the orthodox community today. What are the different perspectives on this topic including: women's roles in synagogue life, in Torah study and teaching, in the obligation to fulfill time-bound Mitzvot, and in balancing traditional family structures with meaningful careers?

Tuesday, March 13th

HALACHA & TECHNOLOGY: A Case Study

The twentieth century brought along with it technological advances that once upon a time were considered science fiction, and with it, Judaism had to address a plethora of Halachic questions. We will look at some of the most modern technologies available in the home and explore how the Halachic system looked for precedents with which to address them.

HOMELAND OUR CONNECTION TO ISRAEL

VISITING ISRAEL

There are many great reasons to visit Israel: being there is spiritually uplifting, the scenery and sites are beautiful, and many have family or friends who live there. But is visiting Israel a Mitzvah? Can one fulfill a Mitzvah even with no plans to consider living there? Come learn different perspectives on this issue.

TUESDAY, APRIL 24th

TRADING LAND FOR PEACE

This is a topic that has been hotly debated, both in the world of politics, as well as in Torah. In this forum, we'll stick to the Torah! Learn how the Gemara, Rambam, Ramban, and others can shed some light on this issue, and gain insight into the complexity of such a heavy dilemma.

BURIAL IN ISRAEL

Is it praiseworthy for one who lived his/her whole life outside of Israel to be buried in our homeland? Where does this custom come from? Is it appropriate for everyone? What factors should be considered?

TUESDAY, MAY 8

JERUSALEM - A LOVE AFFAIR

As special as the whole land of Israel is, there has always been something unique about the city of Jerusalem. This love affair goes back millennia, and certainly was not without its challenges. We will study from the book of Kings II to learn about one of the more challenging times in the history of Jerusalem, and how, perhaps, this story might have saved the Jewish people.

Join us as Lunchtime Talmud enters its 26th year! Exercise your mind as you enter a world of thought studied by centuries of Jews. Uncover the depth of Jewish law as you examine cases and understand how Jewish legal process developed and is applied today.


