




Networked Theology: Negotiating Faith in Digital Culture, Heidi A. Campbell and Stephen Garner (Baker Academic Publishing)



Spiritual Leadership: Why Leaders Lead and Who Seekers Follow, Thomas G. Bandy (Abingdon Press)



How Jesus Saves the World From Us: 12 Antidotes to Toxic Christianity, Morgan Guyton (Westminster John Knox Press)



Finding God in the Waves: How I Lost My Faith and Found it Again Through Science, Mike McHargue (Convergent)




***The Great Spiritual Migration: How the World's Largest Religion is Seeking a Better Way to Be Christian*, Brian D. McLaren (Convergent)**


***Feasting on the Word Children's Sermons for Year A* Carol A. Wehrheim (Westminster John Knox Press)**

Here is an offering of practical suggestions for preparing and delivering the Children's sermon. A story is provided for each Sunday of the church year based on the Revised Common Lectionary




***A letter to My Anxious Christian Friends: From Fear to Faith in Unsettled Times*, David P. Gushee (Westminster John Knox Press)**
