In addition to essential programs at the U.S. Departments of Labor and Education and initiatives by numerous individual corporations, various national organizations, mostly non-profits, have been developing high quality programs over the years that can contribute to a Trump Administration-led nationwide strategy to close the manufacturing skills gap.

In MSSC's experience, it takes a community of organizations to implement successful workforce skills development programs. While most of these programs are nationwide, they all can be customized to meet local requirements.

## MANUFACTURING-SPECIFIC ORGANIZATIONS

National Association of Manufacturers. NAM and affiliated Manufacturing Institute have long played a strong leadership role in workforce development e.g. National Skill Standards Act; NAM-endorsed Skills Certification System; Dream It! Do It! and the new Heroes MAKE America for Vets.

*NAM-endorsed Skills Certification System of stackable certifications founded by*: ACT, MSSC, NIMS, AWS and SME.

*State Manufacturing Associations*. Support state legislation on behalf of workforce development and interface with technical education state agencies and schools.
