The Eastland Disaster

In the summer of 1915, the passenger boat *Eastland* called St. Joseph, Michigan home. Owned by the St. Joseph-Chicago Steamship Company, *Eastland* transported passengers daily between the cities of St. Joseph and Chicago. On July 24, 1915, the Western Electric Company chartered the boat to transport 2,500 of their employees to a company picnic in Michigan City. *Eastland* capsized while still tied to the dock, killing 844 people. This presentation by Dr. Caitlyn Perry-Dial, Director of the Michigan Women's Historical Center and Hall of Fame, will discuss the boat's history, the events of that day, and how after a century the tragedy remains the Great Lakes' greatest disaster in terms of loss of life.

But now comes weekly magazine The Economist to pop my balloon.

WHO GETS CREDIT?

Often when losing a spouse, one’s credit is at the end of the list to be concerned about. Left to deal with funeral and burial arrangements, estate issues, and more, the widow or widower may not even worry about credit cards until days or weeks later.

However, credit cards are often issued to one person as a primary account holder with additional “authorized users” who also have cards in their own names. In many cases, a wife’s card is that of an “authorized user” and when her husband passes away, her credit card account is closed as well.

Even if a couple has had the card for years, the primary account holder is the only one with control over the account—and in his/her death, the account is closed. Most credit card companies find out about deaths through the Social Security death records and credit reporting agencies, and close the account automatically without notifying any of the other users.

Plan ahead and make sure that each spouse has at least one primary credit card with him/her named as the primary account holder, or that the card allows for two primary account holders. If caught trying to use a card that has been closed after a loved one’s death, it can be devastating all over again.
