Breeze

Last week, more than one hundred of us toured St. Bede's at its current stage in construction. Mostly what I heard was "Wow!"

People were impressed with the inviting entryway, now big enough to welcome people under the cover of a portal the entire eastern side of the building. Part of this portal is a new narthex—finally, a gathering space for before and after church services. The church maintains its original eight hogan-inspired sides, but focuses the liturgical function along the east-facing axis with a curved soffit and (eventually) a striking mosaic at the east end. The Common Room also drew lots of "wows." It is now rectangular, with more clerestory windows and the complete eastern face sliding glass doors. The kitchen, classroom, nursery, and choir room have been recreated, and a new parlor is in the area previously between the Common Room and Library.



I am thrilled every time I walk through these spaces (which is nearly every day as I continue to work with architects and building crews to make final decisions.) Of course I am eager for the project to be complete. But there is one feature our building has now which it can't have forever—many of its doors and windows are completely open. It is literally open to people and nature in every direction all hours of the day and night. The breeze moves where it will. Last week a dove joined the painting crew.

When our project is complete, most of these openings will be protected with glass, preserving the views and much of the open feel of being in touch with all God's world. But think about how open it is right now—literally open to all. That's how open I always want our church to feel, inside and out. Let's always remember our

oneness with creation and creatures, including people. Let's always remember the importance of fresh ideas swirling around. Too often churches are places of refuge from the world more than places of engagement with it. I pray St. Bede's will always be the latter.

Music Notes

This week includes two important hymns of the Reformation and a theme musical cultural borrowing. We open the service with a chorale prelude and the 10:30 am opening hymn featuring an important German hymn of the Reformation. "Allein Gott in der Höh sei Ehr" (Alone to God in the Highest be glory) is an early Lutheran hymn, with text and melody attributed to Nikolas Decius (c. 1485-1541). It was intended as a German version of the Gloria as part of the Latin Mass and the melody shows resemblance to the chant Gloria for the season of Easter. The creation of this hymn predates the first publications of hymns by Martin Luther (1524) and thus belongs to the earliest of the Reformation.



Catherine Winkworth translated the hymn to "All glory be to God on high" in 1863. As a hymn usually sung every Sunday for many centuries in Germany, it was often the basis for chorale prelude compositions. Sunday's service opens with a version by Johann Pachelbel (1653-1706). The first Communion hymn is from the early Calvinist tradition. Louis Bourgeois (c. 1510-1559) is most famous as one of the main compilers of Calvinist hymn tunes in the middle of the 16th century. His tune *Rendez à Dieu* was used for more than one Psalm, though he is most remembered for another melody, the Protestant doxology known as the Old 100th. Composers through the ages have taken advantage of the "latest trends" and the composers of Sunday's meditation music are no exceptions. One of Pachelbel's teachers introduced him to Italian music which played a role in his compositional models. The Offertory music at 8 am by Englishman John Bull "The Spanish Pavan" shows the direct influence of Spanish popular dance music on English music of the period. Though the Spanish did popularize the dance it has a distinctly Italian origin. The Communion meditation, "Sarabande" from French Suite No. 5 by J. S. Bach (1685-1750) written in 1723, is not particularly "French." A set of six Bach keyboard suites were labeled by Friedrich Wilhelm Marpurg in 1762 and the name has stuck. In general, scholars feel that like Bach's other suites, they follow Italian conventions. However, the title "Sarabande" comes from a Spanish dance step imported from the New World. The service closes with a postlude, "Chaconne," that is taken from another suite of keyboard music, this time by G. F. Handel (1685-1759), who also composed the tune for our closing hymn. Again, the origin of the name is Spanish and a dance imported from the New World. However, by the early eighteen century the chaconne had evolved into a slow triple meter instrumental form with a repeated harmonic progression under a set of elaborate melodic variations. I have chosen a selection of variations from this well-known chaconne of 49 variations. Our Parish Choir closes out its season bi-lingually with its 10:30 am anthem offering of "Camina, Pueblo de Dios" by well-known Spanish


priest and composer Cesáreo Garabáin (1936-1991). My deepest gratitude for their work during the past 10 months.

Looking ahead to Summer Special Music— June 24 we will begin special music from Opera Apprentices and Desert Chorale singers. I am so thankful to all those who have stepped forward to sponsor our talented guest musicians.


Just For Fun! St. Bede's Occupancy Permit Pool and Fundraiser


American Cancer Society's Relay for Life Save the date: July 13 and 14
