Ecclesia Semper Reformanda Est The Church is Constantly Reforming

Our church is celebrating with many other denominations the 500th anniversary of Reformation. Reformation started even before Luther and continues even today. The point in history that set the church's renewal on its path of most forceful change was 1517 when Professor Martin Luther publicly announced 95 theses or challenges to the church. With the help of the printing press and with political support, God's word was translated into German and set the church again on a renewed course of following Christ.

What does celebrating Reformation mean to us at St. Mark? We are used to making our way to the sanctuary and greeting each other from diverse walks of life before beginning the worship service. No one would be surprised today that we receive wine with communion, that we hear the Bible in English or that we freely receive words of forgiveness instead of paying for it. These are just a few things we take for granted that had to be reformed in Luther's time in order to follow Christ's command.

Can you recall ways that the church was renewed in your lifetime? As people gathered by God's Spirit and guided by God's word, we are always changing our direction to follow Christ. One change that personally changed my life happened in 1970 when the first woman pastor was ordained in the US. In 2013, the first woman presiding bishop was elected in the

ELCA, Bishop Elizabeth Eaton. She said: "My ordination was not a feminist statement but a response to an irresistible call from God to serve."

St. Mark is celebrating Reformation, and we celebrate God's reforming, renewing Spirit, which leads us and aligns us with Christ's mission to the world. It means that God's Spirit will always challenge us, set us free, make us holy, make us more loving and grace filled, make us ready to serve and even suffer for Christ.

2017 we ask the same question as the long line of martyrs and church reformers asked before us. How will the Holy Spirit call us to be a church in this place, this community and this world? How will St. Mark respond and serve amidst the challenges we face today? We are the church as we gather together in the name of our Triune God. May God's Spirit lead us to answer the questions and challenges we face as a community in Charlottesville and beyond.

GRACE IN ACTION

St. Mark Lutheran Church, with Christ Jesus as the cornerstone, is a people called by God to be servants of all people; to experience God's saving grace through faith; to come together as the body of Christ in worship and celebration of the gifts of God; and to reach out to those outside the church with witness to the loving grace of God through Christ Jesus. To answer this call, our mission will include reaching out to and beyond the members of St. Mark.

Always Reforming – Council President Duane Osheim

At the end of the Reformation Period, one theologian concluded the church was not a reformed Church, but a Church that was always reforming.

During October we are commemorating Luther's call to reform the Church. The Adult Sunday School classes will look at the history of the Lutheran Church, even the art of the Reformation. We will have our special Marty Party and a concert at St Mark involving all the local Lutheran Churches (see details below).

But this time is also an opportunity to move forward, to be continuing the Reformation. This should not be defending the boundaries of our tradition in opposition to others. Luther, in fact, was saddened that the Church was split into suspicious denominations. One great gift of the Reformation, Lutherans and Catholics now agree, was calling everyone back to a conscientious reading of Scripture. This is the basis for carrying our good news to the broader community. Lutherans and Catholics have agreed that we need to carry our message in love and tolerance of others. In a joint statement on the commemoration of the Reformation, Lutheran and Catholic theologians urged that all religious traditions be treated with tolerance and respect even as we preach Christ Crucified. This, perhaps is the goal of our continuing Reformation, that we obey Christ's commandment that we love one another even as he has loved us. (John 3:34)

Getting in the Reformation Spirit

At St. Mark, we're commemorating the 500th anniversary of the start of the Protestant Reformation (Oct. 31, 1517, the day Martin Luther nailed his "95 Theses" to the door of Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany with six weeks of fun, musical, thoughtful, grace-ful, service-ful events. Stay tuned to the Sunday bulletin and weekly emails for more details. And feel free to invite family and friends!

October 8 (right after 10:15 a.m. worship): The Marty Party returns! Bring a dish to the potluck event, which might include a German food contest; brats, kraut and beer; and Reformation Jeopardy.

October 22 (4:00 p.m.): A concert at St. Mark will feature Martin Luther hymns and text, plus original music created for this anniversary. Rev. Dr. Paul Weber and Florence Jowers, both professors emeritus of music at Lenoir-Rhyne University (an ELCA school in Hickory, NC), will present the concert, with the choirs of St. Mark, Peace, Grace and Glory, and Immanuel Lutheran Churches among the additional performers.

October 29: Reformation Sunday. Don't forget to wear red to worship, which promises to be full of expressions of grace, music, and joyful thanks for the life of Martin Luther and his work in bringing God's message to us all.

November 12 (6:00 p.m., after 5:00 p.m. worship): "Luther" on the big screen: Come see Joseph Fiennes, Alfred Molina, Peter Ustinov and more in the award-winning 2003 biopic about the man who started it all. Pretzels and popcorn will be provided. (PG-13)

And from now through mid-November, browse our little Luther Library in the narthex, featuring all related books and videos from the St. Mark Library. You can check out items to borrow, read the "95 Theses" on the wall, and even put on a Martin Luther hat and see how you look in our discipleship mirror.

WORSHIP HIGHLIGHTS

October 1 – 17th Sunday after Pentecost: Jesus' parable about two sons who don't do what they say reveals surprises in the reign of God, such as prostitutes and tax collectors going before others into God's kingdom. In the reading from Ezekiel the people question whether the ways of the Lord are unfair; instead they are to repent and turn to the Lord. Paul urges us to look to Christ as a model of humility, looking to the interests of others above our own. Nourished by the broken bread and shared cup, we offer our lives for the sake of our needy world.

Ezekiel 18:1-4, 25-32 • Psalm 25:1-9 • Philippians 2:1-13 • Matthew 21:23-32



October 8 – 18th Sunday after Pentecost: In today's gospel reading, Jesus tells a parable of the vineyard, an image of Israel, the prophets' mission, and Christ's death. For Christians, the vineyard also speaks of God's love poured out in the blood of Christ, given to us for the forgiveness of sin. Grafted onto Christ the vine at baptism, we are nourished with wine and bread, that we may share Christ's sufferings and know the power of his resurrection.

Isaiah 5:1-7 • Psalm 80:7-15 • Philippians 3:4b-14 • Matthew 21:33-46



October 15 – 19th Sunday after Pentecost: In Isaiah we are given a vision of the great feast to come, when God will wipe away death forever. In Jesus' parable about a great banquet, those invited do not come, so the invitation is extended to others. In our liturgy God spreads a table before us. Even amid anxiety and hardship we rejoice in the peace of God that surpasses all understanding. With great joy we feast at the table of the Lord, and we go forth to share the wonderful invitation with others hungering and thirsting for the abundant life of God.

Isaiah 25:1-9 • Psalm 23 • Philippians 4:1-9 • Matthew 22:1-14



October 22 – 20th Sunday after Pentecost: In today's first reading God uses the Gentile ruler Cyrus to accomplish divine purposes. When the Pharisees try to trap Jesus, he tells them to give the emperor what belongs to him and to God what belongs to God. To gather for worship reminds us that our ultimate allegiance is to God rather than to any earthly authority. Created in the image of God, we offer our entire selves in the service of God and for the sake of the world.

Isaiah 45:1-7 • Psalm 96:1-9[10-13] • 1 Thessalonians 1:1-10 • Matthew 22:15-22



October 29 – Reformation Sunday: Jesus' summary of the law in today's gospel echoes our first reading from Leviticus. We are called not only to love God with heart, soul, and mind, but also to love our neighbor as ourselves. It is out of such deep care that Paul shares the gospel with the Thessalonian community. In the confession of sins, we acknowledge that we have not loved God, neighbor, and self; yet we gather to hear the word of forgiveness and to be strengthened by word and meal to be signs of God's love and mercy in the world.

INSTRUMENTALISTS – Whatever your instrument of choice, we can always use your talent in Sunday worship, whether it be a special solo, or help on a choir anthem.



BONHOEFFER AND RESPONSIBLE DISCIPLESHIP: FOR THE WORLD... BECAUSE OF CHRIST


For Bonhoeffer, Christ is the definition of reality. Discipleship, then, is a call to become enveloped by that reality; therefore, the Christian's call is not to turn one's back on the world (enter the cloister) but to be God's presence in the world. In other words, our life in the world, which is lived out in the midst of families, friendships, work, and communities, is meant to display the presence and transformative work of God in the world. Because Bonhoeffer's faith led him to take the world seriously in all of its manifestations, Christian vocation is one that willingly stands up for one's neighbor and gets its hands dirty.

Join other ACTS participants as together we explore and learn more about our Christian's Call through this course.





MISSION COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS – September 12th meeting

- The freewill offering from the October 22 Reformation concert is designated for Lutheran Disaster Relief.
- The Preschool fence will be rebuilt by Foothills Fence and the costs split between the Preschool (\$3,603.33) and the congregation (\$1,801.66). The congregation's share will be taken from the Capital Campaign fund.
- The design contract proposed by Alloy design for possible renovations including an accessible restroom and accessible access to the undercroft was accepted at an initial cost of \$3900. This cost will be paid for from the Scharlemann gift.
- The property committee was authorized to spend up to \$2000 for the purchase of 2 dehumidifiers for the fellowship hall and the undercroft as well as for elevator repairs.
- Mission Council adopted the Policies on Reimbursement and Ethics as well as the Expense report form as recommended by the Finance Committee.
- Linda Roberts, Treasurer; Howard Imhoff, Assistant Treasurer; and Duane Osheim, member of Council were identified as authorized signers on 2 SunTrust accounts.
- Ashley Smith is our new paid nursery staff person. Volunteers from the congregation will work with her to meet CPP compliance. This position will be reviewed in December to determine if this structure is working.
- 5:00 Sunday evening dinner service began on 9/10.
- A letter will be sent from St. Mark to the people and leadership of Congregation Beth Israel offering our support and care especially during their High Holy Days.
- Because of the size of our preschool staff we are now considered a large employer by Medicare as it relates to health benefits. This has implications for our budgeting process in the future.
