From the CPC Pastor



Dear Friends,

A new year and a new start, right? As I write this, news of yet more celebrity deaths is the only thing that seems to overshadow the many fears that continue to be expressed by the many people who felt targeted by the rhetoric of the election. There is much confidence that an end to this year where many seem to have lost so much hope will mean a new lease on life in 2017, and yet there is so much uncertainty for the future.

Christy is right, there are “blank pages on an empty calendar.” You could fill it up with the same things you did last year, or not. What will you fill your calendar with?

George Michael was one of my favorite singers, ever. I’ve followed his music from the first video I saw on MTV in the early 80’s. I was a fan for all of his ups and even through the lows of his life, when he was entrapped and arrested by a cop in LA. I finally got to see him in concert in San Jose and he was still a compelling artist with one of the broadest vocal ranges I’ve ever heard. In his later years, he started to record and sing some of the greatest songs by other recording artists, but I still have a soft spot for the music he wrote.

He was only four years older than me, and the news of his death has made me consider many things about my own mortality and life. I’d have to say that he was one of the first people to normalize being gay for me as a teenager. His clash with Sony changed his music, and his search for self authenticity in his sound and musical direction is inspiring given that most musicians are forced to follow the styles and marketing of their contract holders. After his death, some have shared how secretly generous he was.

I think one of the reasons I loved his early music with Wham! was because of how fun and hopeful it was. It wasn't a particularly good time to be hopeful, as we were entrenched in the Cold War and still coming out of a recession. As I was in high school, there were enough questions about the future for me that it was easier to follow my friends on their missions than to create a way for myself seemingly on my own. When I came home two years later, I fell in love with the new music following George and others out of the U.K. and went dancing with my friends whenever I could get away from work or school.

As life in school and with a family became more complex I started listening more closely to the lyrics of George's ballads and found a new way to understand class, race and human expression. Yes, I've become my father – continually ingrained by the music of my adolescence. I still much of the music of that era in between my many stops in life.

It's easy to say that George was taken too soon. The same can be said for Prince, David Bowie and many others. But it's also a good reminder to savor every moment of life given to us and to live into the many loves we have in life.

What will you do with the empty spaces in this year's calendar? Will you pick up that old instrument you played in school? Will you make plans with friends new and old? Will you make new priorities about how you will serve others this year? Or will you leave more time and space at the margins of your life?

Whatever you do, be deliberative. Consider what is still on your bucket list. Think through just how you will use your time.

And then use it well.

Since my husband Sig died almost five years ago, the hardest chore I had to learn was handling household finances. That was Sig's job. I haven't made any huge error for which I am thankful. A few days ago, a friend told me that thieves used high-tech equipment to read her credit-cards number although they were in her wallet in her purse. Scary. The thieves went on a spending spree, and my friend had to go to her bank to straighten out the damage caused by the robbers.

Last night while debating which credit cards I could take out of my wallet, I suddenly realized that my debit card was missing! I frantically went through all the credit cards I never use and could not find it. Had I cut up that card up when I was getting rid of cards? Losing my debit card was a colossal mistake. Before I went to bed, with tears running down my cheeks, I asked God to help me find the missing card.

As soon as I woke up this morning I grabbed my credit cards and right on top was my missing debit card! How did I overlook that yesterday? I don't know. I believe divine intervention saved me from going through those cards again. Tears of thanksgiving ran down my cheeks as I thanked God for helping a woman who is inept in dealing with finances work through this latest challenge. While my body feels lighter now that I found my credit-card, my soul rejoices that God's presence surrounds me as I deal with difficult tasks.

My friend bought a metal wallet to keep the thieves from stealing her credit-card numbers. I plan to do the same.

Services include: Domestic violence counseling, Sexual assault counseling, Restraining orders, Case management Safety planning, Children's counseling, Parenting support, Shelter/housing assistance, Legal Advice Clinic, Immigration Clinic, and more.....

Our Field Trip to ACFJC will be a fruitful time of learning. You will be able to tour the facility, meet program leaders, law enforcement, and learn ways that your congregation can become a resource and begin conversations around these difficult realities.

Outreach



As we near the end of another year I felt it important to reach out to our beloved community with some notes about our mission through our joint Outreach programs. Please know that each and every one of you is valued as a contributing member to this most important mission we have as followers of Christ. And I personally want to thank you all for your donated time, talents and hard earned money to keep these programs alive and thriving.

Funding through-out the year to each congregation's 4 designated collections was steady:

CPC: One Great Hour of Sharing, Pentecost, Peace & Global Witness and Christmas Joy

FCCA: One Great Hour of Sharing, Strengthening the Church, Neighbors in Need, and Christmas Fund

Shelter Inc. and Feed the Kids continue to need our help. They use our space once a month to prep boxes for the folks in Pittsburg transitional housing. Folks from several different faith communities help in supplying food items and much needed supplies both in East and West Contra Costa County. Judie Moore is the point person on this project and would welcome any helpful volunteers.

Bountiful Table – (formerly known as Feed the hungry) Program every third Saturday has been operating steadily for 2 years and is now being managed by the Outreach Committee. We invite anyone who is interested in helping with this mission project to contact me (Betsy) so we can add your name to the volunteer list. We need volunteers to 1) help get the word out to the surrounding community that we offer this lunch, 2) to help sort, fold and manage the winter-time free clothing bank, 3) set up tables and chairs and prep social hall, 4) bring needed food items, 5) cook, and 6) clean-up crew. This is a good time of fellowship and friends that we want and need to continue.

Winter Nights is coming to our church again May 8 – 21st. We will host the Winter Nights family shelter for two weeks and be aided by volunteers from several area churches to provide, food and shelter for about 30 folks in this program. I will be calling out for volunteers to spend a night or two at the church during those two weeks, supply food stuffs and paper products, prepare and serve dinner for our guests for 3 nights, 5:00 pm nightly open up doors, and 8:00 am daily lock down doors. Our church also does towel washing for the entire duration of Winter Nights during the months of November, January, March, and May. If you can help with this part please contact Mary Burks. Stay tuned for more information.

Our **Alternative Gift Faire** was a GREAT success. THANK YOU for your generous offerings. Together we raised \$1301 for our favorite programs Habitat for Humanity, Shepherd's Gate, Heifer and our own Outreach fund. Thanks to the Peterson's for the beautiful hand crafted wooden decorations to sell.

If you are interested in being a part of the Outreach Committee please Reach Out to me. We meet the 2nd Monday of every month (except July and August) at 3:00 pm in the Camp Stoneman Room. The More the Merrier and the More we can do together.

Don't Flush Your Medicines Down the Toilet!

- A recent study shows that 80 percent of US streams contain small amounts of human medicines.
- Sewage systems cannot remove these medicines from water that is released into lakes, rivers or oceans.
- Fish and other aquatic animals have shown adverse effects from medicines in the water.
- And, even very small amounts of medicine have been found in drinking water.

How to dispose medications at home

Follow these steps to protect your privacy and reduce unintended drug use, while saving the environment.



1

- Keep medicine in its original child-resistant container.
- Scratch or mark out the patient information on the label.



2

- Place some water into solid medications, such as pills or capsules.
- Then add something nontoxic and unpalatable such as sawdust, kitty litter, charcoal, Comet® or powdered spices (like, cayenne pepper).

- Close and seal the container lids tightly with packing or duct tape.
- If discarding blister packs of unused medicines, wrap in multiple layers of duct tape.

- Place medicine containers in durable packaging that does not show what's inside (like, a cardboard box).

- Remember to keep medicines away from children and pets.

- Place in the trash close to garbage pickup time.

Other ways to properly dispose of unused medicine

- Pharmacy Take-Back Program: Ask your pharmacist if the pharmacy will accept old medicines back from patients.
- Household Hazardous Waste Collection: Find the phone number of your local HHW collection site in the government section of your local white pages of the telephone directory.

Help reduce drug waste

- If you're not sure if you can tolerate a new medicine, ask your doctor about a 10 day trial supply.
- Remember to always take all of your medications as directed.
