



With floodwaters yet to recede in some communities, emergency officials continue to coordinate the ongoing recovery efforts throughout the counties affected by Hurricane Matthew.



Residents in eastern North Carolina who are already receiving food and nutrition benefits, but can't access them due to Hurricane Matthew, are asked to contact the [Electronic Benefits Transfer Call Center](#) at **1-866-719-0141** or the county Department of Social Services to request replacement benefits. The deadline to request the replacement benefits is Friday, October 28.



If officials have given the "all clear" and you are planning on reentering a flood-damaged home, be sure to check out these [tips from state environmental health experts](#) to keep you safe. For those making home repairs, state officials urge residents to [be aware of the potential for fraud](#) and to use caution when hiring workers to make repairs or assist with cleanup.
