

Dear Friends,

A Season of Peace.

The International Day of Peace comes and goes each year on the Fall equinox, September 21st. Often times we miss it's message – that if we can be at peace for at least one day a year, perhaps we can learn how to be at peace the rest of the days in each year.

What will you do this year to mark the day and make a difference in your own life, or the lives of others?

This year, we thought about starting a "Season of Peace" on the inauspiciously important date of September 11th, as we mark the 15th anniversary of that day when America experienced (for many of us, for the first time) the kind of terrorist attacks seen around the world for decades. When asked what lessons people of faith 9/11 has taught us, scholar Karen Armstrong said,

"I know what lessons I'd like them have learned – that we now live in one world; that what happens in Gaza or Afghanistan or Arabia today will have repercussions in the United States or London tomorrow; that America is no longer protected by its great oceans or wealth or military prowess. Look what happened at the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, the symbols of what we thought would give us absolute security in the western world. We have now entered the community of suffering. It is a religious opportunity, because the great religious teachers all say that unless our hearts are awakened to compassion, we cannot begin our religious quest....

This could make for a more compassionate form of religion, a religion that's not concerned just with dogma, identity, or keeping the various institutions going, but that is concerned above

Dear Friends,

September 11th falls on a Sunday this year. The International Day of Peace follows later in September on the 21st. Our continued response to September 11th is a deep commitment to the work of peacemaking.

Every year on the International Day of Peace, the United Nations invites folks all over the globe to appreciate our shared humanity and to join together in working for peace. The United Nations sponsors a variety of initiatives to support the process of working towards international peace. Emphasizing the direct connection between peace and justice, the UN works diligently to address poverty and the inequities and conflicts that result from it. "When people feel secure in their abilities to provide for their families, when they are given access to the resources they need to live healthy lives, and when they feel truly included in their societies, then they are much less likely to engage in conflict." (IDP website)

In addition to addressing poverty, the UN also fosters dialogue as a way of working to create peace. "Dialogue and tolerance are vital to maintaining world peace and unity. The United Nations launched the Alliance of Civilizations initiative to advance mutual respect for religious beliefs and traditions. The Alliance represents a committed international effort to bridge divides and overcome prejudice, misconceptions, misperceptions and polarization." (IDP website)

This process of learning mutual respect for diverse religious and cultural traditions happens on both an international and individual scale. Both are necessary in order to create the conditions for peace. We join in prayers for global peace and we work to better understand the folks we work, worship and live with.

all with compassion, the one litmus test of every single one of the world's great traditions. Christianity, Judaism, and Islam all insist that there's no point in being religious or saying your prayers unless you are acting justly and honoring the sacred rights of your fellow human beings."

I'm sad to say, we continued the cycles of vengeance and revenge after 9/11, the singular moment when the world offered us more support and unity than at any other time in my memory. How do we reclaim compassion and understanding as our primary religious responses to being victimized?

This is what this season between 9/11 and 9/21 offers us. We will begin the season together in worship on the 11th and continue that theme on the 18th. There will be activities in the county and community you can use to further your own spiritual growth in learning how to listen more intently, share more deeply and seek understanding more purposefully. May it be so.

Pastor Christy continues...

We created an opportunity to do both on the evening of August 3 when we invited the community to an interfaith Peace Vigil. As dusk settled in, we gathered around the Peace Pole in the courtyard. People were invited to name places around the world where there was need for healing from the suffering created by war and violence. People shared stories--from personal experiences of violence to heart breaking stories of refugees fleeing the terrors of war. Prayers were raised for healing from personal abuse...to prayers for the safety Syrian refugees. As more people spoke, there was a growing sense of intimacy and shared purpose. As it grew darker and the candles around the pole grew brighter, it became clear that those of us gathered around the pole were creating a safe space within which we could hear each others' stories. Together, we created a space that allowed us to speak our fears, our concerns, our grief, our hopes.

As a church community, we are also creating space for each other as we do the work of Building the Beloved Community. Many thanks to those who have shared their stories on panels during worship and after worship in the circles of conversation in the Social Hall. We are creating safe space for each other where we can speak our deepest truths. As we listen to each other, we learn to hear the deep currents of each others' lives.

We are learning the art of holding space for each other. "What does it mean to hold space for someone? It means that we are willing to walk alongside another person in whatever journey they're on without judging them, making them feel inadequate, trying to fix them, or trying to impact the outcome. When we hold space for other people, we open our hearts, offer unconditional support, and let go of judgment and control." (Heather Plett)

It is possible to hold space for the person sitting beside you in church and possible to hold space for a Syrian refugee in Turkey, a person you may never meet.

When we hold space for each other, we create safety, acceptance and tolerance. These are the conditions necessary for building peace. May we embrace this important work as a foundational piece of our faith. Jesus ministry was based upon creating safe space for others. He invited folks to share their lives with him, to speak their truth to him. As people opened to him and came to understand the power of acceptance and love that he offered them, he promised they would receive a "peace that passes understanding."

May we witness to the presence of this peace in our lives and the world.




