In our Rotary world, September has been designated **Basic Education and Literacy** month. As our leadership has outlined, 67 million children in the world have little or no access to education and millions more over the age of 15 are functionally illiterate. The goal of Rotary International is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy. A successful literacy program of the Rotary Foundation brought a concentrated language teaching method to remote villages in Thailand. The project, funded by Foundation global grants, taught tens of thousands of children and their parents to read and write in the Thai language, prompting the Thai government to adopt this same program for use in the entire country.

Closer to home, Rotary is uniquely qualified to address regional needs in order to foster literacy in people of all ages. In our 11 county District, the National Assessment of Adult Literacy estimates that 11 percent or 119,460 of our 1 million adults lack basic literacy skills. Many thousands more struggle to function effectively in today's society. Research shows that the only behavior measure that correlates significantly with reading scores is the number of books in the home. *The Literacy Crisis: False Claims, Real Solutions, 1998*. It is also shown that two-thirds of students who cannot read proficiently by the end of 4th grade will end up in jail or on welfare. *Juel, 1998*. Finally, *The National Commission on Reading, 1985* found the single most significant factor influencing a child's early >>

educational success is an introduction to books and being read to at home prior to beginning school. As Sandie and I have traveled the District and addressed over 40 Clubs, we have listened to the many childhood literacy programs that our Clubs currently employ. From the wide spread dictionary project for our third graders to books on buses, little libraries, bookcases for children and back packs for school age children, we are making a difference in our goal to strengthen the capacity of our communities to support basic education and literacy. Let us continue to provide for our communities. Begin or expand your literacy projects in your Club. Attend the District Literacy Seminar on September 17th in Clifton Springs. The Guest Speaker, Kathryn Yarlett will present the topic: *Preparing our Children for Kindergarten Readiness, What we can do as Individuals and as Communities*.

September also begins the return of our successful **ONE ROTARY SUMMIT** program which joins together Rotary leaders to exchange ideas on energizing and boosting your club for growth, service and public interaction. Rotarians are Leaders! Engage fresh new thinking and take home hands-on tools to strengthen membership, public image and involvement in Foundation programs. At the Seminar we will talk about new things in Rotary . . . share techniques on how to leverage on our service projects and activities in attracting new members . . . talk about the 100th year of The Rotary Foundation . . . and . . . explore new tools and resources on making our Rotary Clubs more vibrant. Through the efforts of PDG Norma Madayag-Reilly and her team of dedicated District leaders, we are offering three seminars located throughout the District beginning on September 17th and continuing on September 24th and October 8th. And finally, I once again urge all Rotarians to save the date of November 9th to attend the Eastern Cities Fellowship Dinner at the Rochester Riverside Convention Center. Our keynote speaker will be the current Rotary International President, John Germ. 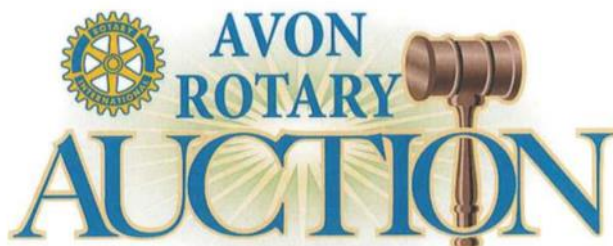

Corning Rotary Names Newest Paul Harris Fellow, Patricia Gilchrist

Corning Rotary Club is pleased to announce its newest Paul Harris Fellow, Patricia Gilchrist. Gilchrist accepted the award at the Corning Rotary Club meeting, Thursday, September 1, 2016 at the Radisson Hotel Corning.

Gilchrist was born and raised in Indiana, receiving her BS degree in Nursing at Indiana University. She married in December 1968 and began her nursing career at a Community Hospital in Chula Vista California. Following her husband's transfer to the Naval base in Galveston, Texas, she took a shared position as head nurse of a Neuro-Surgery Unit at the University of Texas Medical Center. After her husband's discharge from the Navy in 1973, the family returned home to Indiana where spending time raising Dawn and future arrivals Matthew and Robert was her first priority and greatest joy.

Career moves eventually took the family to Wellsboro, PA, Cumberland, RI, and finally in 1986, to Corning, NY. With her children fully engaged in school, Mrs. Gilchrist re-engaged as a community volunteer. She served St. Patrick's and the Corning-Painted Post Roman Catholic community as a member of the Parish Council, including three years as Vice President. From 1990 to 1993, she served as co-chair of the Corning- Painted Post School District PTA Council's Alcohol & Other Drug Education Committee. She was a First Aid and CPR instructor for the American Red Cross, and a volunteer for the Corning Food Pantry and Meals on Wheels. She was also a member of the Corning Hospital Auxiliary and served as Vice President of the Ways and Means Committee.

In 1995, she was asked to assist with the home care of a patient who had no family to assist her. Caring for this lady with other volunteer nurses lead to the formation of a task force to evaluate the healthcare needs of people without medical insurance or the ability to pay for their medical care.

The result was the opening of the Corning-Painted Post Health Ministry a year later. This single medical center evolved into five centers and was renamed Health Ministry of the Southern Tier (HMST) in 2003. Volunteer providers, nurses and auxiliary volunteers served the uninsured for the next 12 years.

At HMST, Mrs. Gilchrist not only volunteered as a clinical nurse, but also wore many other hats in the organization. She served as Volunteer Executive Director until 2009, Vice President of the Board of Directors for seven years, Infection Control Nurse, Assistant Safety Nurse, and Chairperson for the Operations and Standard's Committees. She was a fundraiser, recruiter, presenter, grant writer and served in many ad-hoc roles required to meet the mission of the organization. HMST closed its doors December 31, 2015, due in large part to the availability of affordable medical insurance and the expansion of Medicare eligibility in New York State.

In June 2005 our community recognized Mrs. Gilchrist as a recipient of the first annual Jefferson Award for public service and she had the honor of representing our region in Washington, DC. In 2007, Patti and Bob Gilchrist jointly received the Errol Shand Award from the United Way and the Spirit of Humanity Award from the Greater Steuben Chapter of the American Red Cross.

House with Heart Recovering 1 Year after Earthquakes in Nepal, with help from Corning Rotary

It has been 16 years since Beverly Bronson, a native of Britain, found two-year-old Babu and his five-year-old brother Krishna on the street in Kathmandu, inspiring her to open a home for abandoned and orphaned children in Nepal. House with Heart, as the home is called, has since expanded to also be an education center for impoverished women and children and an outreach program for needy families in Kathmandu. The children were thriving and the programs were in full swing, until... April 25 and May 12, 2015, when two devastating earthquakes hit Nepal, reducing the home and schools to rubble.

Recently, House with Heart founder Beverly Bronson came to speak to the Corning Rotary Club about the challenges she and the children faced over the past year. "We had an emergency supply room for water, food, and some medical supplies thanks to the Corning Rotary Club," said Ms. Bronson, "and two huge tents we had purchased only a week before the earthquakes." Those tents and the grounds gave shelter to Ms. Bronson, the children in her care, and about 40 of their neighbors for several weeks following the quakes. Ms. Bronson and the children would continue to live in those tents for 12 more months, surviving 450 aftershocks, monsoons, frog infestations that drew rats and snakes, cold winter nights, cooking gas and gasoline shortages, and load shedding, which meant no electricity or running water for up to 16 hours a day.

House with Heart's children returned to school just a month after the second quake, and its other programs gradually restarted too, including the Rise Above program to keep girls in school, the Children's Learning Center, and the Women's Training Program. With staff and board involvement, House with Heart developed an earthquake recovery plan that included significant outreach outside of their organization.

It was a rough year, but through it all, Ms. Bronson said she and the children learned, "that we are not alone. We have many friends and organizations on the ground in Nepal who came to our assistance. We also had great support from friends and organizations in America, primarily Corning Rotary, who helped us in times of dire circumstance. We also know now that we have the capacity and infrastructure on the ground where, in a time of crisis, we are in the fortunate position to help our neighbors and community, even to the furthest outreaches in remote villages. Third and lastly, the children have proven to be resilient and responsible beyond my furthest expectations, and together, as a family, we endured."

A little more than one year after the quakes, much progress has been made on the road to recovery, but there is still so much more work to be done. At the beginning of May 2016, after living outside under challenging conditions for one year, House with Heart was rebuilt, retrofitted with rebar to withstand future quakes. Now the Learning Center, which was heavily damaged in the quakes, needs to be repaired.

House with Heart (continued):

Corning Rotary Club's International Committee is working diligently with the Bhaktapur Rotary Club in Nepal to secure a Rotary International Global Grant to help House with Heart recover from these devastating quakes. Corning Rotary's relationship with House with Heart goes far beyond financial assistance, though. Several Corning Rotarians have visited Ms. Bronson and the children. Most recently, Dave Anderson and his wife Mamie made the trek to Nepal in May, 2016. Said Anderson, "How they survived in the cold and wet of the fall and winter is a tribute to their stamina and the planning of Beverly Bronson. It was her management that had the tents and extra food and water available in case of emergency. They were able to survive themselves and help their unprepared neighbors. Presently House with Heart is helping the neighborhood elementary school get back on its feet.

"House with Heart is a home, rather than a conventional orphanage. Beverly Bronson is 'Mama,' and the children think of themselves as brothers and sisters. Though we have known about the home for perhaps ten years, we were surprised to see how well it is run and how the staff and children really love each other."



Global Scholarship Winner Speaks To Rotary Club

The August 10th lunch meeting of the Victor-Farmington Rotary Club was the venue for a presentation by the 2016 Rotary Global Scholarship winner, Alina Urbanic of Victor. Alina is the recipient of a \$30,000.00 Rotary scholarship that will allow her to spend a year at the SDA Bocconi School of Management in Milan, Italy, pursuing a Master of Public Administration degree.

Alina is a 2010 graduate of Victor Senior High School and a 2013 graduate of George Washington University. During 2014-2016 she served in the Peace Corps as a Youth Development Volunteer in Morocco. She was assigned to the small city of Taфраout, population 8,000, in southern Morocco. Her presentation included a talk on her experiences as a volunteer in this part of the world and how it helped shape her decision on a future career course.

Her Peace Corps assignment was centered on her assignment to a Youth Center in Taфраout and also on a Woman's Center in a nearby village. During the week she would work with local youth at the center. She engaged in activities such as teaching English to the students as well as establishing an art class – unique to that area. She initiated a World Map project to give the youth a better understanding of the world beyond southern Morocco.

At the Woman's Center she taught an English literacy class and also worked on an exercise class for women. Alina described other projects that she was involved with during her time in Morocco. These included building a playground from used automobile tires; swimming classes; a Halloween/Health Fair event; a Space Camp (with help from NASA); and a GLOW Camp.

GLOW is an acronym representing Girls Leading Our World. It was an idea initiated by Peace Corps volunteers in Romania in the 1990s.

It involves the concept of setting goals for girls, developing self-esteem, developing leadership skills as well as proper health practices and promoting gender equality.

Alina was impacted by her experiences and what she encountered while with the Peace Corps. She told the assembled Rotarians that this experience, "...helped me figure out what I wanted to do."

While she was in Morocco, her mother, Carol, read an article in the Victor Post on the Rotary scholarship program. She brought this possibility to Alina's attention and the rest was history. Alina will use the funding to advance her education and prepare herself to work to improve life for others, particularly women and children. Hiking To Machu Picchu

Rotarian Bruce Chapman was the speaker for an August 17th meeting of the Victor-Farmington Rotary Club at the Victor Municipal Park Lodge. Bruce recently traveled to Peru and accomplished his goal of hiking to Machu Picchu, the 15th century Inca citadel located 7,970 feet above sea level in the Cusco Region in the Andes. It is the most familiar icon of the Incan civilization. It is believed to have been built circa 1450 and later abandoned at the time of the Spanish Conquest. (continued) >>

Hiking To Machu Picchu (continued):

It may have been built as an estate for the Incan emperor Pachacuti.

The Spanish conquistadors were never aware of Machu Picchu. The outside world learned of it in 1911 when American explorer Hiram Bingham discovered the site and publicized its existence. In 2011 the Rotary Club of Cusco contributed a plaque at the Machu Picchu train terminal commemorating Bingham's contribution. Machu Picchu is a UNESCO World Heritage site.

Bruce traveled to Peru in June, accompanied by his wife Vera, and daughter Gina. Their ten day trip included a four day hike by Bruce and Gina on the Inca Trail to Machu Picchu. They showed slides of the experience and described the experience of hiking with guides and porters over a trail initially built by the Incas.

Access to the Inca Trail is strictly regulated. A maximum of 500 hikers are allowed on the trail. All must be accompanied by guides and porters. They sleep in tents at night and are usually in small groups of six or more. Meals are prepared by the guides and served in a dining tent. Both Bruce and Gina stated that the hike was strenuous but the scenery in the Andes was magnificent and Machu Picchu was worth the effort. Vera Chapman rejoined them at Machu Picchu via the mountain train from Cusco. They all returned to Cusco via train after the hike. They commented on numerous highlights of their experience including the opportunity to see the Southern Cross in the evening sky.

They did see some llamas but not much wild life. Both were amazed at the engineering ability of the Inca's who built a magnificent city of stone without the use of mortar and cutting tools. They were unaware of the wheel yet moved all of the stone to create a terraced city on an Andean mountain. Their architectural skill was obvious from their use of trapezoid doors and windows and stone construction that was perfectly fitted. The Incas were interested in astronomy as evidenced by the astronomical alignment of structures. They created terraced gardens to insure a food supply. The Incas had no written language. It is unknown why the city was abandoned approximately 100 years after it was built. This happened at the time of the collapse of the Incan Empire. In the native Quechua language Machu Picchu translates as "ancient peak."
