

Come to Agape on Wednesday nights. Sing in the choir. The possibilities are endless. We all continue to evolve and grow. We all are capable of learning new things in life. Put some real life back into your faith and commit to learning something new this year by exercising both your brain and your soul.

Panther Steel completed the work we needed to repair the steel lintel over the entrance outside. We will paint the steel when we paint the west side doors and railing later this month.

We have received a proposal from Knoxville Security Service to upgrade our current alarm and fire monitoring. We presented the proposal to the Finance Committee and Vestry for their review. We received funding from the Finance Committee and approval from the Vestry to proceed. This should be completed in September.

We also received a quote from Comer Electric to replace the current lighting in the downstairs hallways, Father Mark's office, Lynne Ann's office, and the Undercroft. Also included in the quote will be electrical work and materials to add GFI outlets when we remodel the cabinets in the Undercroft. This will be Phase I of a 3 Phase plan to upgrade all lighting to LED energy efficient lighting. The Finance Committee has provided funding we have approval from the Vestry to proceed. Comer Electric should begin upgrading the lights over the next few weeks. We will have them back to complete the additional work when we begin the remodeling in the Undercroft.

We will be planning a workday to paint the west side doors and railings in the next few weeks. Anyone interested in helping paint are welcomed. Please contact Bob Harmon if you can help.

I want to give huge thanks to Alice Westmorland and Glenn Thompson for their weeding and pruning all around the church grounds. More pine needles have been spread and the it looks so much better. Anyone that can help with future weeding will be greatly appreciated. Please contact Bob Harmon or Alice Westmorland if you would like to become a Lay Weeder.

Outreach in Action

September is upon us and that means Oasis Coffee Ministries will be the recipient of the 2nd Sunday loose offer for the month. The Oasis, a faith based Christian coffee house ministry, is located on 115 Henry Street, in downtown Morristown. The Oasis is open Monday thru Friday, 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., with a special service on Saturday evenings at 6 p.m. Coffee, fellowship, prayer, personal ministering, and Bible study are freely available to all.

For the homeless in Morristown, this is a place of refuge, as anyone can get a snack to and a hot or cold drink, when they are open. In the winter, Ms. Nadine Peters, the driving force behind this ministry, stays open on colder evenings to shelter the homeless. This winter Outreach will be asking for volunteers to work at the Oasis on very cold days. This will allow the homeless a warm place to go before they can find shelter for the night at MATS. September 9th is the second Sunday for the month, so keep Oasis in mind that day. To learn more about Oasis come to the Agape dinner on September 5th.

Bingo will be the 2nd Wednesday or September 12th. Deacon Sari has informed me that All Saints' Episcopal School will be providing the prizes for Bingo this month as part of their Outreach program. So if you see an All Saints' student or staff member of the school - thank them. At this time the meal is unknown to me but knowing Marylou Mauney and Bill Connellee - it'll be good. The Morristown Housing Authority folks enjoy it and of course playing Bingo too.

Food on Foot - the bags will be filled on the 5th and 19th of the month prior to the Agape meal. Distribution is on the 22nd of September. So this is an excellent way to spend some time doing something good, then you can scream and yell and go crazy all you want in the afternoon, when Tennessee plays Florida at Neyland Stadium. Kick-off no, no I mean distribution is from 10:30am to 12:30pm at Food on Foot, located on 1 Berkline Drive in Morristown.

This is an open invitation to join the Outreach Committee we meet quarterly and that includes breaking bread together. Give it some thought.






A smile for your day!

The "Little Movers & Shakers" will work on special songs to be sung periodically in church and at the annual Talent Show on Shrove Tuesday (aka Mardi Gras).




Another Music Opportunity for YOUTH



Hello, Episcopal Church Women of All Saints',
