

Learn the stories and issues that shaped our state's first constitution. Built in 1854 of thick granite, the jail, located at the rear of Colton Hall, was used for more than 100 years.

Royal Presidio Chapel (500 Church St.)
Founded in 1770, completed in 1794. A National Historic Landmark and first building in California designed by an architect & constructed of stone. The oldest church in continuous use in California. The Heritage Center open Saturday 10am—noon; Sunday 1pm—3pm Chapel open Saturday 10am—noon; Sunday 1:30—4pm.

House of Four Winds (540 Calle Principal)

10am —4pm both days. Built in the early 1830s the adobe sports California's first weather vane, hence its name. The building has the desk that was used for the signing of California's first constitution. Owned and operated by the Monterey Civic Club.

**10am—4pm both days.** Special Art Exhibit: Courage and Compassion tells our shared story of the Japanese-American WWII experience and highlights the bravery, integrity, and extraordinary support of Japanese-Americans. To save from demolition, the church was purchased by Monterey History & Art Association and moved to its current site in 1969.
