Required Books: *The True Confessions of Charlotte Doyle* by Avi Wortis, PLUS an additional fiction novel of your choice

Due Date: First day of seventh grade

Directions: To complete your summer project, please pay close attention to the instructions that follow.

You will have an opportunity to showcase your knowledge of the story during the first week of school by writing an in-class essay.

Your **HEADING** should include your first and last name, the date that you completed your project, and English 7 in the upper left hand corner of your paper. No report covers needed. Just staple your report in the upper left hand corner.


Your **REPORT** should be divided into two parts. Write/Label each part on a different page.

Part I Free choice book: As you read *the book of your choice*, look for quotes that seem significant, powerful, thought provoking, or puzzling. You will be creating a dialectical journal using quotes or passages from your book. You will find one quote for the **beginning** of the story and respond to it in 2-3 sentences, one for the **middle** of the story and respond to it in 2-3 sentences, and one for the **end** of the story and respond to it in 2-3 sentences. You will find an example of a dialectical journal in this packet.

Part II True Confessions of C. Doyle:

A. Characters: Make a list of **8-10** important characters. In a sentence or two, describe each character. Focus on the character's role and traits. Please note that your descriptions should be in complete sentences. Do not consult online resources for your descriptions. This should be from your own thoughts and ideas about what you have read.

B. Application: Write a two-chunk paragraph describing two positive decisions Charlotte makes that impact her voyage. Use strong transition words, remembering N2SSWTSW. Students new to MCS, please write an eight-sentence paragraph using the following format:

The CMs should explain the impact of her decision.

1. Your summer reading project should be typed and double-spaced throughout. Use MLA format. If you do not have access to a computer over the summer, you may neatly handwrite your report, using only one side of the paper. Skip lines and use blue or black ink, checking thoroughly for spelling, grammar, and punctuation errors.
2. Please bring your completed project on the first day of school. Late assignments will negatively affect your grade. You may keep your book for highlighting and notes.

Bonus: (Up to 2 points)

For 1-2 bonus points, please submit a picture of yourself and your summer reading book in a unique location. You and the book should be clearly visible. The picture should be attached with a paper clip to the last page of the report. Your creativity will determine the number of extra credit points you will receive. Please, *no bathing suit photos*.

Part II A and B CHARLOTTE DOYLE (20 points)

- Descriptions include each character's role and traits
- Descriptions are 1-2 sentences
- WRITTEN IN COMPLETE SENTENCES.

PARAGRAPH 10 9 8 7 6 5 4 3 2 1

- Written using the 2-chunk method: TS, CD, CM, CM, CD, CM, CM, CS
(students new to MCS should write an 8 sentence paragraph using facts and supporting comments)
- CDs are two **POSITIVE** decisions Charlotte makes that impact her voyage
- The CMs explain the impact of her decision (how it positively affects her voyage)
- Contains a topic sentence and a conclusion sentence

Mechanics and Format (5 points)

- Typed or written in cursive
- Double-spaced, indented paragraph
- 12 pt. font, Times New Roman
- CUPS: Capitalization, Usage (grammar), Punctuation, Spelling checked
- No Run-ons or Sentence Fragments
