AIRF provides adjustment and coping programs, and referral services to help facilitate the effective transition of African immigrants to American society and support their productive, sustainable integration into their new homeland. The clinic partners with the University of Maryland School of Law to provide consultations to individuals in deportation proceedings on a biweekly basis with the collaboration of volunteer pro bono attorneys. Initial consultations are provided at the World Relief office in downtown Baltimore (7 East Baltimore Street) every Wednesday starting at 9:30 on a first-come, first-served basis; cost is \$70 for employed individuals, free to those who are not working.
