1. Managing Change in an Environment of Evolving Services and Supports

Hanns Meissner, PhD, CEO, The Arc of Rensselaer County

The shapes and forms of supports for people with disabilities are evolving. Moving from traditional services to individualized supports is truly transformational. Implementing change at this level requires shifts in thinking and behaving, and a realignment of power and influence in the support relationship. 3. MyPathNY.org - Get Started on Your Path to Employment

The site is unique in that it is individualized and connects each user to systems and resources in New York State based on where they are on their path to employment.

We learn from our community, listen to our youth and apply those recommendations to our program. Inclusion of Disability in the Media...43 Years of Parenting & 45 Years of Sesame Street

Emily Perl Kingsley, Former Writer for Sesame Street, Parent of Adult Son with Special Needs, Author of Welcome to Holland (and so much more!)

Person centered life is what we all dream about. Media is a way to tell the story. However, too often the movies, television shows and other media choose not to hire people with disabilities to portray...people with disabilities. Emily Perl Kingsley is a highly honored writer and advocate who has spent her career (45+ Years!) and life as a parent (43+ Years!) increasing access to and representation of people with disabilities to the world of media! Emily will share personal stories and clips illustrating her wonderful success accomplishing inclusion on Sesame Street.

Emily Perl Kingsley broke into television in 1963 doing Script Research for the CBS series East Side/West Side, starring George C. Scott. In 1970, Ms. Kingsley joined the Children's Television Workshop as a writer for Sesame Street. Until recently, she wrote scripts and songs for Sesame Street in addition to writing 20 children's books and home videos including *Elmo Learns to Share*, *Elmo Says Boo* and several editions of *Elmo's World*. She has also written material for Disney including CD-ROM versions of 101 Dalmatians and The Little Mermaid. In addition to her 21 Emmy nominations, Emily has received 23 Emmy Awards for her work on Sesame Street. Ms. Kingsley, mother of a child with down syndrome is a frequent lecturer on mental retardation and disability rights. Since 1976, Emily has served on several

National Boards and Councils including the National Down Syndrome Congress, National Media Council on Disability, and the Alliance for Inclusion in the Arts.

Recently, Ms. Kingsley was appointed to serve on the Advisory Board for a new partnership formed between Sesame Street and Special Olympics. Emily has received countless awards throughout her 45 year career and in 2015 retired from Sesame Street to concentrate on speaking publicly about the inclusion of disability in the media. Emily currently resides in Briarcliff Manor, NY.
