It was his energy that inspired the small group of parishioners to begin the dream that years later became the Asylum Hill Boys & Girls Club for one. And anyone whose been to Fellowship Sunday at AHCC, where all of the organizations that receive support from the church are acknowledged, will know that there are many, many more. We can never know what life in Asylum Hill would be like if Gary Miller had not come to AHCC, and I'm glad for that. I believe, his warmth, wisdom and above all, his selfless love has not passed on with him. It has gone to seed in the hearts and minds of all of us who knew him.
