## Emergency price increase petition filed with CDFA

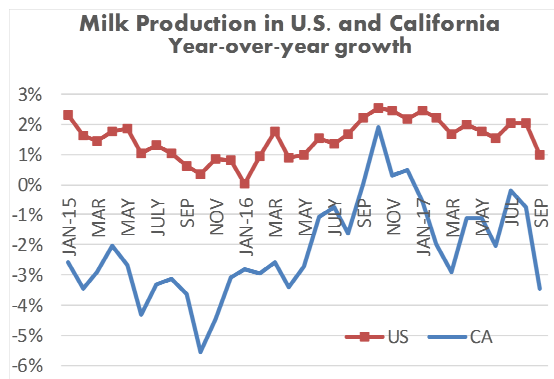
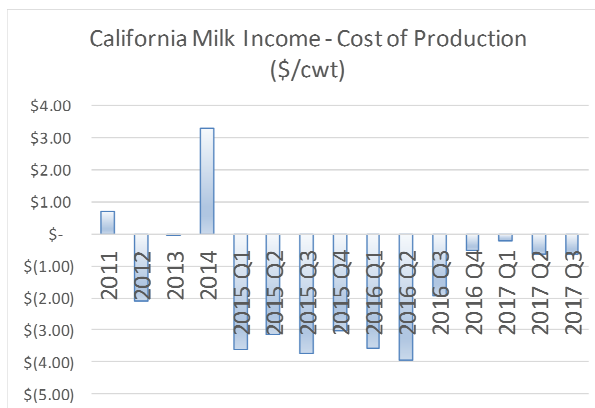
WUD and CDC filed a petition with the California Department of Food and Agriculture (CDFA) today requesting the call of an emergency hearing to consider increases to Class 1,2,3, 4a and 4b prices for a period of twelve months. The requested increase would add approximately \$0.35/cwt to the overbase price.

California dairy families have suffered severe economic hardship in the past three years. Many have gone out of business or acquired massive debt on top of eroded equity. The significant negative margins witnessed every quarter since January 2015 have placed many producers in a dire financial situation. 2017 displayed a modest recovery in the markets but the improvements were short lived and not significant enough to allow for positive margins. According to CDFA's cost of production data, the smallest loss recorded these past three years was \$0.23/cwt of milk produced during the first quarter of 2017.

You have likely read this newsletter's milk price forecast with concern. WUD and CDC's boards had the same reaction and decided action must be taken against those spiraling prices. 2017 ended on a sour note, with the estimated overbase price reaching the lowest level since June 2016. As we start 2018, producers are facing an even lower overbase price, with current commodity prices yielding an overbase of \$13.29/cwt for January. Looking down the following few months is even less pleasant, with potential for prices to fall below \$13/cwt. The first quarter of 2018 price forecast is set to be 12% below the last quarter of 2017. Compared to the latest cost of production of \$18 per hundredweight released by CDFA (third quarter of 2017), this clearly illustrates how the price of milk will be insufficient to cover costs.

While the FMMO hearing is behind us, the process is not over. USDA still has not released its final decision for a California FMMO. Even when it does, there will be a referendum process (likely a few months) and an implementation period if the vote is a yes. Until then, we cannot sit idly while more dairy farms go out of business in the state. California's milk production pattern relative to the rest of the country is concerning, with year-over-year milk production down 1.1% in November (the U.S. was up 1%). This is not a recent pattern: California's milk production declined in 32 of the past 36 months. California dairy families clearly need additional revenues and we believe the CDFA should provide pricing assistance while we await USDA's final decision. CDFA has 15 days to grant or deny a hearing, so stay tuned for more details as we await the Secretary's decision!

## CERCLA Reporting: Some Uncertainty Remains

Last fall I wrote a couple of articles about USEPA's Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) reporting rule for livestock operations. At that time USEPA decided that reporting was not necessary until "the DC Circuit Court of Appeals issues its order, or mandate, enforcing the Court's opinion of April 11, 2017". Well that mandate is now expected as early as next week. There is still some ambiguity over who should report as methods to determine emissions levels are not entirely clear. During that extra time USEPA has been preparing a more streamlined reporting process for agriculture. CERCLA requires reporting of certain air emissions over a certain threshold. For livestock operations, the most common reportable emissions are ammonia and hydrogen sulfide. The reporting threshold for both those compounds is 100 pounds per day. The website above has resources for calculating your dairy's estimated emissions to determine if reporting is necessary using the best available information. Facilities with more than about 1,500 head are generally above the reporting threshold; however in some cases smaller operations could also exceed the threshold. If you have any questions on this issue please give me a call before reporting. The solution is to have Congress correct this issue and WUD is in the lead on that front.

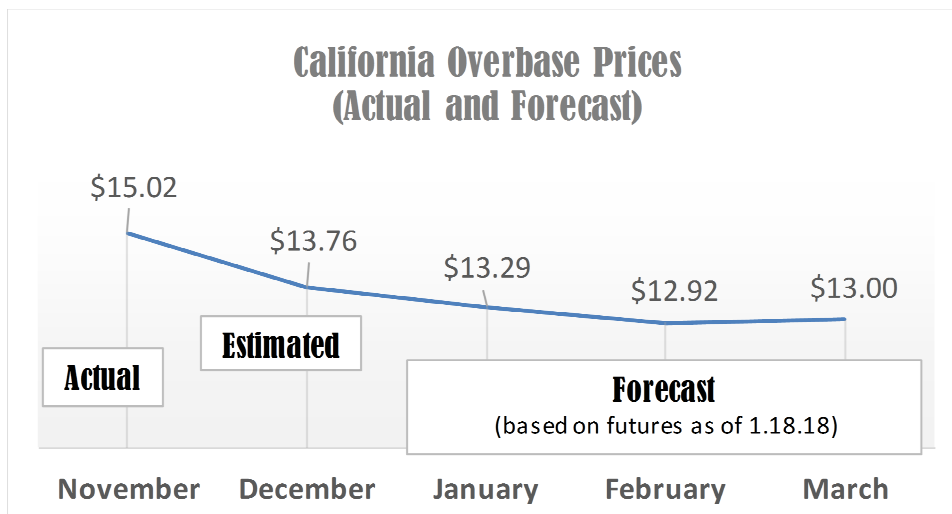

\*The all-milk price is the price used in the MPP formula to calculate the milk price side of the equation. It is not a number that can be compared to the California overbase price. The all-milk price is calculated by using total dollars paid to producers at average fat test, including any premiums or discounts (prior to deductions for hauling, promotions, or dues) divided by total pounds of milk. Total dollars paid would not include any dividends paid by coops or hauling subsidies. The data comes from various sources. In some states, USDA calculates a price using data collected on surveys of plants that purchase milk from farmers. In some states, USDA uses data obtained from Coops or Federal Milk Marketing Orders. In California, USDA uses data provided by CDFA. To calculate a U.S. price, USDA weighs the top 23 states' price estimates by the states' monthly milk production estimates.
